WARM WELCOME FOR GENERAL BOOTH

Winnipeg, Nov. 10—Winnipeg on behalf of the sister provinces, yesterday turned out en masse to welcome General Bramwell Booth, commander in chief of the Salvation Army. The General was welcomed, not merely to Winnipeg, but to the 'Canadian prairie west, officers of the army, being in attendance from Regina, Moose Jaw, Calgary, Edmonton, and all the principal cities in the West, to extend the welcome to their brethren to the chief of staff. The Walker Theatre, where the gathering took place was crowded to the limit, and in addition to the 2,500 therein fully another thousand applied at the door for admission, and, through out the afternoon sought means of entrance. Tonight at a general meeting, a still greater crowd stormed the doors, and long before the scheduled time of opening the police had to hold the doors against those who sought to gain admittance.

The new General, welcomed first for his father's sake, remained to be warmly greeted for his own sake, the speakers moving a vote of thanks to him, voicing the general thought that the mantle of his father had fallen on worthy shoulders. In telling of "Some Lessons of My Father's Life and Work," General Booth unmistakably provided abundant proofs of his mastery of those self-same lessons. He narrated that the aged General had once been asked the secret of his wonderful success in drawing men to him: "Sir," the veteran replied "I

MACDONALD ELECTION IS DECLARED VOID

Counsel For Morrison Admits There Was Corruption—Cross Petition Dropped— Striking Accusations Made by Petitioners

Winnipeg, Nov. 10—The bye-election in the Dominion constituency of Macdonald on October 12, 1912, was declared void today by Chief Justice Howell, with whom was associated Justice Cameron in the special court held today to hear one of the most important election trials in the history of Manitoba. The proceedings were brief and formal, A. B. Hudson, counsel for the petitioners, producing a statement sent to him by A. J. Andrews, K. C., counsel for Mr. Alex. Morrison, M. P. This statement admitted that the friends of the respondent had been guilty of corrupt practices during the election to such an extent as to justify voiding the election, and intimated that consent would be given to the election 'being set aside. Mr. Andrews verified this statement in court, and the only further proceedings consisted in a discussion between the Chief Justice and Mr. Andrews as to the report which the court must make in a few

days to the clerk of the House of Commons.

NOT TRIVIAL OR UNIMPORTANT

Mr. Andrews, with Mr. Burbidge assisting him, submitted that it was not necessary to report on the extent of the corruption revealed, holding that all that was necessary was that one corrupt act be proved. It was suggested by the Chief Justice that the corrupt acts might have been extensively practised, but Mr. Andrews protested that he was sure this was not true. They would only concede that the offences were not trivial or unimportant. The court gave no indication of what report would be made.

A. B. Hudson, counsel for petitioners, with E. T. Swift, admitted that Morrison was not guilty personally of corrupt practices within (Continued on page five.)

Habits of the Salmon

Students of the habits of the salmon are beginning seriously to doubt the old assumption of a definite migration in the deep sea. It is now held more likely that there is something in the nature of a falkine dispersal of young from the mouths of their native streams, and a reverse movement as spawning time approaches. It has been discovered that all species of salmon feed off the coast of Vancouver Island upon a small shrimp-like crustacean that floats in incredible numbers on the tides.

Waste of Lumber

Enormous as is the amount of timber used in British Columbia, it is estimated that the annual growth is five times the annual lumber cut. It is figured also that several times the amount of timber is going to waste through natural decay, fires, and improper lumbering methods than is being used. In one year fire destroyed 160,000 acres, or about 200,000,000 feet of merchantable timber.

Western Hydro-Electric Power

In these days, when hydro-electric power is becoming so important a factor in industry, it is of interest to note that in the Western Provinces there are vast possibilities in this regard. In Manitoba there is water power which could produce 7,000,000 horse-power, and only 78,000 horse-power is being utilized. This is at Winnipeg, which has a municipally-owned hydro-electric plant, supplying light and power to consumers at cost.
