to convert their English cheques into Canadian money at the Militia Department in Ottawa at the ordinary rate of exchange, \$4.86.66 per pound. As the English money has for some time been at a substantial discount on this side of the ocean, this privilege was a valuable one to the soldiers. The difference between the current value of the English money and the ordinary value was, of course, a charge against the Canadian treasury. In any case, this would have amounted considerable, but if the transactions had been confined to bona fide cases of soldiers' pay and allowances, the benefit allowed to the soldier would not have called for adverse comment. It appears, however, that some shrewd fellows who approached the Militia Department in such transactions discovered that there was no system of testing the character of the cases arising, and that anybody who presented English money to the Department, representing that it came from "pay and allowances," was without further enquiry permitted to convert it into Canadian currency at the \$4.86.66 rate, and thus reap a handsome profit. Very large transactions of this kind took place before the Militia Department discovered that it was being defrauded. Just how much the country lost by the fraud has not yet been disclosed, but there is reason to believe that the amount is quite large. How transactions of this kind could be carried on for many months, in the face of the numerous officials of the Militia Department and the large organization of the Government for auditing, is not easy to comprehend. Evidently there is much need of a shaking up the accounting machinery in the Government offices at Ottawa.

It may possibly be regarded by some as a comforting fact that all the errors in the accounting branches of the Militia Department are not against the Canadian treasury. The a statement made in the British House of Commons last week it appears that the British Government's accountants have discovered that Canada has improperly claimed and received from the Mother Country large sums of money on account of timber sales. The method employed seems to have been to charge the price of certain timber twice. The British Government are claiming and no doubt will receive a refund of the amount unjustly taken from the Mother Country. This transaction also must call for rigid investigation at Ottawa.
