BULGARIAN SCORED A GREAT VICTORY OVER THE TURKS

(Continued from page 1)

Luleburgas before the battle was of immense advantage to the Bulgarians as it furnished them with more facilities for the transport of their troops and supplies to the district where the fighting took place.

Athens, Greece, Nov. 1.—The Turkish battleship Feth Bulend was sunk during last night in the gulf of Saloniki by a Greek torpedo boat.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Nov. 1.—The Turkish cruiser Hamidish, discharged nine shells yesterday at the Cape Mine Lighthouse between the Bulgarian ports of Burgas and Varna. The lighthouse was damaged. The Bulgarian government intends to protest against the bombardment of a building devoted solely to peaceful purposes.

HAD MANY KILLED

London, Nov. 1.—Describing the defeat of the Turks at Kaillar Macedonia a despatch to the Chronicle says they left 2,000 dead, while five hundred were taken prisoners. Seven guns fell into the hands of the Greeks.

The main body of the Greek army is now marching in force to attack Saloniki.

TURKEY WILL MEDIATE

Paris, Nov. 1.—The Matin publishes an interview with Noranhuigar Abdar the Turkish foreign minister who is quoted as saying:—

"Turkey cannot lay down her arms until she is victorious, however, if Europe intervened with an offer of mediation we are ready as in the past, to follow the advice of Europe. We cannot forget that we participated in the labors of the Conference at the Hague and today as yesterday we shall not disavow a single one of the dispositions adopted at the conference to which we placed our signatures."

"M. Poincare will find that Turkey will not stand in the way if he takes up the courageous task of attempting to re-establish peace. Tomorrow as today, we shall show the great powers of the west that peace has no supporter more loyal than Turkey."

A GREAT FIGHTER

Sofia, Nov. 1.—Gen Sazoff, the commander of the victorious Bulgarian forces received his military training in Russia. He is the organizer of the modern Bulgarian army and played a brilliant part in the war of 1885. He served as minister of war in the cabinet of 1903 and 1907. King Ferdinand selected him just prior to the outbreak of hostilities to take command of the army.

BATTLE LONG AND BLOODY.

Sofia, Oct. 31.—News of the defeat of the Turkish army was received here last night with a feeling of great relief and without noisy demonstration. Confidence in the success of the Bulgarian arms had been mixed with great anxiety because of the lack of news for the last two days. The people are now looking forward to Bulgaria becoming a great power in the Balkans, as Turkey formerly was.

It is understood that the fighting has been of the fiercest character, even night affording no intermission. The Turks suffered severely. Many were captured and great numbers of dead were left in the field.

News of the capture of Nazim Pasha's headquarters at Tchorlu has been eagerly awaited. Little has been heard from the Bulgarian left wing, which stretches from Bunsarhissar to Midia. In this territory the Turks greatly outnumber the Bulgarians, who have been only just able to hold

their own. Any slight success which the Turks obtained there, however, was of no material importance.

The Bulgarian victory was due to superior strategy performed with the extreme energy of their offensive movement. It appears that the object of the rapid advance early in the week on Visa and Midia was not really to outflank the Turkish right, but to mislead the Turks. The Turks moved their reserves by sea and along the coast to strengthen the right wing which reached to Irandia and directed all their efforts to meeting here what they believed to be the main attack.

It is believed that the total Turkish force numbered 250,000 as compared with 150,000 Bulgarians, the latter being obliged to leave many men around Adrianople.

DIVIDED THE SPOILS

Adrianople still holds out, but is the least important now that the Turks have met their Sedan at Luleburgas. It is believed that a peace settlement will be arranged either by the Porte suing for peace or by intervention of the powers.

An interesting question involving difficult diplomatic problems will immediately arise as to the division of the spoils of war, concerning not only the victorious allies but also Russia, Austria and Romania, and possibly other powers.

BATTLESHIP SUNK

Constantinople, Nov. 1.—The sinking of the Turkish battleship Fethibuleno by a Greek torpedo boat in the Gulf of Saloniki is confirmed in a despatch from Saloniki. The warship sank in five minutes. Part of the crew was on shore at the time so that the number of lives lost is not known.

Athens, Nov. 1.—The Greeks today occupied the Turkish Island of Samothrace in the Aegean Sea. Its population numbers about five thousand, most of whom are Christians.

HOLDS RECORD FOR 1912

New York, Oct. 31.—A London cable says: General Sir R. S. Baden Powell was quietly married to Miss Olive St. Clair Soames at St. Peter's Church, Parkstone Dorsetshire, yesterday afternoon.

The marriage had been set to take place early in December. The ceremony was performed by the vicar the Rev. Hon. Raddelley. Sir Baden and Lady Powell left immediately after the ceremony by automobile on their honeymoon.

"NEWSY" LALONCE AND SMITH BOUND FOR COAST

Cornwall, Ont., Oct. 30.—"Newsy" Lalonde and Donald Smith, who have been spending a holiday between seasons at their homes here, expect to leave in a couple of weeks for Vancouver and Victoria respectively, where they expect to play this winter.

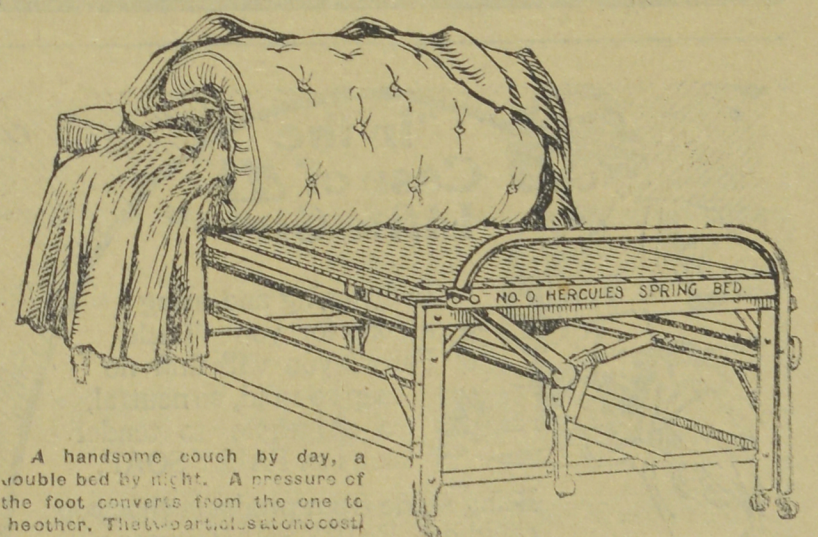
