U. S. METHODISTS WOULD KILL THE BOOTLEGGERS

Are Better Dead Than Alive is the Verdict Passed in the Church's Dry Organ—Advises That They be Given Rough Treatment—Texas Ranger Style is Recommended to the Police.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 1.—Washington was astonished tonight when the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals of the Methodist Episcopal Church came out openly for the shooting to death of bootleggers.

The startling recommendation that enforcement officers be freer with the use of firearms was contained in what is known as the weekly Clip Sheet issued by the organization and distributed among newspapers to further the cause of prohibition. The Rev. Clarence True Wilson is general secretary of the board and Deets Pickett is research secretary.

The statement had the most important position in the Clip Sheet. It was headed "The Only Good Bootlegger is a Dead Bootlegger."

There is reason to believe that the surprising recommendation that officers take the law into their own hands in this manner will be discussed in Congress. The point has come up before, and more conservative Senators and Representatives declared it was extremely dangerous to give prohibition officers too much authority. Here is the text of the Methodist proposal.

"On several occasions recently prohibition and police officers in the discharge of their duty have been fired upon by bootleggers. Unfortunately some of these belligerent bootleggers have been taken and lodged in jail. They should have been lodged five feet under ground.

"In Washington recently police officers attempted to stop a car going through the streets at terrific speed and were ignored. They gave chase in another car and were being outdistanced when the bootleg machine ran into another automobile standing by the curb, injuring its occupants and careening down the street. Both bootleggers leaped from the car with drawn revolvers. Nevertheless the officers took them alive.

"This is not good policy. Such incidents should be dealt with according to the code of the Texas Ranger. We would be the last to advocate the unwarranted use of weapons by officers, but a bootlegger is worth a lot more to the country dead than alive.

"A few days ago a hard working colored woman, respectable and honest said: It do make me so mad. I has to work hard for my living and I only gets \$2 a day, while dat ole Charlie Brown is flyin' round with a big automobile and now he done bought another car, all wid bootleg money."

"The same just comment could and would be made by hundreds of hard working white people in regard to impudent, arrogant and prosperous boot-

leggers, both white and black.

"One of the sure fire ways to locate bootleggers in any city is to watch the automobile registrations. When a man registers a big fine car without any apparent reason why he is able to afford such an automobile his case should be looked into. The Government should see that such cars are sold for the benefit of the taxpayers according to law. Treat 'em rough."
