## WESTERN LEAGUE IN ENGLAND ALARMS RUGBY CIRCLES

Feared That New Organization Will  
Help Northern Union to Encroach  
on Rugby Territory

London, Nov. 14—Rugby footballers in the North of England are much perturbed by the formation of the Western League in Gloucester, Somerset, Devon and Cornwall. Last year's trouble occurred when many players were suspended only to be pardoned and reinstated. Now to cap it all the Rugby Union has allowed these western counties to form a league.

It was largely due to the formation of such a league that the Northern Union severed connection with the Rugby Union some years ago. Now it is feared that the new Western League is only the thin end of the wedge started by the Northern Union whose attempts to establish its code in Wales and the West of England have hitherto proved futile. The Northern Union hails this the latest move of the Rugby Union with joy.

The Manchester Guardian says this Western League and the Welsh Rugby Union's sanction of cup competitions in Wales may yet prove important factors in the downfall of the amateur in that part of Britain.

## ART ROSS SAYS MARITIME LEAGUE CAN FIGHT N. H. A.

Hockey Star Says That in Event of  
Salary Trouble Crack Players  
Will Come East

Montreal, Nov. 15—Art Ross, captain of the Wanderers, who is very much in the limelight at present because he emphatically refuses to accept a smaller salary than he received last year, is of the opinion that, if the N.H.A. and Maritimes do not come to terms, the latter will be able to make it disagreeable for the older organization.

"This talk of the Maritime teams not being able to pay big salaries does not seem right," he said. "There will either be a four-team or a six-team league in the Maritime Provinces this winter and although some of the towns are not very large, they could all, I believe, afford to engage one expensive player. Some then could, I think, afford to pay big salaries to two men."

"Now," he continued, "if the N.H.A. will not accept their terms they could make it disagreeable for their league will naturally be the big alternative for players who are not satisfied with conditions in the N.H.A. The M.P.H.A. will then engage some of the best players in Canada. The league is flourishing and is becoming better and stronger and will, if satisfactory arrangement is not reached with the N.H.A., most assuredly engage some of the stars of the association. In time the lower provinces would have a league which would prove very troublesome to the new Hockey Commission."

"It all depends on what is done at the meeting of the N.H.A. at Toronto."

It will be remembered that in 1912 the Halifax Crescents made two attempts to sign Art Ross, offering him more money than had ever been paid any player in that league.

## SAM LANGFORD MEETS "GUNBOAT" SMITH TONIGHT

Twelve Rounds Will be Fought by  
the Two at Boston—Both in  
Good Shape

Boston, Nov. 16—"Gunboat" Smith's ring rating will be decided when he meets Sam Langford, Joe Woodman's demon heavyweight, in a twelve-round encounter at the Atlas A.A. tomorrow evening. The bout is the most important tussle between big men arranged since Jim Jeffries was vanquished by Jack Johnson at Reno on July 4, 1910.

Smith stands at the head of the white heavyweights. He has defeated such prominent performers as Bombardier Wells, Jim Flynn, Frank Moran, Jess Willard, Tony Ross and Charley Miller. The Californian has won the majority of his victories by his punching ability. His opponent usually takes the count when the gunner scores with his famous right hand smash. Smith also packs a hard wallop in his left hand but usually depends upon his right hand "haymaker" in order to turn the tide of battle.

The Californian is a perfect specimen of manhood. He is five feet, eleven inches tall and weighs 182 lbs. He has a long reach and does not carry a single pound of superfluous flesh.

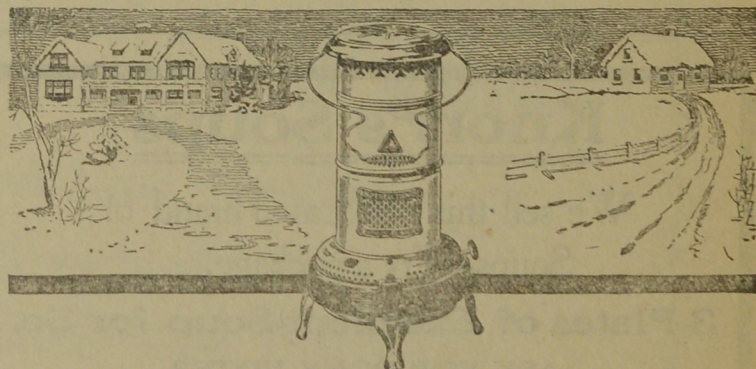
