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UNIONIST IN CONFERENCE APPROVE OF NEGOTIATIONS BEING CARRIED ON BY THE GOVT.

WANT ULSTER

PROTECTED

Irish Conference Will be Hopeless Unless One Side or the Other is Prepared to Sacrifice Something Vital—Commercial Classes in Ireland Ready for a Settlement.

Liverpool, Nov. 17.—By an overwhelming majority, the Unionist party in session here today endorsed with certain reservations, the negotiations now in progress between the British government and the Irish representatives.

This attitude was expressed by an amendment to a resolution moved by Col. John Gretton, member of parliament for Rutlandshire, calling upon the conference to resolve that no settlement of the Irish question was acceptable which did not respect absolutely the position acquired by Ulster through the creation of a northern parliament.

The amendment to the resolution expressed the earnest hope "that consistent with the supremacy of the crown, the security of the Empire, the pledges given to Ulster and the safeguarding of the interests of the minority in South Ireland, a solution to the Irish difficulties may be found in the conference now in progress which will bring peace to Great Britain and Ireland and strength to the Empire."

Before Colonel Gretton moved his resolution the conference passed a resolution expressing satisfaction that reform of the House of Lords would be the subject of a measure at the next session of parliament. This was followed by the presentation, by Lord Farnham and General Prescott Decie, of the case against negotiations with the Sinn Fein on behalf of that section of Southern Irish Unionists opposed to the policy of Lord Middleton and his party, who are in disagreement with the Ulster demand for separate dominions for North and South Ireland. The speakers contended that "peace purchased from the Sinn Fein by the weakness of the government" would contain no element of permanence.

Feared Disintegration.

General Gretton in moving his resolution and referring to a proposed amendment by Sir Laming Worthington-Evans, secretary for war, wishing success to the Irish peace negotiations, said that the "watering down of the motion" would ultimately lead to the disintegration and destruction of the Conservative-Unionist party.

"We must accept the Irish conference as an accomplished fact," he said, "but it is a hopeless enterprise unless one side or the other is prepared to sacrifice something vital."

Colonel Martin Archer-Shee, Unionist member of parliament for Finsbury, seconding the Gretton motion, said that as soon as the negotiations broke down, as they surely would, the Conservatives should leave the coalition and set up a government which would really govern the country.

"I am sick and tired of a government that is carrying out a radical policy and which is led by a radical leader," he explained.

Lord Middleton said the commercial and landed classes in Ireland were in favor of a settlement. If hostilities were resumed, he declared the garrisons would have to be three times as powerful as at present and the post offices, railways, and banks, would have to be closed.

CONTEST BIRDS HAVE NOT YET SET A PACE

The twenty pens of birds taking part in the second New Brunswick egg laying contest have apparently not yet got into their stride as they only produced 33 eggs last week. The total production of eggs to date is just 60. The leaders of contest are a pen of White Wyandottes owned by Mrs. George Danby of North Devon which have fourteen eggs to their credit. Barred Rocks belonging to W. E. B. Tait of Dorchester are in second place with 12 eggs, while Barred pens owned by Allen and Ferguson of this city and C. M. Peart of Havelock tie for the third place with 10 eggs each. The Experimental Farm pen of Wyandottes produced 7 eggs and a Barred Rock pen from the same place 3. A pen of Rocks owned by L. B. Johnston of Nashwaaksis has produced 2 eggs to date.

BLUEBEARD MAY GO FREE

Versailles, Nov. 17.—A dramatic announcement made in open court today by Henri Landru that he would produce before the court one of the missing women the prosecution charges him with having murdered proved the climax of the trial of the so-called "Bluebeard of Gambaise."

The opinion was general in the court room that if Landru can make good his declaration he most surely will be acquitted but that if he fails to do so he will be guillotined.

