HOUSE OF COMMONS HAD BUSY TIME OVER THE SPINNEY BILL TO AMEND CIVIL SERVICE ACT

HON. MR. LEMIEUX
GIVES HIS VIEWS

Declares that Canada has gone TOO FAR in the Direction of Reforms—Ottawa the Reno of Canada—Election Jobs were Promised in Yamaska.

Ottawa, June 3.—Objection to giving the civil service commission power to say when it was "in the public interest" to withdraw certain classes of appointments from being filled by the present competitive system employed under the civil service act, kept the commons busy on the Spinney bill, amending the Civil Service Act, for several hours this afternoon and evening.

Hon. R. Lemieux, declaring the bill looked like a return to patronage, opposed it as such, Canada might have moved too rapidly in civil service reform. "We have granted women suffrage and we shall regret it some day," he asserted. "We have provided prohibition in many of the provinces and we already regret it. We have also that thing which discredits the name of the nation—the divorce evil."

We have the record during the present session of one divorce a minute dealt with by the committee of the senate. Sir, it has made of Ottawa the Reno of the northern part of the American continent."

Mr. Lemieux said in connection with the Yamaska by-election that instructions has been given by Hon. P. E. Blondin, to the agent of the marine and fisheries department to give a job to fifteen men from every centre of population in the country on the dredges of the department.

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and naval affairs, said he knew nothing about this; that the dredging was being carried on in the usual way.

BIG ALIMONY ASKED FOR

New York, June 4.—Declaring that her husband makes \$7,500 a year selling fish at Huntington, L. I., and does plastering jobs on the side at \$10 a day, bringing his income up to \$11,000 a year, Mrs. Loretta Gorman applied yesterday to the Supreme Court for \$100 a week alimony pending settlement of an action for separation.

Thomas J. Stapleton her attorney, said Mrs. Gorman has been secretary to Lee Shubert, theatrical manager, for the last three years. She and Thomas Gorman of Huntington were married June 10, 1917, the complaint states. She alleges her husband abandoned her in the summer of 1919 after having treated her cruelly for more than a year. Her petition asks \$1,000 counsel fees also.

E. W. BEATTY, C.P.R. PRESIDENT VISITED CITY

Left Over Gibson Branch—Mayor Reid and Board of Trade representative interviewed Him.

E. W. Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company arrived in Fredericton yesterday afternoon and after a short stay proceeded up the Gibson Branch. President Beatty was on a trip of inspection, and nothing of any importance will develop out of his visit it is thought. At the C. P. R. station Mr. Beatty, Grant Hall, First Vice President of the Company, and Mr. Walsh, Manager of the Quebec Central Railway were met by Mayor Reid, and with R. H. Simonds of the Board of Trade made a short excursion around the City and to the golf links. In all the party was here only about half an hour, boarding the car again at the C. P. R. station. Some time ago the Board of Trade asked for a new station here but as far as can be learned no reply was made to the request yesterday afternoon nor mention made of the proposed new building by the president.

ADVICE FROM WANAMAKER

New York, June 4.—John Wanamaker spoke yesterday at the unveiling of a bust of the late William Booth, founder of the Salvation Army in the main hall of the organization's training college, University and Tremont avenues, The Bronx.

"People should keep only enough to live on comfortably," said Mr. Wanamaker. "Half the wills that are made are broken. Those who possess wealth ought to put their money into good works. They cannot take it to the grave with them."

Thomas Estlin, commissioner of the Salvation Army for the Eastern district, presided. Commander Evangelist Booth also spoke.

MANY FORDS ON THE JOB

Detroit, June 4.—Ford car No. 5,000,000 was turned out Saturday at the Highland Park factory of the Ford Motor Company. It probably will stay in Detroit as part of the museum of Henry Ford, alongside the original Ford car that popped and spluttered uncertainly through the streets of Detroit in the nineties and near several other early models.

Where Nos. 1,000,000, 2,000,000, 3,000,000 and 4,000,000 are now is not a certainty, for they went out into the world like any other Ford.

MUCH INTEREST AROUSED BY A RECENT STATEMENT OF THE LORD CHANCELLOR

Says Refusal of the U. S. to Join the League of Nations Has Falsified the Fundamental Conception of the League—Believed to be more than a Mere Academic Analysis of the Situation.

London, June 4.—Much interest has been aroused by the statement made by the Lord Chancellor at a lecture delivered at Gray's Inn that America's refusal to join the League of Nations has falsified the fundamental conception of the League and that "the question that this country must now face is what attitude should Britain adopt towards the proposal of America for an international court."

A close colleague of the Premier intimated that these somewhat obscure references to the League may be more than a mere academic analysis of the situation and that they should be viewed in conjunction with the attitude of the Government last Friday in refusing to adopt the conventions agreed upon at the Washington Labor Conference last fall.

WOULD BE PENALIZED

A considerable body of opinion exists that the spirit of these conventions has already been adopted and that to go on record as approving the letter of them might disturb many existing industrial agreements and create serious unrest by changing conditions now in force without any obvious benefit to the workers.

These conventions agreed upon at Washington were designed to prove conditions in countries that are far behind Britain in industrial and economic legislation and Britain far from being benefitted would be penalized by having to adopt them. As Premier Lloyd George told the coal conference a few days ago, Britain is unable to enter the world markets today on equal terms with other nations owing to conditions which are in force and which Labor refuses to modify.

It is generally agreed by economists here that the adoption of the Washington conventions would increase the disadvantage under British labors today which two of her keenest competitors in trade would not be obliged to adopt them.

