season. Should an embargo be put on at once it will mean additional loss owing to contracts made and not filled.

AT WASHINGTON

Washington, Dec. 17—G. F. O'Halloran, deputy minister of agriculture of Canada, arrived here today to be present at a hearing tomorrow at the department of agriculture on the question of modifying the department's embargo on potatoes from certain European countries, and also dealing with Canadian importations.

T. P. Gill, secretary of agriculture of Ireland, who has been in this country for some time, also will be present, and some other countries which have potatoes to sell will have representatives from their legations here at the hearing.

The question to be considered is whether the plant quarantine board shall allow the importation of potatoes, as it does of trees and shrubs provided they have been examined abroad by experts and declared to be free from infectious diseases.

NEW LAW SCHOOL
FOR ALBERTA

Calgary, Alta., Dec. 18—Steps looking to the establishment of a law school in Alberta are expected to be taken at the annual meeting of the Provincial Bar Association, which convened in this city today for a two day's session. The need of a law school is generally recognized and the question of establishing one has been agitated by the bench and bar for some time. It is expected that something definite in the way of bringing the project to a head will be accomplished at the present meeting.

FEW TARIFF CHANGES
THIS SESSION

Ottawa, Dec. 17.—That there will be no tariff changes of importance this session is indicated by several things which have occurred recently.

It is now practically admitted that the delegation of fruit growers and breeders which asked that there should be no change in the tariff was brought down deliberately by the government to offset the demands of the grain growers for tariff reduction. This is taken as an indication that there will be no tariff changes of moment announced by the finance minister in his next budget speech. The government decision that there is to be no commission on the high cost of living is another.

Finally, it is claimed that with the revenue falling the government could not cut the tariff if it wanted to because it needs the money, and cannot get on without it.

COMMISSION ORDERS
REDUCTION IN RATES

Ottawa, Dec. 17.—The Railway Commission today issued an order reducing express charges for the handling of freight bills of lading and collection of moneys thereunder.

At present the express companies forward bills of lading for freight shipments, they, however charging for the collection and return of money under the bill of lading one per cent.

By the order signed today a change in the express classification has been made. Under this, a new rule provides for the charge of one-eighth of one per cent., with a minimum of one per cent of \$100 on one company's line and one and one-half per cent. when carried by more than one company.

In practice the present and proposed rules will work out as follows:—On \$100, present \$3, proposed one line, 1, two line, \$1.50; on \$300, present \$3, proposed one line, \$1, two line \$1.50; on \$500, present \$5, proposed one line \$1, two line \$1.50 on \$1,000, present \$10, proposed one line \$1.25, two line \$1.50; on \$2,000, present \$20 proposed one line \$2.50, two lines \$2.50.