TRADE TAKES A BIG SLUMP

Ottawa, Nov. 17.—The grand total of Canadian trade for the month of October 1921, amounted to \$140,774,401 as compared with \$236,917,037 in October 1920. Merchandise imported during October this year was valued at \$59,518,248 as against \$105,770,037 for October last year. Duty collected in October 1921 amounted to \$9,270,498. Duty collected in October, 1920, was \$14,872,440.

GREAT BRITAIN AND JAPAN RAISE SOME OBJECTIONS TO ARMAMENT LIMITATIONS

Not Much Progress Can be Made by the Conference Until Japan's Reply to China's Declaration of Rights is Forthcoming—Some Discussion in the Far Eastern Problem.

Washington, Nov. 17.—The Far Eastern negotiations await the reply of Japan to China's declaration of rights and the move for limitations of naval armaments is slowing up because of objections raised both by Japan and Great Britain.

Discussion of the Far Eastern problems, which for the moment are in the foreground of the arms conference, were advanced by the Big Nine today to the point of an agreement that a general exchange of views of China's programme should precede any consideration of specific points. Such a general presentation of views Japan was unprepared to make, and the Big Nine adjourned until Saturday.

JAPAN AGREES

Meantime Japan made known formally her desire to modify the Hughes plan of naval limitation so as to give her a "slightly greater" relative strength and the opposition of the British to the submarine quota suggested by the United States gave evidence of such determination as to attract the attention of the whole body of delegates.

The day's work seemed to indicate that the first impetus of the conference was giving way to a period of more deliberate discussion which might preclude the possibility of outstanding developments for the immediate future. Plans were made, however, to tackle the third big job of the conference, the limitation of land armament, early next week at an open session at which Premier Briand will make a far-reaching declaration of the views of France.

The Big Nine's session on the Far Eastern questions today was largely given over to a discussion of the method of procedure. The decision to permit each of the powers to present a general statement on the subject before attempting to settle specific problems is understood to have had the endorsement of all the heads of delegations, although Japan made it plain she accepted the Chinese plan only "as a basis for discussion". It was decided also that when specific points are reached the Chinese "ten points" are to be interlaced with the items of the United States agenda in determining details of procedure.

SIR GEO. FOSTER THE ATTRACTION AT THE GAIETY LAST NIGHT

Ex Minister Was Greeted by a Large Audience—Handed Out a Lot of Old Stuff and Sang the Praises of the Meighen Government.

The political meeting in the intervals of an hour and it goes without saying that he put the best foot forward for the moribund administration now misruling at Ottawa. Sir George although he is now past the three score and ten mark, is still young in spirit and a very good hand at the bellows. He still labors under the belief that the Tory party made Canada and ruled the country by divine right. He devoted a lot of attention to the Liberal leader and his policy, and repeated some of the old shop-worn arguments used by the Tories prior to 1896. He defended all the iniquitous acts of the Meighen government, but gracefully skirted over the charges made by Mr. Murdoch of the Board of Commerce that he (Foster) had prevented that body from getting after the profiteers and had shown the greatest indifference to the interests of the public. He also blamed the Liberals for the railway problem of today, but made no mention of the millions which the Borden government paid into the coffers of MacKenzie & Mann, to enable them to provide a third Transcontinental railway. The ex-Finance Minister spoke with his old time vigor and while his arguments failed to convince they sounded good and pleased the dyed-in-the-wool Tories in the audience.

Was Present at Meeting

Lady Foster, who accompanied her husband to the city, was present at the meeting and attracted considerable attention. During the evening she was presented with a handsome bouquet by the Conservative ladies of the city.

HON MR. KING NOW IN THE WEST; MAKES STRONG APPEAL FOR UNITY OF CLASSES IN CANADA

DALHOUSIE OVERWHELMED U. N. B. TEAM

Score at Truro Thursday Was Six Tried to Nil—U. N. B. Away Off Color.

Truro, N. S., Nov. 17.—Swamping their opponents in the scrim and their backfield covering in fine style, the Tigers of Dalhousie University were victorious today over the rugby fifteen of University of New Brunswick by a score of 18 to 0.

Never in Doubt.