SERIOUS CLASH WITH THE CROWN FORCES EXPECTED SOON IN CORK

London, June 4.—After a period of comparative activity due to the necessity of spring farm work County Cork, Ireland, is making extensive and rapid preparations today for the most serious clash with the armed forces of the Crown that has yet stained the pages of Irish history.

The republican army is today rapidly mobilizing and the only possible interpretation of their activities is an intention to take the field in open fight against the Crown and make a desperate bid for the setting up of a Republican Government. The concentration of rebel units is proceeding in the rugged and almost inaccessible parts of Cork and Kerry and it is estimated that at least one thousand men are today concentrated in the Olydagh Valley and in the hills near Lake Olsen and a similar number on the lonely Valencia Peninsula which is inaccessible to the Crown forces save by the sea, the bridges having been destroyed.

The significance of the news which reached London today is emphasized by rumors that wireless messages in the German language have been intercepted from a vessel now lying off the coast of Ireland which is believed to have come from the United States.

LIVING COSTS GOING DOWN

Berlin, June 4.—The cost of living in Berlin was lower in April, according to figures now available, than in any month since March, 1920, and the minimum for a family of two adults and two children was 281 marks. This was 17 marks and 80 pfennigs, about ten times as little. The fall of the price of rice, fats, shoes and clothing more than outbalanced the increase in the price of bread, potatoes sugar and milk.

MANY EGGS IN STORAGE

Chicago, June 4.—There are sixteen eggs in storage waiting for you to eat them. That is the declaration of Russell J. Poole, secretary of the Council committee on high costs. He advises eating eggs to beat the high cost of living and says there are 1,740,480,000 in storage, or sixteen for everybody in the country.

FOUND WIFE IN THE TOMBS

New York, June 4.—The search of Olaf Gustavson, gardener at the Kellogg Pell country place at Bedford Hills, for Lena Gustavson, his wife and the mother of his six children, ended at the Tombs yesterday when he found her locked up there for shoplifting.

Acting on the suggestion of the Bureau of Missing Persons, Gustavson made a round of the city and county institutions. At the Tombs he was told that Lydia Brown, convicted last week of shoplifting answered the description of his wife. She was identified as Mrs. Gustavson, and a little later, when called up for sentence in Special Session, was committed to Bellevue for observation.

Mrs. Gustavson has steadfastly refused to give any information about herself. Her husband said she had been acting queerly for some time.

HON. MR. FIELDING PROTESTS AGAINST THE MANNER IN WHICH PUBLIC BUSINESS IS CARRIED ON

DECLARATION PROCEEDINGS AT COURT HOUSE

R. B. Hanson K. C., Declared Elected by Majority of 947 Over Ernest W. Stairs

The declaration of the results of the polling on May 28, in the Federal by-election in York-Sunbury, took place at the County Court House in this city this morning. Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne, returning officer, held court with H. G. Fenty as clerk. The official majority of R. B. Hanson, K. C., Conservative candidate, over Ernest W. Stairs, Progressive candidate, was declared to be 947 and Mr. Hanson was declared elected.

The returns differed very little from those announced on election day when Mr. Hanson's majority was figured as being about 950 allowing for errors. His majority on Fredericton was 971 as announced on election day so that Fredericton elected him.

A curious feature was that at the Maugerville poll which is not a large one, twenty ballots were rejected.

TOO MUCH HASTE IS EXERCISED

Proposed Departure of the

Premier for Overseas is no

Excuse he says—The Premier denies that any At-

tempt is Being Made to

Rush Business in the House

Ottawa, June 3.—When the bill respecting the department of customs and excise was called for third reading in the house this afternoon Hon. W. S. Fielding protested against the scandalous manner in which public business was being conducted.

The business of the government had fallen to the lowest stage and because the prime minister was going overseas to attend the conference of British premiers it was no reason why public business should be rushed through with indecent haste.

Other premiers had gone overseas but on those occasions the public business had been conducted with a marked decency.

Mr. Meighen said the attitude taken by Mr. Fielding was most unfair to the administration. "I almost said unfair to myself," Mr. Meighen added. No attempt was being made to rush the business of the house but it was the desire on both sides to carry on with as little debate and obstruction as possible.

"What has the government done that it is indecent?" the prime minister asked. Mr. Meighen said he thought it his duty to stay in Canada until parliament prorogued and he said. There had been no indecent haste and every step was taken with the co-operation of the opposition. The bill was read a third time without further discussion.

LEVY TRIBUTE ON CHURCHES

Chicago, June 4.—Chicago's building grafters have levied their tribute on churches and synagogues, Joseph B. Fleming, counsel for the Dailey Commission, learned today.

According to information from Mr. Fleming's hands, a business agent compelled a South Side priest to pay several thousand dollars in graft before he would allow the electrical work to proceed on a new church building. It was not until the money had been paid that the agents permitted the huge drop lights to be connected and the lights that shone on the altar of the edifice to be installed.

16 SEATS GO BY DEFAULT

Regina, Sask., June 2.—Nominations for the Provincial elections in Saskatchewan closed today with Government candidates returned by acclamation in sixteen of the sixty-three seats. This may be increased later as the results of the nominations in nine constituencies are still to come. The acclamations include three Ministers of the Government: Hon. C. A. Dunning, Provincial Treasurer; Hon. S. J. Latta, Minister of Highways, and J. A. Maharg, whose portfolio is yet unknown.

TWO MORE RESIGNATIONS

Ottawa, June 3.—Hon. N. W. Rowell, member for Durham and J. A. Maharg, member for Maple Creek, have both resigned their seats in the House of Commons.

The resignations will necessitate a bye-election in each case.

The two resignations were not unexpected. Hon. Mr. Rowell announced some time ago that he would resign his seat, while Mr. Maharg has quit to become a member of the Martin Government in Saskatchewan.
