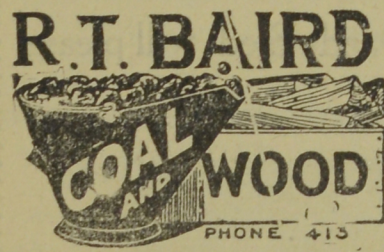

January 12—Willis A. Gorman, governor of Minnesota territory and a civil war commander.

January 12—Jones M. Withers, Confederate general and Mott's newspaper editor.

January 17—Isaac T. Gopnow, founder of Kansas State Agricultural College.

January 25—Francis Harrison Pierpont, a founder of the State of West Virginia.

January 26—General Rufus King, a noted Federal commander.

January 27—William Henry Appleton, a well known publisher of New York.

January 28—Henry Norman Hudson, noted Shakespearian scholar and writer.

February 6—Edward Sorin, founder of the University of Notre Dame.

February 7—George P. Putnam, noted publisher.

February 9—Samuel J. Tilden, statesman and presidential candidate.

February 22—Henry Porter Baldwin, governor of Michigan and United States senator.

February 24—Henry Kirke Brown, sculptor, who designed first bronze statue in America.

March 9—John Evans, governor of Colorado, and for whom Evanston, Ill., was named.

March 12—John C. Ten Eyck, United States senator for New Jersey.

April 5—Samuel Ware Fisher, noted clergyman and president of Hamilton College.

April 12—William D. ("Pig Iron") Kelley, for thirty years a Pennsylvania congressman.

May 18—Sir Adams George Archibald, famous Canadian statesman and administrator.

**DIAMONDS IN SAND DUNES**

**Laborers Search For Precious Gems on Their Hands and Knees**

The greater part of the diamonds of Damaraland, South Africa, are said to be found in the narrow valleys between the moving sand dunes on a granite surface with its carpet of three or four inches of sand. In these flat places negro laborers, in bands from 10 to 50, with an overseer to every 10 or 12 men, crawl on their hands and knees over the sand in search of the gems, each one carrying a bottle, in which they are dropped when found.

It is claimed that in one spot 20 negro laborers, working under two white overseers, picked up 60,000 karats of diamonds, valued at more than \$20,000,000 in three days, and at a point about ten miles from Luderitzbucht two white men gathered over 8,000 karats, worth \$300,000, in one afternoon.

One feature of diamond hunting in Damaraland that seems almost uncanny, lies in the circumstance that the same thoroughly searched area may be gone over again a few months afterward with an almost equally successful result as on the first inspection, proving that these gems are shifting.

The coast of Damaraland is like no other part of the world. For 500 miles the giant sand dunes, pushed unceasingly by the winds from the southwest, are piling up at the water's edge to the height of hundreds of feet, during the periods that the tide is out, to be undermined and overthrown when the sea returns. Some of the largest of these dunes have been shown to move as much as nine feet in 24 hours.

**MAKING TEA CHESTS**

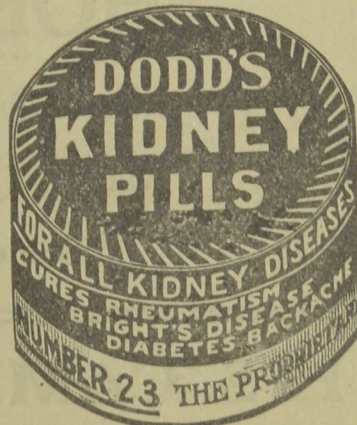
**Canadian Poplar is a Suitable Wood For This Purpose**

One of the largest London firms in the box shock trade who, among other connections, do a big business in India and Ceylon with users of tea chests, said that Canadian poplar is well suited for this purpose. While veneer chests are preferable where a long transportation is necessary, many of the growers possessing easier shipping facilities use ordinary boxes manufactured largely from Baltic woods, but owing to the pervading smell of the Swedish fir and the occasional presence of gum, this variety of timber is far from suitable for the purpose. For this reason it is thought that poplar wood free from such disadvantages, is in many respects an ideal material for the construction of tea chests.

**A Fortune in a Coin**

Among the coins Napoleon had minted were some millions of five-franc pieces, and he determined to popularize these in an extraordinary way. In one of the coins, folded to a tiny size, was enclosed a note signed by Napoleon, and promising the sum of 5,000,000 francs—\$1,000,000—to the finder of that particular coin.

Naturally, everybody who changed a large piece demanded the new five-franc coins in exchange, and as a rule probed and dug and sounded the metal in eager search for the hidden note. But the years went on, and yet the note did not appear. Napoleon's plighted word is a sacred trust to the French nation, and the Government stands ready to pay the debt, which, with interest, is worth \$7,375,000—upon demand.
