F. HOPKINSON SMITH 75 YEARS OLD

New York, Oct. 23.—Francis Hopkinson Smith, one of the most remarkable geniuses this country has ever produced, noted as artist, author and engineer, celebrated the seventy-fifth anniversary of his birth today. He was born at Baltimore, Oct. 23, 1838 and when quite young worked as a clerk in an iron works establishment. Later he was educated as mechanical engineer and contractor. He built the government sea wall around Governor's Island, New York, another at Tompkinsville, S. I.; the Race Rock light house off New London and the foundation for the Bartholdi statue of Liberty on Bedloe's Island, New York harbor. Later he became a landscape painter of great merit and a lecturer on art subjects. He traveled extensively and became noted as the author of a large number of books, mostly fiction and books of travel. In late years he has traveled

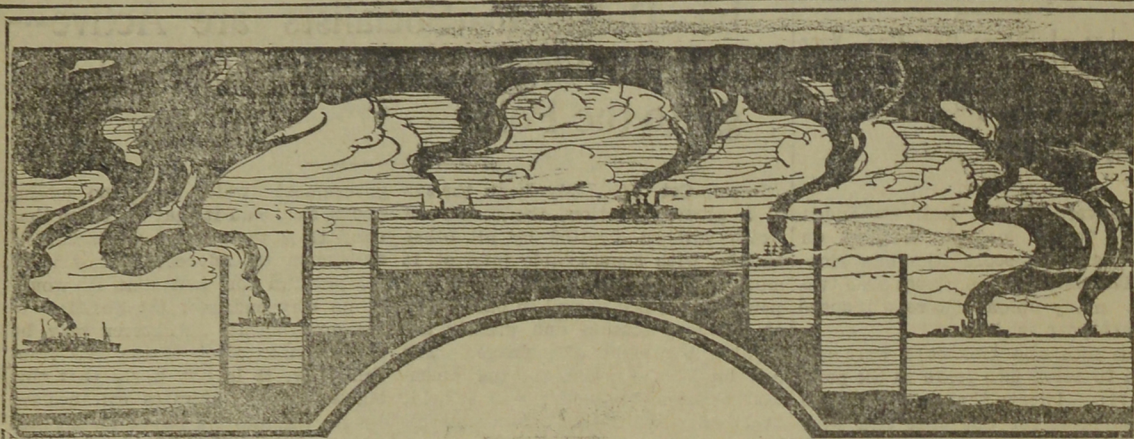

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 23.—Governors of several states, tax commissioners, economists, university and college professors and business men from many sections of the country are in attendance at the seventh annual conference of the National Tax Association, which opened its session here today and will remain in session until Saturday. Among the tax experts who have consented to deliver addresses before the conference are E. E. Woodbury, ex-chairman, and T. F. Brynes, present, chairman of the New York State Board of Tax commissioners; ex-Justice R. J. Lehoucq, Adelbert Moot of Buffalo; J. L. Davis, United States Commissioner of Corporations; C. B. Pierce, Chairman of the New Jersey Special Tax Commission; State Tax Commissioner T. E. Lyons of Wisconsin; D. M. Link of Indiana, J. Frank Adams of Colorado, and C. M. Zander of Arizona; Professors Seligman of Columbia, Johnson of New York University, Raper of the University of North Carolina, Lockhart of the Ohio State University of Illinois, Bullock of Harvard, and Fairchild of Yale; T. B. Paton, general counsel of the American Bankers' Association; Dr. R. H. Whitten, statistician of the New York Public Service Commission; A. S. Dudley, Tax Commissioner of the St. Paul Railway and W. W. Pollock of the Manufacturers' Appraisal Company. The headquarters of the Conference are at the hotel Iroquois.

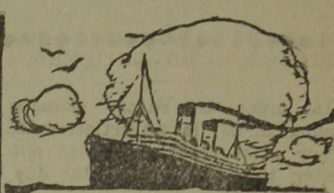
