WALTER COX WON TWO
MORE AT DETROIT MEET

Anvil Beaten out by Helen Stiles—Vernon McKinney Distanced—Independence Boy Covered First Heat of Free-for-all in 2:02. 1-4 Best Time of Year

Detroit, July 25—Vernon McKinney thought to be the greatest free-for-all pacer in captivity, beaten and then distanced; Anvil taken into camp by Helen Stiles, the coming to life of two supposed dead ones in the Cox stable, and some peculiar work on the part of the times, served to make the fourth day of the blue ribbon meeting chock full of spice. About 8000 people were on hand to enjoy the sport and try to figure out the reversals of form.

The features were the free-for-all race and the 2:09 trot, in which two top-heavy favorites were cast into the discard by horses with greater speed and more manners. After what Anvil did to Helen Stiles at Kalamazoo few thought that the mare would get even with him, but she did so in no uncertain way.

Vernon McKinney, who had shown such a great flight in the last two heats at the other town, was challenged in the stretch by Independence Boy and went to a break when his driver threw the lines on his back and started to wallow him.

The 2:12 trot was raced all day and lost the next two, came back and walked off with the money. Cox also did some engineering in the 2:12 pace, in which Mansfield was fifth in 2:10½ in the first heat and won the next in 2:05½, the most striking reversal that ever dodged the eyes of a judge's stand.

VERNON MCKINNEY THE FAVORITE.

The field in the free-for-all trot was the largest and fastest in many years, seven horses scoring for a word, with Vernon McKinney a pronounced favorite at about even money over the rest, and Independence Boy second choice.

They went away to a particularly good start and Vernon McKinney soon was leading, with Evelyn W. and Independence Boy close up and Sir R. and Hal B. Jr. breaking at the turn. At the quarter in 30 seconds Vernon had a length and the other two were lapped on him at the half in 1:04½, the wind blowing very strong in their faces. Sir R. broke again on the far turn and was a distance out, Vernon McKinney leading in the stretch, where Independence Boy gave chase.

Valentine had Independence Boy at the limit and inside of the distance he caught Vernon McKinney. James threw the lines away and went to whipping, Vernon McKinney making a break and settling it right there. Independence Boy won in 2:02½, the fastest heat of the year, the last quarter in 29½ sec.

Vernon McKinney acted as though he had enough, for he broke in the scoring in the second heat, but got away well and held to the lead to the quarter, where he jumped and fell back. Evelyn W. and Ross K. were in close order with Independence Boy trailing and they passed the half and Vernon McKinney came again on the last turn, only to break after passing the three quarters and run the rest of the way. Evelyn W. led in the stretch and Independence Boy came after her, but he could not make the grade, breaking at the end, while she won in 2:03½.

It was in this heat that the wonderful time was done. The board showed that they were at the half in 1:03 and the three-quarters in 1:35, a 2:12 gait. The finish was marked 2:03½, so the last quarter was in 28½ seconds. Good timers in the boxes made the mile from 2:04½ to 2:05.

The distancing of Vernon McKinney was a bitter pill to some of the speculators and the beating of Independence Boy was no consolation, as they flocked to this one to save them selves. Evelyn W. rushed away with the party in the third heat and Don Densmore was the contender.

In the stretch Don Densmore gave it up and Independence Boy came again, but Blank had no trouble winning with Evelyn W. in 2:04½, announced time, although the outside watches made it a second slower.

ANVIL HAMMERS FIELD

But four were in the 2:09 trot and the race was between two of them. Anvil had been selling at \$200 against \$40 in the auctions on what he did last week to the new girl from the Golden West. Geers went right to the front with Anvil and he was at the quarter in 30 seconds and at the half in 1:04, a length to the good of Helen Stiles, while Gray Gem was that far back of her.

Helen Stiles got up to Anvil's wheel at the three-quarters and when

he reached the stretch, Durfee gave her a drive. He lifted and held the mare's head up and she kept gaining until she got to Anvil at the distance, then beat him about a length, the last quarter in 30½ seconds, and the mile in 2:06½.

This was a stunner all along the line, for Anvil was supposed to be up to a mile in 2:05 on such a track. The horse did not like the whipping "Pop" had given him and jumped in the scoring, but got away all right, Helen Stiles having the best of the start.

At the eighth, Anvil made a break which lost him any chance, and Helen Stiles merely jogged the rest of it, Anvil running again when he reached the backstretch. Durfee took her up to a walk at the end to let the others inside.

2:12 PACE

The 2:12 pace had nine in the field and Sadie Hal was a strong favorite at \$125 against \$70. Mansfield selling for \$15. In the first heat Sadie Hal and Star Russell were the leaders and when they got to the stretch Star Russell broke along, beating Snow's mare easily in 2:10½, five seconds slower than she has shown.

The judges had a talk with Snow after this and the time in the next heat was somewhat different, as Sadie Hal went down to the quarter in 29½ seconds, with Stetbrino Lad lapped on her. She had a bigger lead at the half. Storm and several others being behind the pair, and Cox in fifth with Mansfield.

The others closed up on the turn and when they got into the stretch Cox came sailing by with his pacer, winning in 2:05½, a drop of five seconds. Sadie Hal broke near the end.

COX SHOWS THE WAY

Star Russell was lame and was drawn and the remaining heats were like the second, Cox waiting until they reached the three-quarter pole, then coming around and pacing over them in the stretch. In the second and third trips he made the last quarter in better than 29 seconds, and the fourth heat was easier.

Esther W. sold at more than two to one in the 2:12 trot and gave the favorite players a fine scare. Oakdale and Derby Boy led to the head of the stretch in the first mile and then Esther W. trotted by them. She broke in the second heat, the same pair leading until the stretch where Murphy got in the game with Jack London and beat them to the wire.

Esther W. jumped again in the next heat which resulted the same, Jack London being about all in at the finish in 2:12½. After the others showed the way to the half in the fourth heat Cox rushed by them with Esther W. and she had the track all to herself. She won the fifth just as easy and those who had been loyal to Cox were all smiles while others were a blank look.

The mating ends tomorrow the biggest success ever held on the track. The free-for-all trot with Grace, Billy Burke, Grace Girdle, Gold Dollar and Don Labor is the feature of the four races.

HERMAN SAYS
SWEENEY TRADE IS
OFF PERMANENTLY

Impossible to Reach Satisfactory Terms
With Boston—Cincinnati would
Like to Have Him

Cincinnati, July 25—Although Pres Herrmann of the Reds considers Bill Sweeney of the Boston one of the greatest ballplayers of the country and would listen to almost any overture for a trade that would bring him to the Cincinnati team yet he has made no advances to any member of the present management of Boston with the idea of securing Sweeney.

"I see," said Herrmann "that there has been a resurrection of the dead effort to secure Sweeney from the Boston when Pres Russell was at the head of that team. Neither I or any of my associates on the 'directorate' of the Cincinnati Club has made a suggestion to Pres Ward or any other official of that club for an exchange of players that would land Sweeney in our camp. Before Russell died we did make an effort to get Sweeney in a trade involving Egan and a cash consideration. Since then there has been no effort by either side to make a trade. The story that we are to get Sweeney for Mitchell Egan and Grant has no truth in it. Sweeney is a good man and I wish we had him, but there is no deal on."
