Rev. John McP. Scott, Noted Missionary Worker, Now Visiting Here
---Has Recently Returned From a Trip Around the World

Rev. John McP. Scott, pastor of St. John's Presbyterian Church, Toronto, who is widely known for the keen interest he has always taken in missionary work, is in the city, the guest of Mr. Donald Fraser, Woodstock Road. He will leave early next week for the Tobique in company with Mr. Fraser and upon his return to Fredericton will address five meetings in connection with St. Paul's Church. He will be the principal speaker at the men's banquet, to be held in the Auld Kirk on the evening of Friday, October 3rd, and on the following Sunday will occupy the pulpit of St. Paul's at both services. In the afternoon he will address the men's class of St. Paul's on the Korean situation and on Monday evening he will deliver an illustrated lecture in the Auld Kirk. On the following day he will go to Sydney, N.S., where he will address the Presbyterian Synod on missionary work.

Rev. Mr. Scott is not a stranger to New Brunswick, having labored as a student missionary at River du Chute and several other places in this province before going to Toronto. While at River du Chute he made the acquaintance of Mr. Fraser and a

CONSULAR AGENT
MAKES CHARGE AGAINST
POLICEMAN ROBERTS

W. W. Heard, United States Agent, Says Official Assaulted Him at Opera House---Police Commission to Investigate

The Police Commission met yesterday in special session, no meetings having been held for some time on account of the exhibition. The commission met to receive a complaint of W. W. Heard, United States consular agent in this city, against Special Policeman James Roberts, whom he charges with assault. The case will be heard by the commission at its next regular meeting, Thursday October 2. At that time both Mr. Heard and Policeman Roberts will appear before the commission and make their statements.

The incident occurred in August at the City Opera House. As city marshal, Roberts was on duty there and was enforcing the regulation against smoking in the lobby and corridors and in the portico of the building. Mr. Heard charges that as he was standing on the outer steps of the building the city marshal rushed at him and shoved him, saying, "How often have I got to tell you not to smoke here," or words to that effect. Mr. Heard states that he had received no previous warning from the officer and considers the action unnecessary and humiliating to him.

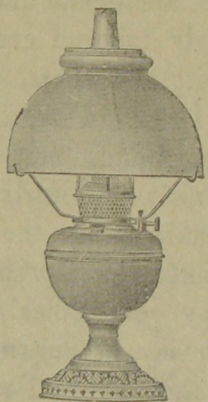

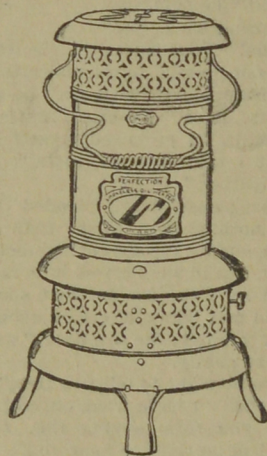
