the necessity of counteracting the spread of the radical propaganda and made strong appeals to the voters. There is a strong suspicion that the government party did not in all cases limit itself to mere arguments or persuasion and there were numerous complaints that men, openly supporting the government or actually in the service of the government, were trying to corrupt or coerce voters in favor of the government candidates. Thereupon representatives of the various democratic parties and factions and including those of the Socialist Reform party, met and formulated a protest to Premier Giolitti calling his attention to these objectionable practices which were particularly flagrant in the southern parts of Italy and in Sicily.

As a result of this protest the government sent out circulars to the prefects in all sections of the country, calling their attention to the facts as presented by the democratic committee and instructing them to make every effort to insure liberty to the voters of all parties. This has produced a favorable impression and it is generally believed by those thoroughly acquainted with the existing conditions that the government, standing upon its excellent record and aided by the popularity of Premier Giolitti and of the members of his cabinet, will be victorious at the election on Sunday.

NEW LETTER BOXES IN SOUTH BRUCE

Paisley, Ont., 21—South Bruce electors are laughing today at the latest efforts of the Borden government to catch a few votes. Six red mail boxes have been erected in Chesley, one of South Bruce's flourishing towns, and the Conservatives say three more are coming. They were placed on different telegraph poles in the town during the night and the residents awoke to see the red boxes.

C. J. Mickle and William McDonald, M.P.P., of Chesley, told a big meeting of the farmers of the rich township of Elderslie about the red boxes at an enthusiastic meeting at Gillies Hill tonight.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King declared that had reciprocity carried, the tightness of money during the past two years would not have existed, and the farmers would have had a better market for their goods.

Mr. King touched on the navy question, explaining the Liberal policy, and uttered a warning respecting Canadian becoming involved in European militarism. He also criticized the enormous expenditure for military purposes in Canada as compared with the inadequate expenditure for agricultural purposes.

Mr. C. J. Mickle of Chesley, refuted the statement made by Conservatives in the riding that the Wilson tariff was as beneficial to the farmers as reciprocity would have been. He explained that the latter gave them a monopoly of the United States market, while the Wilson tariff let in all countries. He also warned the electors that responsible government in Canada was being threatened by the actions of the present government.

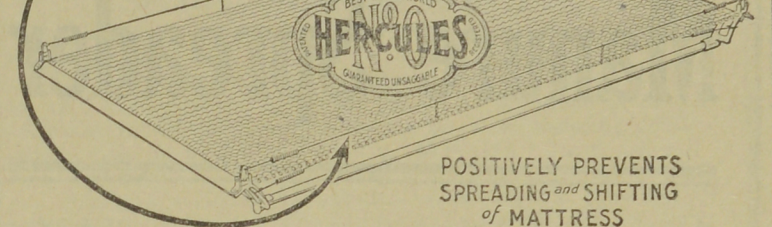

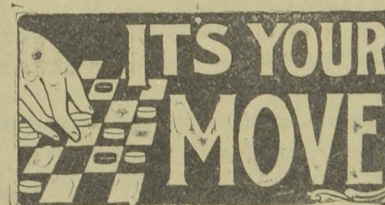
