## J. L. FEENEY RECEIVED ADDRESS FROM A.O.H.

Mr. John L. Feeney, B. Sc., who lately resigned the position of City Engineer here to accept a position under the Dominion Government in connection with the Courtenay Bay developments at St. John, will leave here on Monday to enter upon his new duties.

At a special meeting of Division No. 1, Ancient Order of Hibernians, held at the Division Rooms, Regent Street last evening, Mr. Feeney was presented with an address accompanied by a handsome travelling bag.

The address which was read by Mr. D. J. Shea, president of the Order in this city. Mr. Shea also made the presentation on behalf of the Division.

Mr. Feeney made an appropriate reply to the kindly feelings which always had existed between himself and the other members of the Division and to the regret which he felt at being obliged to make a change in his field of labor. He also expressed his thanks for the gift and for the sentiments expressed in the address which accompanied it.

Speeches were also made by several members of the Division, all of whom expressed their regret at Mr. Feeney's departure and paid tributes to his high character as a citizen and his good standing as a member of the Hibernians.

The address was as follows:

To John L. Feeney Esq., B. Sc., lately City Engineer of the City of Fredericton.

Dear Sir and Brother:—The officers and members of Division No. 1, York County, Ancient Order of Hibernians, of which division you have been a valued member, and in whose charitable and benevolent work you have always exhibited the liveliest interest, on the eve of your departure from your boyhood's home for the purpose of entering upon a wider sphere of activity in the line of your chosen profession, desire to give expression in this public way, to the feelings of satisfaction they entertain in reference to your rapid advancement in your profession; and also to congratulate you upon your appointment as an engineer in connection with the great harbour improvements now being inaugurated in the neighboring City of Saint John.

During your boyhood we watched with interest your career in the public schools, and afterwards at the University of New Brunswick; and then, upon your graduation from that institution we hailed with pleasure your appointment—while yet almost a boy—to the responsible and onerous position of chief engineer of the public works department of your native city. That you have ably and well performed the duties of that position is amply attested by the public officials with whom your work brought you in direct contact; that you have so performed them, will, we feel assured be everywhere accepted as a guarantee that in the larger field of usefulness upon which you are now entering, you will be actuated by the same conscientious motives and be guided by the same desire to do right, that characterized your administration of the office you are now vacating.

But, while we rejoice in your professional advancement and join in offering you our congratulations, through them all there runs a minor chord of sadness—regret that your new appointment necessitates your removal from our midst and means the severance of the many social and fraternal ties and the pleasant associations that have marked the relations existing between you and the brethren of this Order.

It has been said that the twentieth century is Canada's. In the two, or three, or four decades of her future there is, in the opinion of statesmen and economists, no one who will be called upon to play a greater part in her development than the Engineer. And, we think it also can be said with truth, that no country in the world today, offers larger opportunities for a successful career for the Engineer, than Canada. If your work, since entering upon man's estate, may be regarded as a fair index of the future, we can rely with confidence upon your name being found enrolled amongst the names of the most successful.

As the young brood must sooner or later quit the parent nest, so it seems to be inevitable in the order of things, that, in order to embrace the wider opportunities and greater advantages opening and offering elsewhere, the day comes in the lives of many of our young men when they perforce, are called upon to sever the home ties and bid adieu to their earlier associations. And while we regret to lose you from our own circle, which is but natural enough, some compensation is afforded us in a knowledge of the fact that your departure comes at a time when a brighter prospect is opening to New Brunswick, and a new era of prosperity and development seems to be dawning upon her people; and that for a time at least, your professional

abilities will be preserved to our own province and directed along the lines of her development.

We need not assure you as one of our own, that as we have watched your past, so shall we watch your future career with never flagging interest, feeling assured, from an intimate knowledge of your character, that you can always be depended upon to strive after the highest ideals of our race and country, and that you will ever be found true, as the needle to the pole, to the noble watchwords of our order, Friendship, Unity and True Christian Charity.

## RICHESON COLLAPSED NOW UNDER OPIATES

ent during the last few minutes and further exacted a promise that either one or other of the ministers would remain constantly with him until he died.

In the meantime, Richeson did not eat his dinner or supper. It was nearly twelve hours after he learned that he must die next week, that Richeson burst out in a paroxysm of grief and hysteria. Fully clothed the stricken man threw himself upon his cot and moaned and shrieked. His arms and shoulders twitched and shook, his face was drawn in agony and from time to time as his glance fell upon the two guards, set in death watch over him, he would scream out in horror, "They're watching me, They're watching me."

Warden B. F. Briggs was notified and hurried to the death house. He found conditions even worse than he had feared, and sent for the prison physician. He was not at home and Dr. Frederick L. Lyons of Charleston was called.

When Dr. Lyons arrived Richeson was still more or less hysterical, but apparently unconscious. Dr. Lyons administered a sedative and the prisoner went to sleep about 2 o'clock, resulting in a deep slumber until a late hour.

## ALIENISTS SUPPORTED

The attacks follow out the conclusions of the alienists who recently examined Richeson, and who declared that although sane, he was subject to periodical spells of emotional disturbance or hysterical delirium.

It was claimed such attacks would be of short duration. However because of the law governing capital punishment, in this state, the public will not be informed of the exact hour of the execution.

The statutes provide that an execution must be held between midnight and sunrise, within a stated week.

Under this law, Warden Briggs has authority to order an execution in the early morning of any day next week.

marks the final completion of all of the monster protection works undertaken by Galveston since the flood that devastated the city ten years ago. The cost of the works aggregates nearly \$10,000,000.

The annual regatta of the American Rowing Association, popularly known as the American Henley, will be held Saturday on the Schuylkill River course at Philadelphia. The contestants in the several events will include crews from Cornell, Pennsylvania, Princeton, Yale, Columbia, Harvard and numerous smaller colleges and schools.

Famous experts in inland and ocean navigation from all parts of the world will attend the twelfth International Congress of Navigation, which will begin its sessions Thursday in Philadelphia. As a result of the recent Titanic disaster it is expected that the question of safety in maritime navigation will have a prominent place in the discussions.

Other important gatherings of the week will include the annual meeting of the Northern Baptist General Convention at Des Moines, the Interstate Cotton Seed Crushers' Association at New Orleans, the American Unitarian Association in Boston, the National Association of Manufacturers at New York, the Associated Advertising Clubs of America at Dallas, the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis at Toronto, the National Association of Piano Merchants at Atlantic City, the National Society Sons of the American Revolution at Boston, and the Mississippi Valley Conference of Woman Suffragists at Chicago.
