A GOOD PROPOSITION.



EVA SMITH CASE
WILL CONTINUE
FRIDAY MORNING

Original Habeas Corpus Order Dismissed Today---New Order Granted
---Girl Remains in Jail Till To-morrow

The case of Eva Smith, which for complications bids fair to equal that of Harry K. Thaw, will be continued before His Honor Judge Wilson of the County Court, at eleven o'clock Friday morning, when a writ of habeas corpus obtained by P. J. Hughes of McLellan & Hughes, acting for P. A. Guthrie, who is out of the city, on behalf of the girl's friends, is returnable. The girl now is in the county jail, although this morning Judge Wilson issued an order discharging the former order of habeas corpus issued by him on Saturday last. Two physicians, Dr. W. H. Irvine and Dr. C. P. Holden, have attended the girl. The counsel employed by her friends says the girl is ill and the opposing counsel, A. R. Slipp, K.C., acting on behalf of the attorney general, says the physicians have reported that she is not sick. Legally the girl's position is about as it was before the first writ of habeas corpus was obtained.

THIS MORNING'S PROCEEDINGS.

At nine o'clock this morning the adjourned hearing in this case began. Mr. Slipp and Mr. Hughes appearing as counsel. His Honor gave a brief review of the case and the various legal steps taken since the girl was arrested in Halifax as a vagrant and a common prostitute. His Honor then stated that he had decided to discharge the order for habeas corpus which he had issued on Saturday and further said:

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FOUR ACRES TO
BE EXPROPRIATED
BY INTERCOLONIAL

Portion of Lynch Property Included, Also Several Properties Near U. N. B. Athletic Field---Local Valuers Named

The Intercolonial Railway of Canada is making preparation for the expropriation of about four acres of land in this city for the purpose of providing better terminal facilities which it is expected will be used jointly by the Intercolonial and by the St. John & Quebec Railway under I.R.C. management.

W. B. Mackenzie of Moncton, chief engineer of the I.R.C., and other engineers were here yesterday inspecting the properties and a survey of them is to be made. The government valuers have been named and steps to place a value on the properties are expected in the near future.

The greater part of the four acres to be expropriated is included in that portion of the Lynch property east of the C.P.R. station, on which the new Intercolonial freight-sheds now are being built. This piece of land is roughly 200 by 600 feet. Tracks are now being laid to it and the contractors, McBean, Bell & Mc. Laggan, are now at work on the freight-sheds. It had been proposed that the I.R.C. should also expropriate right-of-way for the extension of Carleton and Aberdeen streets, being reimbursed by the city some time in the future. This proposal has not been followed out however, the land for street extension not to be expropriated.

The balance of the land which is to be taken by the city lies in the vicinity of the "Y" which connects the


