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LORD HALDANE'S VIEWS

Lord Haldane's visit to Canada gave very little comfort to the emergency seeking jingoes of the Borden government and their supporters in the press. Great efforts have been made to magnify the British Lord Chancellor's statesmanlike utterances into an appeal for the Borden \$35,000,000. Nothing could have been further from Lord Haldane's thoughts, if his words expressed his views, as they undoubtedly did.

Lord Haldane at Montreal declared that the British navy was "of course the most proficient and powerful in the world," that there would never be the slightest chance for conscription, as Great Britain has an indefinitely better supply of free sailors than any other country could possibly get with or without conscription. As to Canada's share, he simply said:

"If you decide to come to our aid, it would be a great help to the United Kingdom and a considerable source of strength to the empire."

Not one word to indicate whether Lord Haldane preferred \$35,000,000 cash or a Canadian navy, only a reflection on the Tory party in reversing the situation as it was at the time of the unanimous resolution of parliament in 1909. He emphatically declared that the manner of aiding was a matter for Canada to decide for herself. Nowhere in any of Lord Haldane's utterances was there the slightest sign of misgiving as to Great Britain's future. He gave no idea of the "Weary Titan" calling for help. He emphatically declared that if Canada did not care to assist the Mother Country she was capable of bearing the burden of the empire alone.

The Borden emergency is as hopelessly discredited as is the Borden government.

WHY THIS INACTION

It is something like eight months since the Royal Commission appointed under the Liberal government to investigate the United Shoe Machinery Company's business under the anti-trust legislation (passed by the Liberal government) sent in its report. The company was warned, as a monopoly in restraint of trade, that it must within six months change its business so as to abandon its monopolistic methods. The company went on with its business. When the six months were up it was sent a perfunctory enquiry by the government and returned a reply which no one seemed to understand. Since then nothing has been done. It is evident that the company knew the change of government meant a change of policy where "the interests" were concerned. It is also evident that the Borden government is as anxious not to enforce anti-trust legislation which might discommodate its friends, the trusts, as it is determined to neglect the Liberal labor legislation when it might bother the same friends.

Mr. Samuel Price, law partner of Hon. T. W. Crothers, the minister of labor, has made such a record of failure as commissioner at the British Columbia coal mine strikes that he has been given another job. In fact, Mr. Samuel Price is almost permanently in government employ, at large pay, for work of one kind or another. This time Mr. Samuel Price has been selected to investigate charges against the immigration inspector at Bridgeburg, Ont. Mr. Price should know his work well enough by now to make sure that within a short time there will be another job open for a well-trained Tory at Bridgeburg, Ont.

Potatoes are selling in Carleton County for seventy cents per barrel, while across the American border in Houlton they are worth \$1.10.

The merchants along Queen street should keep their stores lighted every night next week.

Labor Day, the day appointed by the Liberal government for celebrating the advances of labor interests, was celebrated throughout Canada with great eclat. Reports do not show that it was the occasion of any particular rejoicing in the strike-stricken district of British Columbia. Nor is it on record that the Dominion government evinced any great interest in the occasion, except that the premier allowed Hon. Mr. Crothers to get away to England, in order to hide his incompetence as minister of labor.

The press of Canada, irrespective of party, are warmly praising Hon. J. C. Doherty for taking Thaw by the scruff of the neck and thrusting him across the American boundary. The Montreal Telegraph puts the whole matter in a nutshell when it says: "For this action Mr. Doherty is deserving the thanks of every fair-minded citizen of the Dominion."

Has anyone yet discovered what Canada gained by the six months' journey to the ends of the earth taken by Hon. Mr. Foster, ostensibly to advance Canada's trade interests? When the next auditor general's report comes out the people will learn that Mr. Foster's expenses were by no means so small as his performances.

Hon. Mr. Hazen ought to muster up sufficient courage soon to return to New Brunswick and grapple with the judgeship and other problems awaiting solution.

Both opponents and supporters give Premier Flemming credit for one thing—they say he is one of few men who know how to make money out of politics.

Laying all jokes aside, the members of the Flemming government are certainly a happy family.

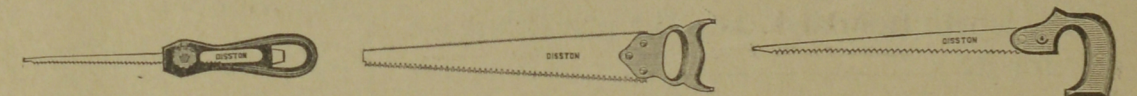
