APPLIES TO BE
STUDENT-AT-LAWMiss Frances L. Fish, B. A., Begins
Profession Not Usual For Women
---Law Examinations to Begin
October 21

A large number will take the law examinations in this city October 21. The examinations for student-at-law which were postponed earlier in the year will begin on that day as well as those for attorney. Applicants for admission as students who hold the degree of Bachelor of Arts are admitted without examination and graduates of the King's College Law School, St. John, are admitted as attorneys without examination.

The list of students presents an unusual feature as the most recent applicant is a lady, Miss Frances L. Fish, B.A., of Campbellton. Miss Fish is the first lady to apply for admission as student-at-law since Miss Mabel French of St. John, was admitted. If Miss Fish pursues successfully the required course of study she will not encounter the same difficulty as Miss French did in being admitted as an attorney as that difficulty has been removed by legislation. Miss Fish belongs to Newcastle and was graduated by the University of New Brunswick in 1910.

FORESTALLING
CASES PRESENT
UNUSUAL FEATURESPolice Observe Instances of Infraction
of Market Bylaw by Alderman
and Ex-Alderman---Interpretation
of Law Desired

The agitation for better enforcement of the city market bylaw which was begun on Monday evening last, when Ald. Everett suggested that the sections concerning forestalling be struck out, bore unexpected fruit this morning when the police observed an alderman and an ex-alderman violate the bylaw by purchasing before ten o'clock, both being in lines of business which make such purchases forestalling. Information in these cases probably will be laid next week.

The alderman was observed to buy six heads of celery and the ex-alderman bought fifteen barrels of potatoes. The cases seem to be clear.

A question of the interpretation of the bylaw has arisen however. By some it is claimed that those selling goods to forestallers are as liable to prosecution as those buying. The chief of police has asked for an opinion from the city clerk on that point.

AROUND THE MARKET.

There was a good sized market this morning and a large quantity of farm produce changed hands. Potatoes were firm at \$1 per barrel and apples brought from \$1.50 to \$3.00. Other prices were as follows:—Butter 35c., eggs 30c., carrots, half barrel, 75c.; cabbages, each, 5c.; cauliflower 10c. lamb, per quarter, \$1 to \$1.40; squash, per lb., 3c.; turnips, per barrel, 50c.; chickens, per pair, \$1; veal, per lb., 8 and 9c.; beef, per lb., 7 and 8c.; pork, per lb., 11 and 12c.

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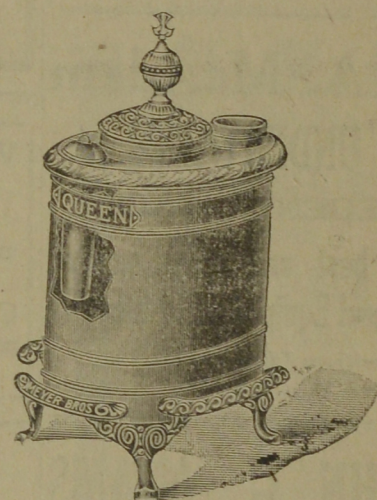
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
