The remains will leave Boston tonight, arriving here tomorrow morning. The funeral will take place from the C.P. R. station on the arrival of the train. Rev. Neil McLauchlan will conduct the service and interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery. While residing here the late Mr. Carvell was prominent in the Orange Order and was a member of the Methodist Church.

## THE LARGER MARKET.

A Hartland correspondent of The St. John Standard writes:—"Since the removal of the duty on various things produced on the farm, Carleton County has been doing quite a stroke in the shipment of produce, etc., to the States. This week two buyers from Maine have been in Hartland and the surrounding country picking up live stock for shipment. Thursday they shipped a carload of cattle which they bought from Mr. Birmingham of Victoria, at a price considerably in advance of anything that has previously been offered by local men and by Saturday they expect to send two or more cars of sheep, hogs and cattle away."

## PAINFUL ACCIDENT.

Mr. Charles Cremin, the well known guide, had the misfortune to fracture his right leg near the ankle on Thursday last. The accident occurred at Nictau, Victoria county. He had come out of the woods to meet an English sportsman and fell while carrying a heavy box down a flight of stairs, his ankle turning under him. He was taken by canoe to Plaster Rock, where the bone was reset by a physician. He was brought to his home here by the Gibson train on Saturday evening. Mr. Cremin has had a very busy season in the woods and had arranged to guide a New York lady for the balance of the month. The accident will confine him to the house for some weeks.

## DIED IN HOSPITAL.

Mrs. Frank Delong passed away last night at Victoria Public Hospital after a lingering illness. She was aged thirty-seven years and is survived by a husband and five children Eldon, Clowes, Wesley, Doris and Cedric. The parents of the deceased Mr. and Mrs. Flann, survive in Campbellton. The funeral will take place Tuesday afternoon with interment at the Rural Cemetery. Rev. J. E. Wilson will conduct the service.

WORK ON ST. JOHN  
& QUEBEC RAILWAY  
NEARS COMPLETION

Engineers on Several Residences Notified That Services are Ended---  
Considerable Amount of Steel Has Been Laid Already

Construction-work on those sections of the St. John & Quebec Railway in the vicinity of Fredericton has been advanced to such an extent that the engineering staffs have been taken off of some residences and on others have been notified that their services will be no longer required after the end of November. The amount of construction-work on the Centreville-Gagetown section of the railway which will remain to be done will be little.

Steel has been laid for a considerable distance on various sections of the line. West of Fredericton rails have almost reached McGivney's. East of this city, crews are laying steel in the vicinity of Hart's Lake. The weather this autumn has been very favorable to steel-laying, which will be continued as long as the weather permits. It is probable that the superstructure of some of the steel bridges will be erected during the winter. Ballasting will be resumed in the spring.

## NEW YORK MARKET SWAMPED.

Belgian potatoes entering the United States free of duty have swamped the New York market and a bad effect is expected here. Forty thousand steamer at New York last week, sand bags of 180 pounds each arrived and seventy thousand bags are expected next week.

EVA SMITH'S  
DISCHARGE FROM  
JAIL ORDERED

W. J. O'Hearn, Halifax Lawyer, Arrived This Morning to Act With A. R. Slipp in Case---Further Developments Expected

Eva Smith's discharge from jail was ordered this morning by His Honor Judge Wilson of the York County Court who gave his decision in the application under habeas corpus made on the girl's behalf by her counsel P. J. Hughes. This decision being in favor of the girl a move is expected upon the part of the Attorney General of Nova Scotia who is acting for the crown. The order for the girl's discharge will be signed by the judge this afternoon when further developments are expected.

## HALIFAX LAWYER ARRIVES

The crown forces were augmented this morning when W. J. O'Hearn of Halifax arrived to act as counsel with A. R. Slipp, K. C., M. P. P. who has been acting for the Attorney General of Nova Scotia. Messrs. Slipp and O'Hearn appeared for the Crowe and P. J. Hughes and P. A. Guthrie for the girl this morning. Mr. O'Hearn is prominent in legal circles in Halifax. Sometime ago he represented the United States government in the Wren case at Halifax in which extradition was sought. He also has argued before the Supreme Court here.

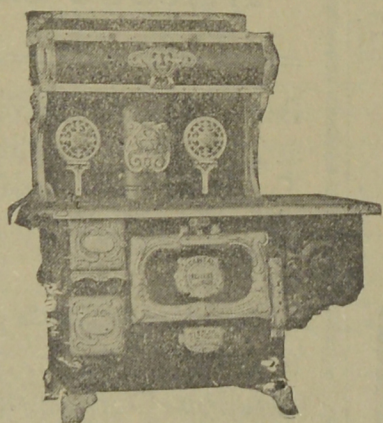
