CONFERENCE ON IRISH QUESTION WAS COMMENCED IN LONDON YESTERDAY; OUTLOOK IS BRIGHT

WAS ADJOURNED
UNTIL THURSDAY

Both Sessions Yesterday Described as Business Like—Nothing Yet Been Done to Jeopardize Success—Arthur Griffiths Heads Irish Delegation.

London, Oct. 11—British and Irish delegates to the conference which aims at setting the future of Ireland held two two-hour sessions at No. 10 Downing street today, adjourning after the afternoon session until Thursday, in order to enable Premier Lloyd George to grapple with the unemployment situation.

Both sessions were businesslike, even the greetings of Mr. Lloyd George to the visitors from across the channel being hearty but formal. The official communiques issued at the conclusion of the proceedings do not disclose the subjects discussed but it was understood that the matter of procedure upon which the Sinn Fein delegates placed importance occupied the greater part of the time. In fact no stenographers were present and both the British and Sinn Fein delegates maintained silence as to what happened. It was gathered however that the conference preceded along anticipated lines and nothing thus far has occurred to jeopardized its success. It is probable that the question of alleged breaches of the truce by both sides was taken up as the British and Sinn Fein officials have much more concerned about the subject, both being desirous of having the conference conducted in an atmosphere of peace. The Irish delegates were aware before they came to London of dissatisfaction on the part of the British Government regarding the alleged breaches and they had no intention of unduly stressing that question but were anxious for a mutual understanding on the matter.

Text of Communique.

The text of a communique given out after the session follows:

"The first session of the conference on Ireland was held in 10 Downing street at 11 o'clock. Those present were the British representatives, Prime Minister Lloyd George, Lord Birkenhead, Winston Spencer Churchill, Sir Laming Worthington-Evans, Hamer Greenwood and Sir Gordon Hewart and the Irish representatives Arthur Griffith, Michael Collins, Robert C. Barton, Eamon J. Duggan and George Garvan Duffy. There also were present two British secretaries. The conference adjourned until 4 o'clock.

One of Lloyd George's secretaries who received the newspapermen, just after the conference opened smilingly said: You cannot expect any news for weeks yet."

WILL GREET PERSHING

London, Oct. 11—The British government last night telegraphed to Paris, pressing its pleasure at the proposed visit of General Pershing to lay the congressional medal of honor on the tomb of the British unknown soldier in Westminster Abbey, and General Pershing is assured the warmest welcome.

The government views the visit with the greatest of satisfaction.

Yom Kippur.

Services were held last evening and will be continued through practically the whole of today in observance of Yom Kippur. The day is observed as a fast day by the Jews. It began last evening at 6 o'clock and will close this evening at 6. All Jewish places of business are closed today the day is sometimes called the Day of Atonement.

USED ACETYLENE TORCHES TO STEAL BOOZE STORE

Washington, Oct. 11—Joseph E. Leiter, widely known capitalist is mourning the loss of probably the finest collection of choice wines and cigars in the country. Thieves last Sunday invaded his country home four miles from Washington and carted away beverages that even before prohibition cost in excess of \$100,000. The present value ranges from \$300,000 to \$500,000.

The raiding of the Leiter cellar on the Leesburg pike is the largest reported since the eighteenth amendment became effective. It was performed in much the same manner as the modern method of rifling banks, for to get at the liquor the bandits had to cut through a steel door into a specially constructed cellar. Acetylene torches and two motor trucks were used.

The robbery is supposed to have occurred during the afternoon of Oct. 2, while the caretaker, Robert Thornton was in Washington on business. Thornton left the estate shortly after noon last Sunday and did not return until late Sunday evening. According to his report he found open, the wrecked door on the floor and the contents of the cellar gone.

Immediately on being advised of the robbery, Mr. Leiter engaged the services of a detective agency and a cordon of guards was thrown about the place.

Not a single trace has been found of the robbers or of the wines and liquors. Detectives working on the case are inclined to believe that the robbers have cached the loot in the immediate vicinity of the Leiter place and will let it remain there until the detectives are called off.

HON. MR. KING TO SPEAK AT ST. JOHN

St. John, Oct. 12—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, the Liberal leader, will make his first New Brunswick address of the campaign in Moncton on Thursday evening. On Friday evening he will speak in Sussex and on Saturday evening the Liberal chieftain will address a St. John audience in one of the local theatres. Mr. King will speak in St. Stephen on Monday evening.

It is planned to have a large representation to meet Mr. King on his arrival in St. John about 5.30 on Saturday evening and to escort him to the Royal hotel. It is understood that Premier Foster will go to Moncton to meet Mr. King and accompany him to St. John.

Preliminary arrangements for Mr. King's reception here were made yesterday at a meeting held in the Moose Hall in Charlotte street. A committee was appointed to secure a theatre and to make provision for a public meeting, the time and place of which will be announced later.

