

SALADS AND THEIR DRESSINGS.

Vegetable Fruit and Nut Salad.

Wash and steam for five minutes one pound of dates. Remove the dates from the vessel in which they have been steamed and place in the oven to dry. Then cut them into five lengthwise pieces. This operation will, of course remove the seeds. Chop one cup of hickory nut meats into squares. Chop into small cubes four slices of canned pineapple. Marinate the mixture with French dressing. Serve on leaves of hearts of lettuce. Garnish over the tops with mayonnaise dressing.

Mayonnaise Dressing.

Half teaspoon salt, half teaspoon mustard, speck cayenne, half teaspoon sugar, half cup salad oil, one tablespoon lemon juice, one tablespoon vinegar, one egg yolk slightly beaten, quarter cup olive oil. Add oil to egg, drop by drop at first, beating with wooden spoon or fork till thick. Mix rest of ingredients. A Dover eggbeater may be used after several teaspoons of oil have been added. When mixture becomes too thick to beat well add a little vinegar, then more oil, and so on, till all the ingredients are used. Never add enough vinegar at one time to thin the mixture, or else it is apt to curdle. Should it curdle, take another egg yolk and slowly add curdled mixture to it. Have ingredients cold. Dressing should be of the consistency of stiffly beaten cream, thick enough to keep its shape. As it soon liquefies when mixed with meat or vegetables, it should not be added until just before serving. Half a cup of whipped cream may be folded into dressing, when ready to serve. Mayonnaise may be colored if desired.

Prune Salad.

1½ dozen medium-sized prunes.
¼ cup chopped hickory nuts.
1½ cup cottage cheese.
¼ teaspoon salt.
1 pinch paprika.

Wash and remove the pits from the prunes and soak overnight in a closed vessel. Mix the remaining ingredients (cottage cheese, nut meats and seasoning). Stuff the prunes with this mixture. For each individual salad dish, allow three prunes and place them on a small leaf of cabbage. Serve with French dressing.

French Dressing.

One-fourth teaspoonful pepper, one to three tablespoonfuls vinegar or lemon juice, three tablespoonfuls olive or any vegetable salad oil, one-fourth teaspoonful salt. Paprika or cayenne may be added if desired, also a few drops of onion juice, or bowl may be rubbed with slice of onion, clove or garlic; one-quarter teaspoonful mustard may be mixed with other dry ingredients. Mix dry ingredients, add oil and stir until thoroughly mixed. When add vinegar, a few drops at a time, and beat until emulsion is formed. Or ingredients may be placed in a bottle and shaken vigorously together to form emulsion. Pour over prepared material and toss together until dressing has all been absorbed.

IN HEATING PIES.

To heat pies without burning the crust put the pie into a deep baking dish, filled with hot water, and stand on the oven top till about 20 minutes before wanted; then put in the over to heat the crust. The pie will be as nice as if just cooked.

WHEN EGGSHELLS CRACK.

When boiling eggs wet the shells thoroughly in cold water before dropping in the boiling water, and they will not crack.

system of cramming these things to pass an examination is pernicious. So having been asked for the first time in my life to make an address I made it an opportunity to enter my protest.

The Purpose of Education

"Education is to prepare and equip for the duties and responsibilities of life—not to turn out industrial and commercial bosses gagers timekeeper and cash registers. I would hardly be justified in taking up your time with these observations alone. So, in addition I want to say this: Most of you are destined to be masters of men. You will organize and mobilize your labor, you will oversee it.

"When you see men around you actually creating beautiful things with their hands, I would like you to remember that it was my opinion that actual labor in the arts and crafts and industries is an infinitely nobler contribution to the happiness of mankind than clipping coupons and living on the sweat of other men's brows.

"It will not come in our day, but the world will ultimately come to understand that the training of the mind is as necessary as the training of the body. Why should it be considered an unthinkable thing that a blacksmith or a carpenter should need an education? Why should college men consider it degrading to handle tools and make useful and beautiful things? "Why should a university perpetuate such a revolt against nature in which the man who does no useful work at all is considered a gentleman, and the creator of wealth and beautiful things should be considered low caste, in Anglo-Saxon civilization.

"I want to point out to you that the highest form of culture and refinement known to mankind was intimately associated with tools and labor. In order to do that I must present to you a picture, imaginative, but in accord with the facts of history and experience.

WALES TO
ESCORT HEIR
OF MIKADO

London, April 23—The Prince of Wales will be the constant companion of the Japanese Crown Prince during the early part of the latter's visit. The English Prince will meet him at Portsmouth on his arrival and will take him under his wing for a week. They will visit Aldershot and Sandhurst, where the Japanese Prince will be shown ho whoth British soldiers and officers are made.

Following this the Prince of Wales will go on a long planned tour of the West of England, including his Duchy of Cornwall and his seldom visited property on the Scilly Islands, where he is deeply interested in early fruit, flower and vegetable growing in the mild air of the Gulf Stream.

Admiral the Hon. Sir Somerset Gough-Calthorpe, who is commander in chief at Portsmouth, will have charge of the first reception to the Japanese Crown Prince. He is one of the few British naval officers who have actually commanded a Japanese naval unit, having had a division of Japanese destroyers under him when he was in command in the Mediterranean during the latter part of the world war. He paid a warm tribute to the keenness of the Nippon seamen and was decorated by the Mikado.

The visit of the Japanese Crown Prince is counted as the star feature of the London season, which is promising now, for the first time, to reach pre-war levels of gaiety—if the coal strike is settled. That already has caused the cancellation of many pre-season festivities, but if it is settled there will be three courts at St. James's during May. The first will be on May 4, which will be largely official and diplomatic. There are a large number of debutantes waiting for presentation on May 23 and 24, and at the other courts later in the season.

Fashionable shopkeepers of London accordingly are counting on a revival of trade as soon as the industrial crisis is settled.

THE LOBSTER SEASON.

(Picton Advocate.)

The lobster season opens on the 26th. From the gossip we hear the price paid to the fishermen will range from 4 to 5 cents a pound, as against 10 or a little better last year. The price offered for the fish is not over \$18 a case, with a doubtful market, against \$36 to \$42 a case last year. There are 10,000 to 15,000 of last year's pack in England and many thousand cases on this side of the water. The trouble in the British coal mines will affect the market adversely as the British miners consumed lobsters largely.
