New York, July 27—A demand for Great Northern Pfd made that stock the only prominent feature at and for some time after the market opening. This buying advanced its price half to 140½ and was followed by an advance of ½ in N.P. The recent strength in Hill stocks has been almost wholly due to buying through houses closely affiliated with James J. Hill and the idea prevails that there is something else back of it besides the favorable outlook for the spring wheat crop. Price changes in other issues were limited to small fractions.

London, July 27—The London Dock Strike was called off today. Workers will return to work on the understanding that the formal agreement now being drawn up will be accepted by employers.

PROPERTY OWNERS MAY RAISE OBJECTION

Right of Way Through Alleyway on East Side of Fire Station Said to Exist

Plans for the new central fire station which are being prepared by Mr. H. M. Clarke of this city, and which will be presented to the Fire Committee at an early date provide, it is understood, for a three-door station, which will include the site of the existing station as well as the alley-way on the eastern side. There is some doubt, however, concerning the city's right to use this alley-way as a right-of-way through it is claimed by property holders on Queen street and trouble may be expected if an attempt is made to close it.

Ald. Cruikshank, chairman of the Fire Committee recently visited St. John and inspected some of the fire stations there. He was impressed with the North End Station and the new station here will contain some of the conveniences included in that in St. John. Accommodations for drivers are to be provided but there will be no living-rooms in the station for their families. A centralized fire-alarm, electric devices for opening the doors and sliding-poles from bed-rooms to the first floor are also to be provided. The building is to be of two stories with a large company-room on the second-floor.

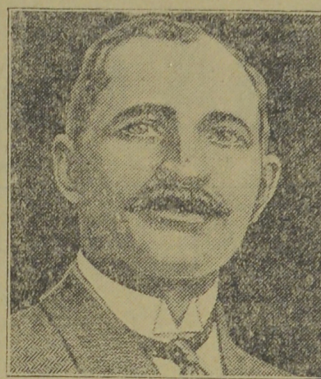

IS KNOWN HERE.

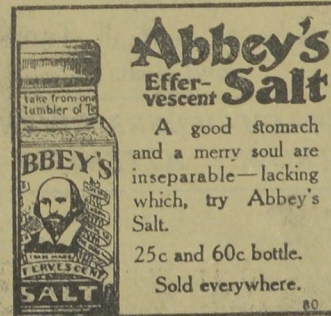
