Montreal, Que., Oct. 21—The Can-
adian Bank of Commerce has an-
nounced that with the regular quar-
terly dividend of 2½ per cent. payable
on December 1st a bonus of 1 per
cent. would also be paid to the share-
holders. Following a similar action by
the Bank of Montreal earlier in the
year, the bonus declaration gives
further indication of profitable busi-
ness for the banking institutions. Com-
merce books will be closed from
November 16th to December 3rd.

NAVY YARDS CONFERR

Washington, D.C., Oct. 21—In ac-
cordance with a new policy adopted
by Secretary Meyer, the command-
ants of all the naval stations and
navy yards in the United States and
of the station of Guantanamo, Cuba
assembled at the navy department
in this city today for the purpose of
considering methods of administra-
tive improvement. It is planned in
future to hold such conferences at
least twice a year with a special
view of co-ordinating the adminis-
trative work of the yards.

OKLAHOMA "U" PRESIDENT INSTALLED

Norman, Okla., Oct. 21—Dr. Strat-
ton D. Brooks, formerly superinten-
dent of the public schools of Boston
was inaugurated as president of the
University of Oklahoma today. The
installation was witnessed by a
large assemblage, including the presi-
dents of many universities and col-
leges throughout the country and
hundreds of alumni and other friends
of the University of Oklahoma. Pres-
ident Lowell of Harvard University,
President Hill of the University of
Missouri and Dr. P. P. Claxton, Uni-
ted States Commissioner of Edu-
cation, were among the noted educa-
tors in attendance.

The new president of the University
of Oklahoma has long been a con-
spicuous figure in educational circles.
He is a native of Missouri and re-
ceived his education at the Uni-
versity of Michigan and Harvard Uni-
versity. Prior to becoming superinten-
dent of the Boston schools in 1906
he has filled similar positions in
Danville, Ill., and Cleveland, O., and
for several years was attached to the
faculty of the University of Illinois.

MR. MONK WOULD NOT BE SILENCED BY A JUDGESHIP

Ottawa, Oct. 20—The breach exist-
ing in the Borden Cabinet has at last
been proclaimed by the Government
organ and the resignation of one or
more of the ministers may be looked
for at any moment. The following
statements which appears in the
Ottawa Citizen, this morning, the
official mouthpiece of the Adminis-
tration in the Capital and which has
been telegraphed to other Conserva-
tive journals throughout the country
bears the imprint of having come di-
rect from the Prime Minister's office
as a means of preparing the public
for further developments.

"There has been much speculation
on the subject of the naval policy of
the Government and with regard to
Hon. F. D. Monk's position. While
no official statement can be procured
it is understood that the position of
affairs is substantially as follows:—
Mr. Monk is convinced that the situ-
ation which confronts the Empire at
this time is grave and even critical.

"But he is earnest and even insist-
ent in his opinion that no assist-
ance should be given by Canada, even
as an emergency contribution, with-
out referring the question to the
people.

"There is good reason to believe
that the latter view is not shared by
the Prime Minister, who believes the
situation demands immediate and
effective aid."

It hears every ear mark of hav-
ing been inspired by Premier Borden
and is couched in his favorite phrase-
ology. It evidences the continual dif-
ficulty experienced by the coalition
Conservative-Nationalist Cabinet in
dealing with the Naval and other
questions difficulties which for over
a year have prevented the Borden
Government from making any pro-
gress or enacting any useful legisla-
tion.

Incidentally it strikingly proves the
political presence of Sir Wilfrid
Laurier, who during his recent tour
of Ontario, unhesitating put his finger
on the sore spot in Canada's
affairs today. Wherever he spoke Sir
Wilfrid unsparingly denounced the
unholy alliance between the Con-
servatives with their strong Imperial-
istic Naval Policy and the Bourassa-
Monk-Nantel-Pelletier Nationalist
combination with their no navy, no
contribution cry.

Day after day announcement of the
opening of Parliament has been look-
ed for but just as often has been
put off till another day because the
friction in the Cabinet steadily in-
creased. It was hoped by the Con-
servative leaders that a compromise
might have been effected and the Hon.
Mr. Monk silenced by a judgeship.
But it has become apparent that the
Nationalist leader cannot be bought
off in this way and resignations have
therefore become the inevitable alter-
native.

It looks as though Mr. Monk would
insist on carrying out his National-
ist pledges of absolute opposition to
any Naval scheme without a reference
to the people even to the extent of
publicly taking this position in
Parliament. What will happen then
to Hon. Messrs. Pelletier and Nantel
can only be conjectured, since they
may prefer office to principle. What
is now happening is an absolute con-
firmation of Laurier's humorous de-
scription of the Cabinet meeting—
nothing done, everything quarrelled
about.

During his Ontario tour Sir Wilfrid
illustrated his criticism of the Na-
tionalist-Conservative coalition Cab-
inet with the following imaginary de-
scription of a council meeting:—Mr.
Borden as president of the Council
said "Well gentlemen, now I have
returned from England and this is an
emergency affair. Let's hurry up and
formulate our Naval Policy and get
Parliament together as soon as possi-
ble."

Up jumps Hon. Mr. Monk and says
"Oh, no, We'll have no Naval Policy,
no contribution."

Then comes Hon. Mr. Foster our
own George Eulas, and he says "But
we must have a big navy and a
contribution too."

"No, no," chimes in Hon. Mr. Pelle-
tier, "we will have no Navy, no con-
tribution."

The fellows Colonel the Hon. Sam
Hughes and he says "But we must
have Dreadnaughts and a contribu-
tion too." The people of Toronto
and Ontario expect it, we all want
it."

Mr. Monk "But it was understood
that nothing would be done without
an appeal to the people."

And to this Col. Hughes replies
"Why take chances on the people.
Let's go ahead."

And finally Rt. Hon. Mr. Borden,
weary of this endless bickering, rises
and says "Oh, well gentlemen, let's
take up something else. We will deal
with the Naval matter tomorrow."
And so it goes on day after day.

While that is Sir Wilfrid's imagi-
nary description recent events with
the continual delay in fixing the date
of Parliament's opening and the no-
torious dissensions in the Cabinet,
now culminating in an apparent
Government crisis, show how true
a picture it is of what is going on.

MEETING OF ELECTRICAL MEN

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 21—The fifth an-
nual convention of the Association
of Railway Electrical Engineers be-
gan in Chicago today, with head-
quarters at the Auditorium Hotel.
Electrical engineers employed by
nearly all of the leading railroads of
the United States and Canada are
in attendance.

RAILROADING IN THE CLOUDS

The opening of the Arica La Paz
airline will mark one of the most
notable triumphs of railway engineer-
ing. The vast wall of the Andes,
which stretches for thousands of
miles along the Pacific Coast, has
seemed to defy railway builders. Yet
their genius time and again has
pierced the wall.

A year or so ago the first short
line from the Pacific to the Atlantic
was signalled by the railway through
the Uspallata Pass, which joined the
systems of Chile and the Argentine
Republic. Other lines climbing right
into the heart of the Andes had been
built in Peru and Ecuador. There
was also a winding line from Anto-
fagasta up from Chile to the Bolivian
tableland and the Peruvian route by
way of Lake Titicaca. But the La
Paz Arica line is by far the short-
est. A great advantage will be for
passengers to be able to get from the
coast to the heart of Bolivia in the
midst of the perpetual snows of the
Cordilleras in about fifteen hours.

The Arica La Paz line starts from
Arica, or rather from Tacna, for
there has been a line across the val-
ley from Arica to Tacna on the edge
of the sandy desert for many years.