BIRDS FLY TOGETHER

London, Oct. 12—Birds of a feather flocked together in the Bow street police court when Messrs. Byrd, Peacock, Jay, Wren, Swallow, Cock and Robin appeared before a Magistrate charged with drunkenness and disorderly conduct.

The Magistrate reviewed the list and removing his spectacles said:

"This branch of justice would be less encumbered if such prisoners as face me now would do less flying by night."

THE LIBERAL CHIEFTAIN SPOKE AT THREE MEETINGS YESTERDAY IN P. E. ISLAND

Had Some Interesting Exchanges With Farmer Sympathizers in the Audience—Forces Opposing the Government Should Not be Divided—Wasteful Expenditure on Canada's Merchant Marine.

Summerside, P. E. I., Oct. 11—At three meetings in Prince county towns, O'Leary, Tignish and Alberton, today, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party and his colleagues, A. R. McMaster, of Brome, Que., and William Duff, Lunenburg, N. S., discussed their policies. At O'Leary there was a series of interesting exchanges between the Liberal speakers and members of the audience, who apparently were supporters of the Farmer candidate in the riding.

Mr. King frankly told the farmers that he considered their movement a class movement and as such contrary to their own best interests.

FARMERS ASK QUESTIONS

O'Leary, P. E. I., Oct. 11—A feature of the Liberal meeting here this afternoon addressed by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and members of his party, was a series of questions and exchanges between evident Farmer supporters in the audience and the speakers.

Mr. King discussed the danger of class movements dividing the forces opposing the government and warned that in three-corner contests there was a danger of the government candidates being returned. Both Mr. King and A. R. McMaster declared that some Farmer candidates were being brought into the field with the aim of splitting the anti-government vote.

Answering a question put by a member of the audience, Mr. King pointed out that there was little in the Farmers' platform which was not already in the Liberal platform. One of the auditors asked why the Liberals of Prince county had refused to accept the Farmers' candidate. Because the Liberal party is not a class party, declared Mr. King, and yours is a class candidate; farmers were needed in parliament, he added, but not as representatives of a class. Unity in the forces opposing the government was necessary unless the people's will was to be defeated.

MURDOCK'S CANDIDATURE

Mr. King referred to the decision of James Murdock, former member of the board of commerce, to offer his candidature in a Toronto seat as a straight Liberal candidate.

Mr. McMaster did not quarrel with the farmers seeking representation but thought they erred in seeking different means of reaching the same goal as the Liberals. Both agreed in saying the tariff must be reserved and retained as means of raising revenue. We have differences of opinion, said Mr. McMaster that is the essence of Liberalism, but that is no reason why we should divide our forces.

GIANTS AGAIN SLUGGED THEIR WAY TO VICTORY; SERIES IS TIED ONCE MORE 3 TO 3

New York, Oct. 11—Forcing the issue with the Yankees by powerful work with the stick, the Giants evened the world's series count today, taking the sixth game by the score of 8 to 5. Each club has now won three games, and if the course of the struggle so far is anything to judge by, the battle bids fair to go the limit of nine encounters, with a great contest on the last day for the final honors.

Today's game at the Polo Grounds, played in mild autumn weather, to a crowd of some 34,000 spectators, took on for a couple of innings the aspect of a battle of home-run hitters. Meanwhile, up in the stand, his damaged arm in a sling, unable to play, sat "Babe" Ruth, the king of all the home runners, a pathetic picture of baffled determination, watching no less than three other men clout the ball for circuit drives before the game was two innings old.

Two of these men were of the opposing clan. The other was "Babe" Ruth's own substitute, the slim and snappy "Chick" Fewster. Substitute Fewster lifted the ball into the left field bleachers with a man aboard in the Yankee's second inning, putting his club on the happy side of a two-run margin after the home runs of Giant sluggers E. Meusel and Frank Snyder, had cancelled a three-run advantage which the American Leaguers had acquired in the first inning. There was nothing of jealousy

in Ruth's demeanor as he watched all this and the one happy smile observed on his face during the afternoon appeared when "Chick" inserted his four-base blow.

Shawkey Hammered.

The game ultimately and most deservedly went to the Giants through a thunderous descent upon Pitcher "Bob" Shawkey in the fourth inning which netted four runs and gave "Jess" Barnes a commanding margin upon which to pitch a game of consummate skill for the remaining innings he occupied the mound.

Barnes was Manager McGraw's second choice. "Jess" didn't start the game. Fred Toney did that. Three runs had gone across the plate on a bit of snappy consecutive hitting by the Yankees when he was removed. Barnes prevented further scoring in that inning but in the second a single followed by Fewster's homer added two runs to the Yankee's total.

