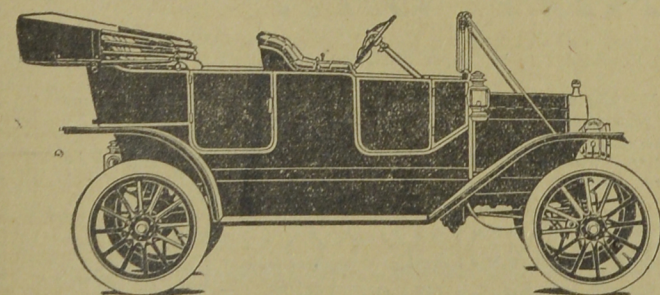

DEBATE ON THE BUDGET FINISHED EARLY TODAY

exceeding the cost with the cost of improvements the idea of profit being entirely eliminated. A payment of 25 per cent. of the purchase money would be required as an initial payment when possession was given to the purchaser and ten years would be given to pay the balance of the purchase money on installment with a low rate of 5 per cent. interest. It was also provided that if the settler was unfortunate the Board could in special cases grant an extension of two more years for the period of payment.

There was also provision that suitable sections of crown lands could be granted to the board by the surveyor general upon the order of the lieutenant-governor-in-council. It was not expected that action under this provision would be taken at the start but there were crown lands in the province suitable for settlement purposes and which had been denuded of lumber growth which it was felt that eventually the board might improve for intending settlers. In the crown land office he had recently had a request to have a survey made of a block of six or seven thousand acres in Northumberland County which had been reported as good agricultural land. It was situated between two settlements and would no doubt be opened up at an early date.

The bill provided that the title of land taken over by the board would remain in the board until all payments had been made. The board was authorized to borrow \$100,000 for a period of twenty years at 4 per cent. interest and it was not proposed that this should be added to the permanent debt of the province, but the loan and interest should be repaid in payments of \$5,000 annually out of the current revenue of the province. He hoped that the plan would work so successfully that more than \$100,000 would be needed. In Australia and New Zealand similar plans are in operation and are proving highly successful. There they give as long as twenty-five years to repay the cost of the properties and in Western Australia alone upwards of \$19,000,000 has already been loaned on this plan. Some hon. member might offer the objection that if the plan did not work out successfully, it would result in the loss of \$100,000 to the province, but that was not correct because in the purchasing of properties the board would get good values and the province would still own the land until all payments were made.

He had had an interview with Mr. Norton Griffith who was greatly interested in this proposal and who said that if there were ten or as many as twenty ready-made farms ready by the first of June he would have the required number of families here to settle upon them. Mr. Norton Griffith had the broadest vision of empire-building and saw that English families could be brought here, become their own landlords and at the same time the time honored institutions of the British empire.

A capable man with an extensive business experience would be necessary to take general supervision of the work planned under this bill. It was proposed to pay the members of the board a per diem allowance for when they were engaged in their duties and thus it would not require very much money to pay their expenses. But the practical business man who would be engaged as super-

intendent would need to be a well paid and highly competent official as the success of the plan would depend very largely upon him. He had discussed the inauguration of this policy with the minister of the interior at Ottawa and Hon. Mr. Rogers had informed him that the Dominion government intended doing for Eastern Canada what had been done in the past for the west to attract people from the Old Country. There were two sides to the question; the first was to get the people and the second was to take care of them when they arrive here. If 5,000 people came to New Brunswick this spring the province could not handle them because they have not the organization necessary to do so and this plan makes preparation for handling the people who come here. Hon. Mr. Rogers had assured him that the Dominion government would, on recommendation of this government appoint the official who would be the superintendent and would pay him his salary and travelling expenses, which would amount to about \$4,000 per year, which was equal to the interest on \$100,000, which the province would pay for interest on the funds with which the board would operate. Hon. Mr. Rogers had also promised to have one of the department's publicity men prepare a pamphlet on the ready-made farm plan of New Brunswick and these would be circulated in large numbers at all the agencies of the federal government in Great Britain. In Ontario, under a similar plan, ten-acre lots with cottages in the district known as the Thames Valley were being sold at \$600 and were being readily taken up by settlers at the prices at which the land settlement board would be able to secure properties in this province, the propositions which would be offered to settlers would be of the most attractive character as the prices would be low and the possibilities great. He thought that the members should enter most earnestly into the consideration of the bill and he invited suggestions from hon. members on either side of the House.

Hon. Mr. Flemming said that Mr. Bowder, the province's immigration agent in Great Britain, was in the city and would address the members of the House in the Assembly Chamber at 5.30 o'clock.

The House went into committee with Dr. Morehouse in the chair and agreed to the bill to confirm the agreement between the City of St. John, the C.P.R. and His Majesty the King.

The bill to incorporate the St. Croix Dock and Railway Company was under consideration when the committee took recess at 5.30 o'clock.

In the evening Hon. Mr. Flemming continued the debate on the budget and was followed by Hon. Messrs. LaBillois, Bentley, Upham, Burgess, and Copp in the order named.

At an early hour this morning the House divided on the amendment which was lost on the following vote:
