MORE FIGHTING REPORTED IN IRELAND—SEVEN KILLED AND WOUNDED IN NEW YEAR'S RIOT

A POLICE PATROL WAS AMBUSHED

Elaborate Preparations Made for an Attack on the Police Barracks—Several Houses Burned by the Military Near Middleton.

Dublin, Jan. 2.—A constable and a civilian were killed and at least five other persons were wounded in a disturbance last night at Ballybay, County Monaghan. The fighting commenced when a police patrol of four men was fired on, two of them being wounded. Three men coming to their assistance also were fired on, resulting in the death of Constable Malone, and the wounding of another policeman. In a continuation of the fight one civilian was killed and several wounded.

Elaborate preparations had been made for an attack on the police barracks, trenches having been cut in surrounding roads, trees felled and stone barriers erected. A military detachment was despatched from Dundalk as a relief party but was held up by blocked roads and obliged to walk a part of the journey, delaying their arrival until this morning. At Listowel, County Kerry, in the martial law area, crown forces were fired on by civilians while arresting men wanted. They returned the fire, killing one and wounding two, who were captured and sent to a hospital. Five arrests were made.

Seven Houses Burned.
Cork, Jan. 2.—Seven houses in near-by towns and their contents were burned by the military last night as a result of an ambush of the police near Middleton, it was announced today. The story of the incident was related in a statement issued this morning by the military authorities in Cork. As a result of an ambush on the police at Middleton and near Gebe House it was announced, the military governor decided to burn certain houses in the vicinity of the outrage as the inhabitants were bound to have known of the ambush.

DROWNED NEAR CAMPOBELLO

Campobello, Dec. 30.—While on their way from Lubec to Campobello, Harold Denbow and Neal D. Thompson were upset in Lubec Narrows, off Lighthouse Point, out of a ten-foot punt and Thompson was drowned. Denbow was rescued by Fred Wilson and several boys who heard the cries of the men struggling in the icy water. Thompson disappeared before assistance reached him. He was twenty-two years of age and was a returned soldier. He leaves a father and two brothers.

PICTOU MAN MURDERED

Pictou, Jan. 3.—Daniel Barry, a prominent and highly respected citizen of this town, who was found dead in his burning house on Thursday evening, was robbed and murdered. Such was the verdict of the Coroner's Jury which arrived at their decision at 11.30 o'clock tonight.

The murderer or murderers are unknown. The circumstances of the crime are as dramatic and appalling as anything this part of the province has ever experienced. Mr. Barry lived alone. During Thursday he had not been noticed around and neighbors calling in the evening became suspicious that something was wrong. The house being entered it was found that Mr. Barry was lying on a burning sofa, having all the appearance of having been set by sparks from his pipe.

REGISTERED PACKAGE LOST; INVESTIGATION

Post Office Inspector H. W. Woods Expected Here Tonight—Lost Over the Holiday.

Post Office Inspector H. W. Woods is expected here tonight or Tuesday for the purpose of investigating the loss of a package of registered matter of considerable value. The loss is believed to have taken place Friday night or Saturday morning.

Definite information concerning the matter is not being given but it is said that the package should have been placed in the Post Office vault but was not found there when wanted. The statement also is made that strangers who had no business in the Post Office were admitted by a rear entrance Friday night.

BOYS DROWN WHILE COASTING

New York, Dec. 31.—Richard Koln 10 years old, of 18 Dean street, Union Course, Queens, and Harold Mattern, 14 of 1 Dean Street coasted down a small hill on the Forest Park golf course in Queens yesterday and were drowned in Pond No. 19 when the thin ice gave way beneath their sled.

Several boys who had been coasting near the pond saw the sled with the two boys coast down the hill and plunge through the ice. They told the park attendants and word was sent to Park Commissioner Benninger. Mr. Benninger obtained a rowboat and summoned Hook and Ladder Company 135, a few blocks away. Firemen recovered the sled after grappling a few minutes, and later the bodies were brought to the surface.

QUIET OBSERVATION.

Watch Night Services—Curling Match and Racing—Arctic Rink Well Patronized.

Fredericton observed New Year's Day quietly. The customary watch-night service at the Anglican and Methodist Churches ushered in the day. At Christchurch Cathedral Bishop Richardson addressed the congregation.

The theatres and the Arctic Rink drew large crowds. Skating was particularly enjoyed at the rink. The cold weather of the holiday changed quickly Sunday morning when a January thaw set in.

Several Applicants.
Several applications for the position of deputy sheriff of York County have been received by Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne. He has made no selection yet but probably will this week. City Marshal William Hughes was not permitted by the city authorities to take on the duties of deputy sheriff in addition to his own.

Found No Liquor.
Sub-Inspectors Fraser Saunders and W. H. Pinley on Friday afternoon last searched the premises of a furrier in Regent street. Members of the police force accompanied them. No liquor was found. The proprietor had just returned from Montreal with a number of cases of furs and other goods used in his business.

Lost His Roll.
A well known Fredericton man, while on a visit to St. John last week, lost a roll amounting to about two hundred dollars. He made the acquaintance of some friends near the bridge and was cracked on the head by them, according to report. They then took the roll.

THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT WILL CENSURE ALL FILMS TO BE SHOWN IN INDIA

Production of "Broken Blossoms," One of Griffith's Plays, was Objected to by Europeans --- It Extolled the Virtues of London Chinamen and Elaborated on the Brutality of East End Englishmen.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—A censorship of all films shown in India has been ordered by the British government and four officials have been appointed by the Indian office. In the past the entire censorship has devolved on the police, most of whom are Russians, and being of mixed blood themselves, they were susceptible to the same films which are objectionable, as views of Europeans, for presentation before the Asiatics.

Recently Europeans took grave exception to the use of the film "Broken Blossoms" in Asia. It extolled the virtues of the East End Englishman. The picture was by David W. Griffith and was withdrawn from exhibition at Rangoon on protests of Europeans. They urge that the Asiatic Indians see only the type and not the individual and the representation of a European so cast as to reflect on him, lowers the entire European race in the estimation of the natives.

Another picture, made in California, was shown privately in London recently and not released in Asia. It was objected to by Mohammedans and was called "The Virgin of Stamboul," and deals with life in the harems.

The film entitled "Stronger Than Death" has been regarded as hostile to British supremacy in India and was not released in that territory. The sub-titles of "The Dumb Girl of Portici" have been rewritten for use there. One which read "We don't want vengeance, we want liberty," brought such a demonstration at the first appearance that the house was closed.

SAYS THE U.S. NAVAL POLICY MAY CAUSE A RUPTURE WITH JAPAN

The British Press Outspoken in Condemnation of It—If War Broke Out England Would be Compelled to Take Part in It.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—London papers continue to devote much space to the controversy over building warships. Says the Daily Graphic, editorially: "Secretary Daniels' ridiculous policy of trying to build warships will only bring the United States to war with Japan, and if it comes as it must come, unless they have common sense enough to stop, England would have to fight on one side or the other, and to tell the truth, we're getting a little bit sick of the war. It would be the easiest thing in the world were there a diplomatist alive big enough to call together immediately the three powers, Britain, Japan and the United States, all of whom are rather tired of wasting money, to agree on a matter that means more to the world than anything else. Once they called him 'Grape Juice Daniels.' We don't want to have to call him 'Grape Shot Daniels,' do we?"

EX-CHANCELLOR PASSES AWAY

Berlin, Jan. 2.—Dr. Theobalt Von Bethmann-Hollweg, former German imperial chancellor, died last night after a brief illness on his estate at Hohenfinow, near Berlin.

Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg was the originator of the famous reference to the treaty guaranteeing the neutrality of Belgium as a "scrap of paper." The reference was made in a statement before the reichstag in August, 1914, when he gave the German viewpoint of what caused led to the war. He frankly admitted in this same speech that Germany's action in invading Belgium had been morally and legally wrong. He justified it only on the grounds of "military necessity."

A Creditable Number.
The annual New Year's number of the Halifax Chronicle issued yesterday is undoubtedly one of the best publications of the kind ever turned out in the Maritime provinces. It consists of forty-eight pages of live reading matter dealing with business conditions in the sister province. The note sounded by the various contributors to its columns is highly optimistic, and the statistics given go to show that the past year was one of the most prosperous in the history of Nova Scotia. The Chronicle is to be warmly congratulated on its enterprise in issuing such a creditable number.

CANADIANS STRANDED IN OLD COUNTRY

London, Jan. 3.—"There are still on the waiting list 1,563 ex-Canadian soldiers in England seeking repatriation, the majority with no means of subsistence," declared Captain Fiske, administrator of the Claims and the Labor Bureau are doing their utmost but at the best, a maximum of forty monthly only have found employment. We have recently relieved 700 destitute Canadians some of them with families.

The Dominion Government's grant is exhausted and according to Captain Fiske, the Department must close next March unless there is a further grant. Numerous destitute Canadians have appealed for help vainly.

PAYS \$10 FOR EACH BAD WORD

New York, Jan. 3.—John Saleeby, of Brooklyn, throws a wicked vocabulary, according to his wife, Nazera. Mrs. Saleeby had John arrested on the charge that he struck her. Yesterday she begged the magistrate to give her husband another chance to be good.

"We have an agreement between us that every time he uses a bad word he must pay me \$10," she said. "He now owes me \$2,000; but if you'll let him off this time I'm sure he will stop."

"I have no sympathy with wife beaters," said the Magistrate. "I ought to send him to jail, where he would be fed on bread and water, but I'll suspend sentence and put the man on probation for six months."

Death of Mrs. Charlotte Currie.
Mrs. Charlotte Currie widow of Duncan Currie died Sunday evening at the home of her son Raymond M. Currie, 175 Westmorland street, Fredericton. The deceased had been ill but a short time with pleurisy. She was aged eighty-two years and had resided at Macnaquac the greater part of her life. Six sons and two daughters survive. They are Charles of Boston, John of Granite, N. H., Glasier of Kingsclear, Randolph of Prince Rupert, B. C., H. Beadle of Houlton, Me., Raymond of Fredericton, Mrs. Robert Jordan of Kingsclear and Mrs. C. F. Spear of Newport, Me. The funeral will take place Tuesday morning with service at the late home at 10.30 by Rev. P. J. Trafton. Afterward the body will be taken to Macnaquac where service will be held in the Baptist church at two o'clock and interment made.

HER MARRIAGE WAS A ROMANTIC EVENT

Lord Aberdeen was the First to Introduce the Couple—Lady Foster a Woman's Woman—Says She Has Battled for Women All Her Life.

London, Jan. 3.—"Canada is the one place in the world that is a 'coming country,'" says Lady Foster, who was enthusiastic on the eve of her departure for Canada to take up her residence in Ottawa after her marriage, which was the romantic event of the Geneva Conference.

Lord Aberdeen was the first to introduce them, and Hon. Arthur Balfour gave the bride away. The marriage was attended by several cabinet ministers. Lady Foster knows Canada well and confesses that she is "rejoiced to return," adding that she intended returning in any case.

"Canadians are genuine, sound, frank and self-reliant. They do their work splendidly and take their honors simply. They have high ideals and try to make them practical," said Lady Foster, who is essentially a woman's woman. She continued: "I have battled strongly for women all my life and always will. I have endeavored to point out the wrong in taking women of the domestic class to Canada under a false impression that their lives would be all picnics, with piano playing, and marrying wealthy men, when really it is mostly hard work and often loneliness. There is a great present need for organization to promote immigration to Canada. The educated British gentlewoman of moderate means is capable of running a small fruit and chicken farm.

Thousands of ex-service gentlewomen, who learned during the war how to work, are self-reliant and capable, and could with profit come to Canada."

RELIEF WORK FOR IRELAND

New York, Dec. 30.—A committee of United States citizens, which is claimed to be non-political and to have no affiliation with any of the Sinn Fein organizations in the United States, has been formed to carry on relief work in Ireland. It is called the "American Committee for Relief in Ireland."

A preliminary fund of \$300,000 has been underwritten by members of the committee, it is said. The appeal to the public says that it is the object of the committee to meet the "appalling situation" in Ireland and describes conditions in that country in similar vein to statements which have been issued by Sinn Fein propagandists. Senator Walsh of Massachusetts, is spokesman for the committee.

PICTOU MAN LOST HIS LIFE

Pictou, N. S., Dec. 30.—Daniel Barry, for many years a prominent citizen of Pictou, was suffocated to death tonight in his home in Willow street, where he lived alone. He had not been seen during the day, and when neighbors forced open the door of his home tonight they found the place on fire. A returned soldier with a gas mask entered Barry's room and found him dead on a couch. Apparently he had been smoking and set fire to the place. The fire department was called and extinguished the blaze before much damage resulted. Mr. Barry was engaged in the milling business here for many years, and also had considerable investments in various enterprises.
