POTATO PRICES

The local market today (Thursday) is from \$1.10 to \$1.15 per bushel for potatoes, with few exceptions. The crop in this section of the country is about two-thirds harvested and the farmers are bending effort to secure the balance before freezing weather sets in which he has accounts for the light offerings. North net more than 50 per cent. of the crop is yet harvested and unless the weather man is exceedingly kind many tubers will be frozen in. Pickers are exceedingly scarce and command very high wages. —Houlton Pioneer.

MUNICIPAL OFFICERS
APPEAL FROM CITY
ASSESSMENT

Sheriff W. T. Howe and Deputy Sheriff J. F. Timmins Take Matter to Supreme Court--Claim They Are Non Residents

Sheriff W. T. Howe and Deputy Sheriff J. F. Timmins have appealed to the full bench of the Supreme Court of the province in the matter of assessment by the City of Fredericton. The appeal is under the city assessment act of 1907 and is the first of the kind that has been made. Mr. F. St. John Bliss, county secretary treasurer, is acting as solicitor in the matter. This morning copies of the papers in the case were served upon the members of the board of assessors of the city and upon other interested parties.

The case is a most interesting one and its course will be followed closely by the general public. The hearing is to be on November 9. A certain section of the act exempts municipal and provincial officials not resident in the city and the claim advanced by the appellants in this case is that they come under this section and the point to be decided will be whether or not they are resident under the meaning of the assessment act.

The appeal was first made to the assessors and refused. It next was made to the city council, who dealt with it in similar fashion. Application was then made before Judge Barry with the result mentioned.

NEW ORGANIST OF

Very Rev. Dean Schofield this morning announced that Mr. Samuel Jessop had been appointed organist of Christchurch Cathedral in succession to Mr. J. Stanley Farrer, who is removing shortly to New York. Mr. Jessop at present is organist at St. Peter's Church, Lancaster, Pa. He is an Englishman and comes to Christchurch Cathedral most highly recommended by several well known English clergymen.

Rev. A. W. Jepson, minor canon and precentor of Rochester Cathedral, England, speaks in highest terms of Mr. Jessop's work as organist, pianist and teacher of voice culture. Christchurch Cathedral has done well for Fredericton in bringing to the city one who will be a noteworthy addition to its musical talent.

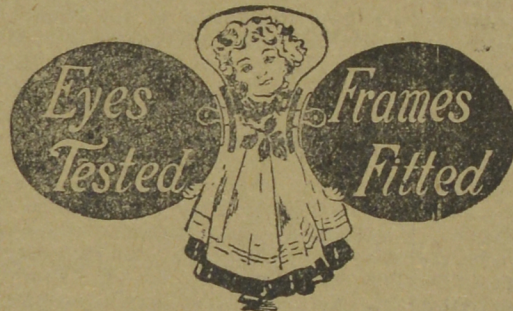

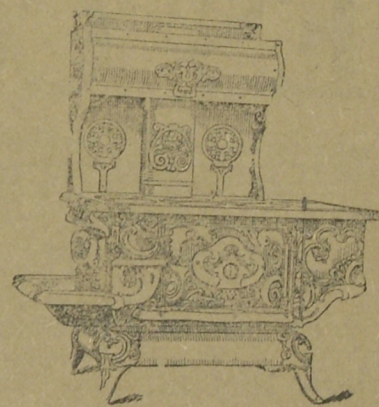
