ures, there will be distributed among  
the players \$135,163.89. The winners  
will receive sixty per cent. of this  
total and the losers forty per cent.

The National Commission announ-  
ced that twenty-five players on each  
team were eligible to play in the  
series, therefore each man on the  
winning side will receive \$3,244 and  
each member of the losers \$2,162.

The attendance today was 20,568,  
and the receipts \$49,645. Of this the  
National Commission share was \$4,-  
964.50, the players' share \$26,808.50,  
and each club \$8,936.10.
