The liabilities of the company are about \$15,000 and the assets are \$6,000. The appointment of Charles F. Sanford as assignee was confirmed by the creditors.

Gifts of Clergy of Diocese in Memory of Late Bishop Kingdon Have Arrived in City

The new bishop's throne and desk which the clergy of the Diocese of Fredericton have presented to His Lordship Bishop Richardson as a memorial to his predecessor the late Bishop Kingdon have arrived in the city. They are of oak and are beautifully carved. They will add much to the beauty and impressiveness of the interior of Christchurch Cathedral.

The intention now is to have both desk and throne installed in their place in the sanctuary of the Cathedral in time to be unveiled with fitting ceremony on Sunday, November 10. The unveiling is to take place at the morning service and the intention is to have the service of a special and appropriate nature.

HALLOWE'EN WAS QUIET.

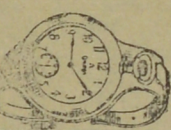
Hallowe'en was very quietly observed last night. Two false alarms of fire were rung in and a few gates and door-steps disturbed but the extra police protection prevented any great damage.

COUPON SYSTEM
FOR SALE OF MILK
NOW IN FORCE

Consumers in Some Cases Refuse to Adopt it--Dealers Urge Increase Cost of Production

The coupon system for the sale of milk goes into effect today, November 1st. What success it will meet remains to be seen. In some instances consumers have refused to take up the new system, claiming that it involves payment in advance and that they are unwilling to make such payment. Some of the milk-dealers have also refused to adopt the system so that it will have a thorny road to travel for a time at least.

The claim is also advanced that the increase in the price of milk to eight cents per quart by agreement among the dealers amounts to a combine and that it is illegal. The City Council although informally appealed to, cannot take up the matter and it seems as if the Public Utilities Commission is the only body which can act.

DEALERS' SIDE.

The milk-dealers have arguments, however, in support of the increased price of milk and of the coupon system of payment. Many of them purchase their milk from farmers and the state the latter have raised the price to them to such an extent that they cannot pay for the cost of distribution and make a fair profit without increasing the price to the consumers. The increased cost of production to the farmer is largely accounted for by the increased cost of feed of various kinds.

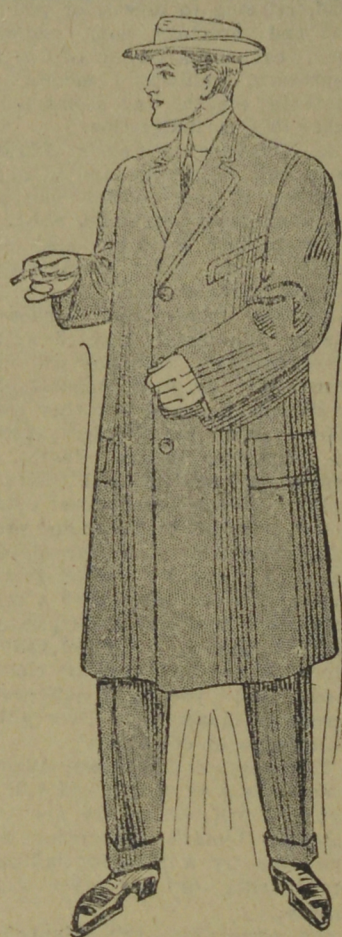

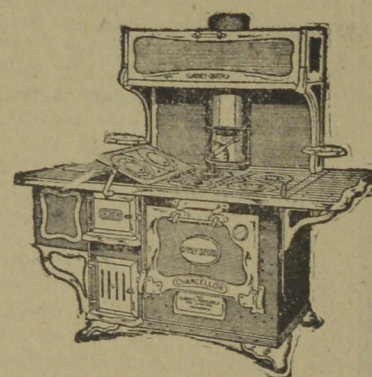

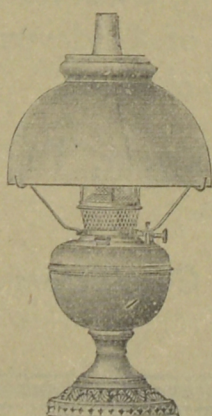
