

UNIVERSITY RUGBY TEAM SHOWS BETTER FORM BEATING MONCTON ONE GOAL TO NIL

Chip Seely Scored in First Half on Long Run and Lounsbury converted—Moncton Men Say Mount A. is Strong Forward but U. N. B. Has Better Back Division—Interesting Match Saturday Afternoon.

U. N. B. beat the Moncton rugby team here Saturday 5 to 0 in a game in which the College team showed better form than it did against St. John although handicapped by the absence of three regular players and a back-field which had to be adjusted to meet conditions. Blind passing in the back-division was one defect. In the scrum the forwards for much of the game were outplayed in heeling but out of touch, dribbling and in the loose showed very well.

Chip Seely was out of place being shifted to left-inside in place of

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Trimble instead of filling his position on the wing. Hagerman and Haines were tried out in the wing position. Seely's speed netted the only U. N. B. score as he went through on a sixty-yard run after the ball was passed on a throw-out from touch. The convert was made by Lounsbury. Willett was in Cain's place at quarter and did well. However if Trimble and Cain had been in their regular places and Seely on the wing the backs would have been much stronger.

Moncton Looked Good

The Moncton team although lacking some regular players looked good. In the second half it hammered the college team hard but failed to penetrate the defence which was better than expected. McLellan a speedy half-back was missing and Moncton claims that their team was greatly weakened by his absence. The visiting forwards packed well in the scrum and in the

later stages of the game had the better of the heeling. Their work was largely spoiled by miffing of the halves after a run would be started. Jack McBeath behind the scrum was as good as ever.

Compared With Mount A.

Moncton having gone up against Mt. Allison twice was in a position to make comparisons. The general opinion was that Mount A. has a line of forwards which is as good as the best in the Maritime Provinces. In the back division, the opinion was that U. N. B. would be the better. Special mention was made by Moncton of the two Ashfords who are third-line scrum players. The fact that Mt. Allison has been able to get five exhibition games already was recognized by the Moncton men to be an advantage. They said that Mount A. was willing to play six games with Moncton alone for experience.

Experiments Tried

The game was used by U. N. B. to try experiments. Brennan was sent in at fullback. On his showing he needs experience. The shifting of Seely to inside half also was an experiment. Among the forwards P. B. Seely, Smith and Rogers were used at times. Moncton agreeing to the use of substitutes. Haines and Hagerman were used in the half-line vacancy.

First Half

U. N. B. got away with a rush. Play was at once in Moncton territory but Jones had a chance to touch-down when the ball was kicked over the line. From the kick Moncton began to improve. Hicks got in some good punting. The ball going out to the Moncton quarters the visitors' halves got chances to get away. The U. N. B. weakness of passing the ball blind began to show itself. In punting U. N. B. showed itself as good as Moncton but there often was a failure to find touch. A cross-kick to Johnson let the speedy Moncton man get away for a gain but an offside lost the ground. U. N. B. still was doing bad passing behind the scrum and had been forced well into their territory when Chip Seely scored on the best play of the day. The ball on a throw-out from touch was sent back to the college halves who passed out to Seely. The latter started down the field and went through the Moncton halves. Jones

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went well over to the touch-line in an effort to get him but Seely dodged and eluded him. He put the ball down where it gave Lounsbury a good chance to convert and he did making the score 5 to 0.

Lounsbury ran the ball back after the kick. The Moncton halves began to get the leather oftener and looked dangerous at all times although the U. N. B. tackling was good. Moncton's weakness soon showed itself in inability to pass the ball along the half-line without fumbling. Referee Burden began to penalize and Moncton suffered heavily for not putting the ball into scrum fairly and for handling in the scrum. With play ten yards off their goal-line Moncton braced up and by runs and kicks relieved. They neglected to observe the ten-yard rule on a return from their full back and another free kick was given. Willett and Slipp combined for a nice gain. Moncton regained the lost ground by effective punting. A fumble by Jones gave U. N. B. a great gain. Efforts of the U. N. B. Halves to get away were stopped by the Moncton tackling. Moncton gained on play out of touch but Dummer, Mackenzie and Lounsbury combined for a long U. N. B. gain. A long dribble let Moncton come back and very ragged work by U. N. B. helped. Half time came with play about mid-field.

Second Half

The second half began with the U. N. B. backs handling the ball poorly. Mackenzie took a fair catch but Moncton blocked the kick. Play opened up with both forward packs getting in good dribbles. The college finally forced the play within five yards of the Moncton goal-line. A long kick to Brennan gave Moncton a big gain. A run by the U. N. B. halves was stopped by a Moncton back intercepting a pass. McBeath took a fair-catch. There was an exchange of kicks to U. N. B.'s loss. Play was along the U. N. B. twenty-five. Moncton halves got away but knocked on. A run soon after was stopped when Haines intercepted. Scovil and Squires made a big gain on a run. The ball again came out to the Moncton halves and Johnson almost ran around the end but Dummer got him near the touch-line. Moncton kept U. N. B. busy defending at this stage. Mackenzie tried to relieve with a punt but his kick was blocked. He recovered the ball himself and held it. A free kick let U. N. B. get up the field again and then the forwards took on new life and gained both in scrum and dribbling. Loose play by the backs let the ball go back again. Play began to go from end to end, Moncton working the ball close to the U. N. B. goal-line by short runs and the college forwards and quarters taking it back. Time was called with play at the U. N. B. twenty-five.

If King's College is played it is doubtful about the game at Moncton.

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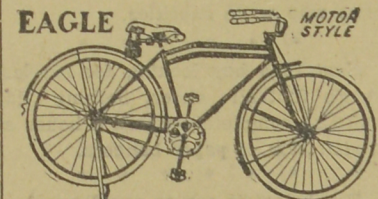
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
