"ROCKET" POWER TO PLAY AGAIN WITH CANADIENS

Montreal, Oct. 10--"Rocket" Power the clever and aggressive defence player of the Canadian Hockey team in 1911, will be back with his old love for the winter.

Power joined Kennedy's team in the middle of the 1911 season and created a big sensation. Canadians took him with them when they invaded the Maritime Provinces that winter and he made such a hit there that the following year the New Glasgow Club shattered all Maritime salary records before "Rocket" was signed. Power was the highest paid man in the Maritime League that year. In fact, he still holds the record.

Last winter he did not play much hockey. He performed twice for Quebec and then retired indefinitely.

Power is the property of the Canadiens. He is working with his father near Quebec and expresses a desire to return to the game, which means that he will don a Canadian uniform.
