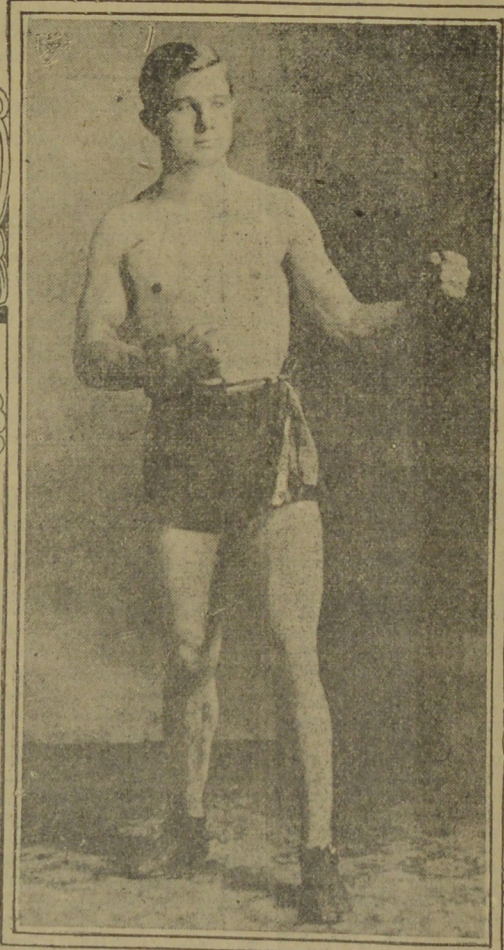

COBB SAYS HE  
LOST HIS HEAD AND  
IS SORRY NOW

Second Season Objectionable Fan got  
 after Tyrus—Indefinite Suspension  
 Penalty Handed out

Philadelphia, May 16—Ty Cobb, the  
 Detroit baseball player, when he ar-  
 rived in this city today expressed re-  
 gret that he had struck a spectator  
 at the American League Grounds in  
 New York yesterday. He said that  
 the spectator was the aggressor,  
 and that the same man had annoyed  
 him on other occasions.

"Yesterday," said Cobb, "I tried to  
 avoid the man, but when his lan-  
 guage became too much for me to  
 stand I lost my head."

The New York rooster who got af-  
 ter me yesterday is the same man  
 who made it unpleasant for me on  
 other trips to that city. He has  
 continually picked me out as the  
 object for his insulting remarks. One  
 day last Summer I remonstrated  
 with the man. I went over to him  
 and had a talk with him and asked  
 him to pass me up. I pointed out  
 to him that I was out there on the  
 field earning my livelihood, and that  
 there was no sense in his getting af-  
 ter me. I told him that he had bet-  
 ter lay off.

"As soon as this man came into the  
 park yesterday he got after me. In  
 order to avoid the man, I walked to  
 the right side of the field toward the  
 New York Club's bench in coming off  
 the field. Still the rooster kept up  
 his tirade."

"Bush asked the fellow to keep  
 quiet, but it did no good. Finally I  
 went to him and told him to quit. As  
 soon as I spoke, he cut loose with a  
 flow of bad language. Then I lost my  
 temper and jumped into the stand  
 and punched him three or four times."

"I am sorry for what I did, but I
