

MARGARET LONG TO GET MENTAL EXAMINATION

ATTORNEY GENERAL
TO NAME DR. ANGLIN

His Honor the Lieut. Governor has asked for a Full Copy of Evidence in Case.

Hon. J. P. Byrne, Attorney General is to issue an order for an examination of Margaret Ann Long of Milford, St. John County, for the purpose of ascertaining her mental condition. This young woman is now confined in the York County Jail here as a jury at the York Sitings of the King's Bench before Mr. Justice Crockett decided that she was acquitted of the charge of causing the death of her new born infant son at the C. P. R. hotel at McAdam, because of insanity. Until it is decided that she is now sane she will be held in custody. Dr. J. V. Anglin, superintendent of the Provincial Hospital, will make the examination of the young woman.

Reference to Lieut. Governor

The case with the finding of the examiner will be referred by the Attorney General to His Honor the Lieut. Governor who has the power of deciding concerning the disposition of the prisoner. His Honor has asked for a complete copy of the evidence in the case and evidently will make a thorough investigation of the facts.

CONTRACTS FOR BRIDGES ARE AWARDED

ALL OF CONCRETE
SLAB CONSTRUCTION

Highway Contracts to be awarded Shortly—No Bridges in this Section of Province.

The Department of Public Works today announced the following bridge contracts awarded by Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister:

Jones Brook, Parish of Newcastle, awarded to James E. Walsh & Sons, Strathadam, Northumberland. Price about \$12,000. The bridge is a twenty-foot reinforced concrete slab with concrete abutments.

Chappell Bridge, Westmorland Parish, Westmorland County, awarded to D. M. LeBlanc, St. Anselme. Price about \$10,400. The bridge is a twenty-foot reinforced concrete slab with concrete abutments and approaches.

Hatfield Bridge, Parish of Norton King's County, awarded to N. J. La-hood & Co., St. John. Price about \$3,000. The bridge is a fourteen-foot reinforced concrete slab with approaches.

Highway Contracts.

Contracts for highway construction in various parts of the province have been under the consideration of the Minister, Hon. P. J. Veniot, and the Chief Engineer, B. M. Hill. Tenders closed May 31st. Announcement of awards will be made shortly.

UNEMPLOYED BALANCES HAVE BEEN CANCELLED

MONEY UNDER HOUSING
ACT GIVEN TO OTHERS

Fredericton Grant Fifty Thousand Dollars, Campbellton the same—Government concluded Meeting.

The unemployed balances of allotments made a number of municipalities in this province under the Housing Act were cancelled by the Provincial Government at the monthly meeting which closed here last night. Four or five municipalities had failed to use all the funds for which they had applied.

Fredericton is not one of them and the full amount of fifty thousand dollars allotted to this city will be used. Campbellton was granted an allotment of fifty thousand dollars under the Act. The appointment of E. C. Barry as Inspector of the Fredericton Housing Board was approved.

Conference at St. John.

Hon. C. W. Robinson, Acting Premier, left this morning for St. John where the Provincial Liquor Board is to confer with members of the Government relative to the taking over of stock now in that city.

To Remain in Abeyance.

The Government met Wednesday afternoon after the session of the Board of Education and considered a number of items of business. Hon. Mr. Robinson, announced afterward that no appointments under the Fire Protection Act had been made. A Board of five commissioners is to be appointed, two by the Government, two by the Fire Underwriters and one by the Union of Municipalities. This matter will remain in abeyance until the return of Premier Foster from overseas.

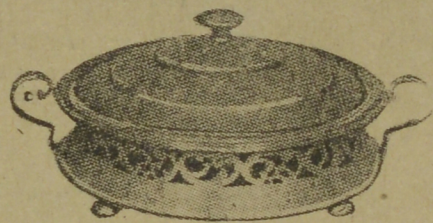
Last night the Government spent the greater portion of time passing the regulations relating to the Liquor Board.

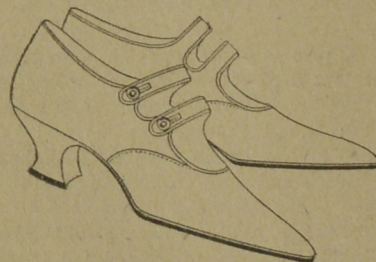
