MR. COPP'S SPEECH

The speech of Mr. A. B. Copp, M. P., at the King's County Liberal Convention was one of the most important he has delivered since he took over the leadership of the party. It shows that he has been giving serious attention to the great problems which confront New Brunswick and is prepared to grapple with them in a firm and business-like manner.

Mr. Copp in his speech made two proposals which if carried out will undoubtedly improve conditions in the rural sections of the province, and for this reason should receive the hearty support of the farmers. He proposed to assist the farmers by long term leases upon the credit of the province, at low rate of interest and on easy terms of repayment and he also proposes to give an improved rural telephone service at a reduced cost. These proposals if carried out—and they will be carried out if the electors of the province put Mr. Copp and his friends into power—will add to the attractiveness of life on the farm, keep our young people at home, and consequently be of untold benefit to the province.

Mr. Copp's plan is as far ahead of Premier Flemming's ready-made farm scheme as day is ahead of night. Mr. Flemming proposes to bring in outsiders, provide them with farms, and assist them to operate the same. Mr. Copp proposes a plan to encourage and assist our own farmers by making it possible for them to obtain cheaper money in order to increase the output of their farms. The money will not be absorbed by salaried officials but will go directly to the farmer. Mr. Copp realizes as we all realize, that agriculture is the backbone of New Brunswick, and if it is established on a firm basis, all other interests must share in the benefits. His proposal is an intensely practical one and will appeal to the great majority of those who have the real interests of the province at heart.

A CHANGE OF TUNE

The local Tory organ evidently did not consider the great victory achieved by the Liberals in Quebec on Wednesday of any great importance to its readers and therefore omitted publishing the details in its columns. In a brief editorial reference to the event, however, it said: "Sir Lomer Gouin has again led his party to success and will meet the Legislature with a practically unimpaired majority. Premier Gouin had given a fairly satisfactory administration of provincial affairs * * * The opposition leader, Mr. Teller, was somewhat at a disadvantage during the campaign as he was not generally personally known throughout the province."

Now, just for the fun of the thing compare the above with the following extract from an editorial which appeared in the same newspaper on April 18th:

"The Gouin government, while strong in the Legislature is particularly a one man government and THERE IS LITTLE IN ITS RECORD ON WHICH A POPULAR APPEAL CAN BE MADE TO THE CONSTITUENCIES * * * There is, therefore good reason to believe that the Gouin administration will go before the people under disadvantages which will prove TOO GREAT FOR IT TO OVERCOME. On the other hand THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY IS NOW IN FINE FETTER, AND FULL OF HOPE AS TO THE OUTCOME. IT HAS IN MR. TELLER, A LEADER WHOSE MENTAL STRENGTH AND HIGH CHARACTER ARE GENERALLY ADMITTED AND WHOSE ACTIVITIES IN THE LEGISLATURE HAVE COMMENDED HIM TO THE PARTY AS A COURAGEOUS AND RESOURCEFUL CHIEFTAIN. * * * Taking everything into consideration there is good reason to believe that next month will find a change in the administration in control of the affairs of the province."

"The courageous and resourceful leader," was let down by the electorate with a terrible thud, and they decided that a change in the control of the affairs of the province was not yet due.

Kings County Tories in convention on Tuesday nominated Hon. J. A. Murray, George B. Jones and Hedley A. Dickson. Mr. Fred M. Sproul, who has represented the county for four years, announced his retirement from provincial politics on personal grounds. It is understood that he is slated for the office of registrar of deeds.

The Liberals of King's county in convention yesterday nominated Dr. G. N. Pearson of Sussex, Col. C.W. Wetmore of Clifton and Mr. S. H. Flewelling of Hampton. The ticket is an exceptionally strong one and will be certain to restore the old county to the Liberal column.

Four Tory cabinet ministers, Hon. George E. Foster, Hon. Frank Cochrane, Hon. O. D. Hazen and Col. Sam Hughes have visited Fredericton within the last ten days. And still there are a lot of good Tories who have not yet been provided for.

Hon. Mr. Foster says that the patronage system under Tory rule is something damnable. The Hon. George speaks from personal experience.

Col. Sam Hughes during his visit to the city yesterday was too busily engaged with the patronage seekers to give an interview on the Quebec election.

Hon. Frank Cochrane's inspection trip through the Maritime Provinces was about as beneficial to the Tory party as frost would be on a buckwheat field.

A brother of Archbishop Bruchesi bobbed up as Tory candidate for the Legislature in a Montreal constituency and was soundly beaten.

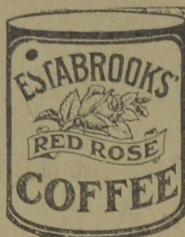

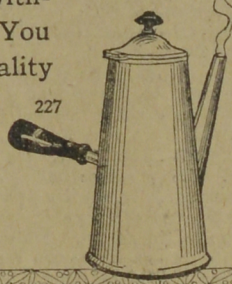

BRITAIN THREATENED BY NITRIC-SODA FAMINE

London, May 18—A new danger threatens England, according to Sir William Ramsay. 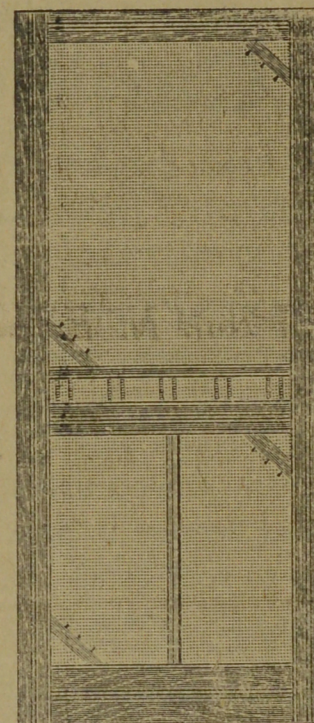
