YOUTHS BALK AT BURYING LIFE PARTNER

The gypsy patriarch, whose face was an embroidery of wrinkles, sat on the doorstep and nodded his head in lamentation. Impatient with anger, he clipped the nose of a prying dog with a well-aimed pebble. The dog howled and fled. The gypsy ran a worried hand through his beard.

"It is a fine thing we are coming to," he muttered. "Our young men want to defy us. They now laugh at our sacred marriage customs. Tears come to my eyes at the thought of how they outrange the memory of our glorious ancestors."

"Yes," chimed in another old gypsy torch bearer. "They go to the dance halls and make monkeys out of themselves dancing the American jazz. They say our dances are too slow for them."

"They lean in front of the pool halls," growled another old man, "and roll their eyes at the giggling girls. This is a fohrateen'sady (mtaoietad). This is a sad day for the gypsies."

Youths Turn Insurgents.

The old men bowed vigorously in affirmation. They sat in the sun today in the little gypsy colony at South Halsted and West 16th streets. Discontent, rebellion and strife had invaded the colony. There were frequent street arguments. The young gypsies have turned insurgents.

"We are tired of the unwise gypsy marriages," they said. "We prefer the American way. We want to pick our own brides. The Americans do not buy their wives, so why should we? We want to marry for love."

The gypsy upheaval came as the result of the arrest in Minneapolis today at the request of the Chicago police, of John Adams and Mary Adams. They, too, are gypsies.

With them was the lovely young gypsy girl, Albina Yans, 16 years old. They were arrested on the complaint of Frank Yans, a well-to-do gypsy living at 1616 South Halsted street. He said they had kidnapped little Albina, the flower of the colony.

Paid \$2,000 for Her, They Say.

The Adams couple told the Minneapolis police, according to an Associated Press dispatch, that they went to Chicago and bought the girl for \$2,000. Albina was to be the wife of their son, Ephraim. To buy the bride is the gypsy custom, they insisted. Now, the girl's father, Frank Yans, wants to get the girl back so he can sell her again, they said. They will fight extradition to Chicago.

Frank Lee, a gypsy friend of the matrimonially inclined Ephraim Adams, today expressed the view of the younger members of the colony.

"The gypsy marriage is no good," he said. "Four times I have bought fine girls. I paid \$25,000 for them. After I pay the money the parents laugh at me and bring their girls back home to sell again. We young gypsies are tired of this horse-trading in girls."

And little Albina? She shrugged her shoulder. For her part, she said, she's willing to carry out her father's bargain. Ephraim has such kind eyes, she said.