The Yankee scoring stopped right there, however, Barnes being their master all the rest of the way. He had the American League batsmen constantly guessing, and usually guessing wrong. "Jess" striking out no less than ten of them. Every regular on the Yankee team was fanned by Barnes at least once, and Aaron Ward struck out twice. It was Barnes' second victory of the series.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO WILL BE THE CENTRAL BATTLE GROUND IN THE ENSUING ELECTIONS

MT. ALLISON PLAYS U.N.B. HERE NOVEMBER 4

Truro, N. S., Oct. 11—A meeting of the Maritime intercollegiate sports committee was held here today to arrange football and hockey matters for the college year. Six colleges were represented. It was decided to have the football league in two sections—eastern and western—as last year, the winners to play off for the championship at Truro, probably on November 17. The eastern section consists of Kings, Dalhousie and St. Francis Xavier, and the western section comprises Acadia, Mount Allison and University of New Brunswick. Very few changes were made in the rules governing games and the conditions under which players will be allowed to compete.

The football schedule follows:

Oct. 25—St. Francis Xavier versus Kings College at Windsor.

Oct. 31—Dalhousie versus Kings, at Halifax.

Nov. 8—Dalhousie versus St. Francis Xavier at Antigonish.

Western Section.

Oct. 27—University of New Brunswick versus Acadia at Wolfville.

Nov. 4—Mount Allison versus University of New Brunswick, Fredericton.

Nov. 10—Mount Allison versus Acadia at Sackville.

MR. CAHAN WILL NOT RUN

Montreal Oct. 11—Writing to the Montreal Gazette on the topic of the forthcoming federal elections, C. H. Cahan, K. C., formerly Conservative leader in the Nova Scotia legislature says: "The other day it was suggested to me that I should contest a Nova Scotia constituency against Mr. Fielding. Yet, except for his instinctive inclination towards reciprocity of trade with our neighbors, I can see no reasonable grounds for opposing Mr. Fielding in this election on any issue which is now before the public.

Mr. Cahan accordingly suggests that Mr. Fielding should be elected by acclamation.

BEES WITHOUT HANGOVER

Boston, Oct. 12—A bee with a 'hang over' cannot carry honey, and prohibition in this country has helped him prosper, Allen Latham, president of the Connecticut Bee Keepers Association, declared in an address here today.

He told the Eastern Massachusetts Society of Bee Keepers that "bees are not boozers, but they know no better than to feed on the fermented dumpings from distilleries and breweries, and prohibition has helped them physically, if not morally."

Bees avoid garbage and sewage, "but the fermented mash of gin mills deceived them and their appetites led them astray," he added, explaining that "like human beings they used to get drunk and then fall sick."

EIGHTY TWO MEMBERS TO BE RETURNED

Progressives are Strong in the Prairie Provinces — Three Cornered Fights Will be Common in Ontario — Many Candidates Have Already Been Put Into the Field.

Ottawa, Oct. 11—Ontario will be the central battleground of the whole election campaign. Organizers of the three main parties—the government, the Liberal and the Progressives—agree that it is the fight for the eighty-two seats of Ontario that success or defeat will chiefly lie; and as day by day reports of nomination conventions come to hand, this fact becomes increasingly evident. In Quebec, a heavy Liberal majority is conceded. There is but one Progressive chosen.

The Progressives say that they will send to Ottawa an almost solid west. Over the Rockies the situation changes again. There, Liberals form the chief opposition to the government. In British Columbia there have been eight government candidates selected four Liberal and only one Progressive.

Thus Ontario, with its heavy representation in the House of Commons and the present uncertainty of its political faith, holds the key. Of all the provinces, it is already most prolific in selected candidates. Three-cornered fights will be common, unless indicated candidates drop heavily out of the running before nomination day. In Brantford, Durham, Haldon, the two Hurons, Leeds, Lincoln, Peel, the two Perths, Prince Edward York North, South and West and in one or two cases four candidates are in the field.

103 Progressives

Altogether in the eighty-two seats of the province, fifty-nine government candidates have been selected, forty-nine Progressives, thirty-four Liberals and ten Independents. How many candidates representing the new movement will actually be in the Ontario field it is practically impossible at this juncture to say but there are reports here of between sixty-five and seventy with a probable total of 103 Progressive candidates through the Dominion.

Next week the prime minister and Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the National Progressives, will begin their campaign tours of the province. The week following the Hon. Mackenzie King, the Liberal leader, is expected to join in the struggle for Ontario. Both the prime minister and Mr. King will tour Ontario following their campaigns in the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Crerar's Ontario meetings will be the opening of his eastern campaign. He will open with a meeting at Brompton, Peel county, on Monday next. After a week's tour in Ontario he will proceed to the Maritime Provinces, subsequently returning to Ontario to continue the campaign there.

THREE SENT UP AT WOODSTOCK

Woodstock, N. B., Oct. 11—O. Davenport, Charles Burpee and Richard Britton were today sent up for trial on a charge of attempted murder on the night of September 27, when Wendall Slipp was shot and seriously injured while in his automobile. The evidence adduced was along the same lines as has already appeared in the papers. Court will meet on Tuesday, 18th inst.

Navy Beat Dal.

Halifax, Oct. 11—The naval rugby team composed of players from the North Atlantic cruiser squadron in port defeated Dalhousie University's fifteen this morning three to nothing. It was Dalhousie's first game this season.
