NEW MILL—Eale & Murchie's Mill has been completed and has now commenced the regular work of sawing. It is a well equipped mill and cuts fast.

SIDEWALK—Ald. Duffie is receiving great credit from the people of the Lower Mills for his activity in getting the sidewalk placed there. One is now about completed.

NEW PROFESSOR—John Davidson of Edinburgh has been appointed to the Chair of Moral and Mental Philosophy at the University of New Brunswick, in place of Dr. W. C. Murray resigned.

(Prof. Davidson was a distinguished member of the U. N. B. faculty for some years. Ill-health compelled him to resign. He died in Scotland).

IMPROVED—Phillip Cox, B. A., of Margerville who has been at the hospital here for some weeks was able to take a walk out on Tuesday and is rapidly getting better.

CONTRACT AWARDED—H. B. Clark has been awarded the contract for the erection of the auxiliary engine house at the Water Works. W. J. Scarr has the contract for the new exhibition building and is speedily getting to work.

FROM A CRUISE—Gns. Tweeddale with several friends has returned from a sporting and exploring expedition to Cain's River. His camp was visited by George Hanson and Thos. Likely of Marysville. They report trout plentiful and many signs of deer.

GONE WEST—Jerry Harrison of the Bank of Nova Scotia, has gone to Chicago from Halifax to take a position in the new branch just being opened there. He is a son of C. B. Harrison, M.P.P., and has had quite a service in several branches of the Nova Scotia Bank.

THE CITY'S PET—The sturgeon that has been a captain during the summer in the Phoenix Square fountain on Friday was snared by G. Sussan, caught and carried to the river and set at liberty. Grove says that the sturgeon winked one eye as a token that he wished success to the Celestial, gave a flip of his tail to the City Clerk and took a header for the St. John Falls.

A GOOD STRING—W. R. Dunbar occupies the sheds at the entrance to Trotting Park and has a string of good ones in his care, a number of which he will probably start in the fall races. Mr. Dunbar has been very successful this season, having fitted, mated and sold the chestnut team belonging to Isaac Peabody at the Banger Fair for \$500 clear of expenses. Among the horses handled by D. J. Stockford may be mentioned the four-year-old Nellie by Kearsarge, owned by Alex. Gibson Jr. She has lately shown her ability to put up a mile in 36½ or better.

NEW RIVER STEAMER—There is a prospect that next year will see the fastest boat that ever plowed the waters of the St. John. The new boat is to be built at a cost of about \$50,000 and will be guaranteed to make the trip from St. John to Fredericton in five hours. About \$12,000 of this stock will be subscribed by Fredericton citizens at \$50 per share. Farmers and residents on each side of the river will be asked to take stock. The remaining stocks will be placed at St. John. (The new boat was never built but the agitation led to the Star Line Company building and placing on the route the splendid steamer Victoria now the property of the Victoria S. S. Co.)
