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LIBERAL LEADER'S GREAT MEETING AT AMHERST

Hon. Mr. King Was Accorded a Rousing Welcome from Thousands of People—Ovation for H. J. Logan Who Will Carry the Liberal Standard in Old Tory Stronghold—Fair Play for the Maritimes.

A staff correspondent of the Halifax Chronicle, reporting the Liberal demonstration at Amherst on Wednesday, when Hon. Mackenzie King was welcomed and H. J. Logan, K. C., was chosen as the Liberal candidate for Cumberland, says in part:

"Mackenzie King gave his answer to Premier Meighen's manifesto before five thousand people in the Arena here this afternoon. It was the greatest political demonstration ever witnessed in the memory of men in this county. Political history in Cumberland will henceforth date not from Tupper but from Logan if the indications of this day be true.

Cumberland County, the political battle ground for generations of the Nova Scotians and Canadian people, has never witnessed the equal of the outburst of popular feeling that took place within the Arena from the time that Hon. Mackenzie King, the Liberal Leader, entered the huge structure until Hon. Dr. Beland, his eloquent French-Canadian Lieutenant, concluded his impassioned appeal for Canadian unity.

Just prior to the Arena demonstration the Gem Theatre had been packed to the doors, with representative Liberals from every district of Cumberland in attendance at the Liberal Convention which within two minutes unanimously nominated Hance J. Logan as standard bearer of the Liberal cause in the forthcoming election.

All Records Broken.

Here again all records were broken for it is said by old timers, veterans in the electoral contests in this part of Nova Scotia, that they never not even Howe's day, not even in Tupper's witnessed anything like the enthusiasm which swept the audience, nor, of a meeting of such size.

Mr. King in his speech, which without any fear of contradiction, I can say, was the greatest he has yet delivered in this part of the country. A masterful arraignment of the complete failures of the Meighen Government, an eloquent appeal to the people of Canada to again trust the future of this marvelous land to the

safe keeping of the historic Liberal Party, and a clear forceful presentation of where Liberalism stands on tariff reconstruction for the farmer, industrialist and all classes of the nation.

Whole Hearted Response.

One had only to glance at the audience, watch the eager intent faces of the multitude, an audience composed of men and women, who since childhood, have been schooled in politics, whose earliest recollections have been of political discussion, a people intelligently bred in the political problems of the country,—one had only to watch the very movement of expression across their faces to know that Mr. King was talking to their very hearts; and their very hearts were sending back to him a powerful transmission of sympathy. On the platform beside the speakers were A. B. Copp, member for Westmorland N. B., Mr. John E. Sinclair, M. P., of Prince Edward Island; Hon. Fred Magee, of Port Elgin, member of the New Brunswick Government, and Mr. C. H. Read, President of the Young Men's Liberal Club. Around the arena were strung such banners as "Let Logan Again Work for Cumberland," "The Field Tariff made busy Amherst," "Vive Le Docteur Beland."

Get Rousing Welcome.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and his party arrived at Amherst a few minutes after the hour of noon. They were greeted as the train drew into the station by a crowd of people who completely packed the platform and who instantly burst into applause as the Liberal chieftain, accompanied by H. J. Logan, who had met him at one of the stations out, alighted from the train. They were conveyed to the Terrace Hotel where a luncheon was prepared with Mr. Logan as host.

The Liberal convention was held at one o'clock in the Gem Theatre. It was an open convention for any Liberal who desired to attend, and they attended in the hundreds, crowded the auditorium to its utmost capacity.

Mr. Logan's nomination was proposed by Col. Dan Murray and seconded by Mrs. Robert MacCallum, who lost a son overseas.

Appreciation of Honor.

Mr. Logan expressed his appreciation for the nomination, and addressed the meeting on the needs of the solution of Canada's problems.

The meeting then adjourned to the Arena, which, in the meantime, had been filling with men and women from all parts of the country.

When Mackenzie King entered the hall it was the occasion of a tremendous outburst of applause, every one standing and cheering until it seemed that one could not cheer longer. The chairman of the meeting was Mr. C. A. Lusby, one of the leading manufacturers of Amherst.

Ovation For Logan.

The first speaker was Mr. H. J. Logan, Liberal nominee. His rising to speak was the occasion for another tremendous ovation. By this time the Arena was becoming packed, men even climbing into the rafters. It is said by those prepared to make comparison that the meeting was treble the size of any hitherto held here. It seemed that at almost every half dozen words which the popular nominee spoke he was interrupted by applause, causing him to momentarily halt until the voice of the multitude had subsided like the surge of a great sea pauses until the next rush of waters.

Mr. Logan spoke very briefly in the Arena, simply saying amid tumultuous applause, that "in cheering there is victory. It sounds like the days gone by. We are going to win." When he made reference to Fielding some in the audience shouted "Let her go boys, whoop her up," and they whooped her up all right.
