THE RECORD OF ELECTIONS SINCE CONFEDERATION

The date for the general election has been announced for December 6th. This date has never been chosen before, the nearest approach to it being December 17, 1917. When the speed of compiling election returns today is considered, with presses standing in readiness to turn out extras by the tens of thousands a few hours after the voting has ceased, it comes like a glimpse into the far distant past to recall that in 1867 the elections were held from August 7 to September 20. In 1872 it also took from July 20 to October 12. With these two exceptions, the elections have been one-day affairs, and on the following dates:

In the House of 1867 the Conservatives had 101 members and the Liberals 80. Other contests gave the following results:

Probably two of the most outstanding general elections, carrying with them the most striking results, were those when the Government of Sir John A. Macdonald was thrown from power following the publicity that was thrown on the deal which passed into Canadian history under the heading of the Pacific Scandal. Of almost equal magnitude was his return to power, turning an adverse majority of

60 to a favorable one of 66. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's sweep in 1896 was also one of the outstanding elections. He was faced with a House of 123 Conservatives and 92 Liberals, and came back with 117 and 89 Conservatives.

Of more recent date and still fresh in the minds of voters is the contest of 1911 when on the reciprocity election the Liberals were overwhelmingly defeated, to the surprise of Conservatives fully as much as to the Liberals.

BULL DOG MADE TROUBLE FOR PUPILS

New York, Oct. 22—A brindle bulldog made frantic by boys who had stoned him as he lay sleeping in a doorway, ran wild in the yard of Public School 1, Henry and Oliver streets, yesterday afternoon, snapping at children's legs and starting a panic among 200 pupils. Three children were bitten before the animal was captured.

Close by the rear yard where the attack on the children occurred 1,200 other pupils of the school were at play. They heard the screams of those who tried to escape from the bulldog and dashed to safety inside the building. Teachers were knocked down in the rush.

The police were told that boys returning to school from lunch started the trouble by teasing the dog. One of them started throwing stones and the others followed his example. A bit of coal hit the dog on the head and with a yelp of pain he leaped up, bounded across the street and entered the school yard. Persons outside heard the screaming begin almost immediately.

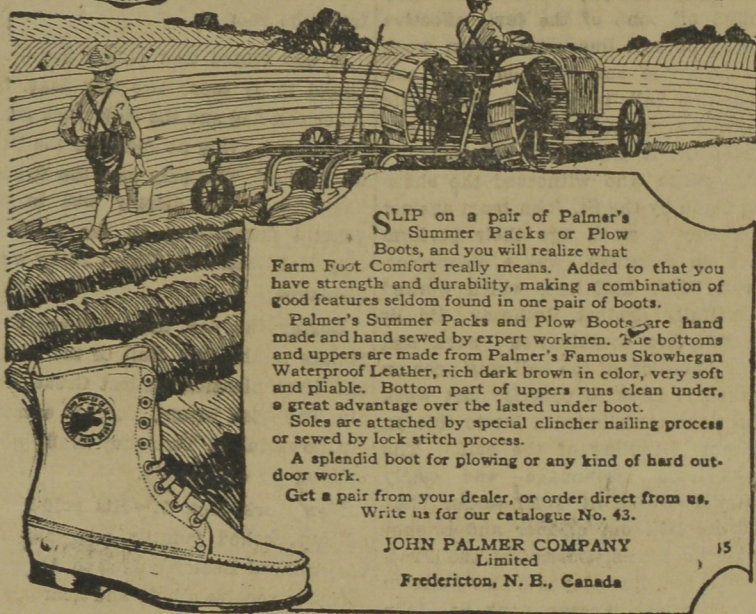
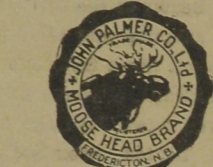