Never throughout the game was the issue in doubt. The Gold and Black assumed the initiative from the start and outplayed their rivals in every department. Only once did the New Brunswickers have a chance to score and then Hagerman in his anxiety, kicked the ball over the goal line, which gave Dalhousie a twenty-five yard drop out. Every department of the Tiger machine seemed to function at its best with the forwards and quarters showing up to perfection. Langwith, Beaton and Moore never played better, the punting of the former and the dribbling of the latter proving valuable features of the game. Every man in the scrim excelled. The aggressive work of R. McLean, Smith and Sutherland spoiled the few freak plays which the Fredericton players attempted to put across. The Dal back division showed up well in spots, but lacked scoring ability.

A Disappointment.

On the other hand the play of the New Brunswickers was a distinct disappointment after what the spectators had been led to expect by their previous performances.

Once the U. N. B. halves, combined passing it out to "Chip" Seely, who got away on a diagonal run that sent a thrill through the spectators, but, although he made a splendid gain, he was forced in touch just when he was within a yard of crossing the line. Dalhousie entangled themselves from their precarious position with a good kick, and from then on to the end of the game had things pretty much their own way.

Previous to the game, Captain Trimble, of the U. N. B. team, received a telegram from Acadia University stating that Langwith, R. McLean and Porter, were ineligible to take part in the game owing to being conditioned in several of their last year's subjects. On this being commented to Manager MacInnes of the Tigers, he stated distinctly that as far as he knew these players were correctly registered and eligible to play intercollegiate football. The players concerned had participated in games against St. Francis Xavier and Kings and no question had been raised as to their eligibility.

Under these circumstances there fore Captain Trimble stated that the game would be played under protest. In view of the outcome, however, it is understood he has raised the protest and there therefore Dalhousie is the recognized winner of the intercollegiate league for the year 1921.

The University of New Brunswick team arrived here this morning from Truro. Its members have nothing to say with regard to the match which Dal won in so decisive a fashion except that the winners were playing at the top of their form and U. N. B. never played more poorly all season. Capt. Trimble who was on the half line had not recovered from his injury and should not have been played. Dalhousie they say outclassed U. N. B. in all departments.

There is no doubt that the long period without practice was fatal to the Red and Black team. It is a fortnight today since the game against Mt. ISSUES WARNING TO THE WEST

The Premier a Party to the Betrayal of the Nation in 1917—Liberals Have Always Displayed a Friendly Feeling for the Farmers—The Riordon Case.

Moose Jaw, Sask., Nov. 17.—Another warning to the people of the Prairie provinces that they were liable to bring about political isolation by their course "in seeking to defeat both parties and support a third class group," was given by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King at this afternoon's meeting in the armoury here. The Liberal leader also declared that Premier Meighen's claim of "no pledge in 1917" showed the prime minister to the betrayal of this nation."

When Mr. King was charging the government with having "hung to power after the war," a man in the said: "No Liberals had resigned in protest."

"Why all who resigned were Liberals," declared Mr. King as he named the ministers who left the Union government.

"There was one man you elected from this riding, Hon. J. A. Cader, who did not resign. Did any of you elect to have him remain in the government as long as he could and then find a life job in the senate?"

(Cries of no, no).

Friendship For Farmers. The Liberal leader asserted that the record of the Liberal party showed also friendship for the farmers of the west.

The speaker dealt with the tariff and declared his policy of downward revision would be best for all Canada.

Mr. King again renewed his challenge to produce any two of his tariff speeches which differed. He had made the same statement from the Atlantic to the Pacific he said. He believed in a revenue tariff revised to protect the consumer and not to add to manufacturer's profits.

Dealing with taxation, Mr. King declared the farmers were being badgered in regard to their payments while some big companies like the Riordon Company got away by giving promissory notes.

Dealings with the difference between Liberal and Progressive platforms, Mr. King declared it would be almost impossible to put any reforms through the senate "because of the Tory majority there." Mr. King closed with a strong appeal for unity of classes in Canada.
