ACCIDENT AT  
HIGHWAY BRIDGE

Frank Booker of This City Terribly Hurt This Morning---Falling Sheathing Struck Him Across Back--- Others Jumped

The third serious accident at the repair-work on the Fredericton-St. Mary's highway bridge occurred just before noon today when Frank Booker of this city, was struck across the kidneys by a piece of hard-pine sheathing and very seriously hurt. How grave the injury is will not be known for some hours, says Dr. H. H. McNally, the physician summoned to attend him. No bones were broken but external injuries were caused. Internal hurt is also feared but its extent will not be known until after further developments.

## SUFFERING INTENSELY.

The ambulance of Victoria Public Hospital was summoned and conveyed the injured man to his home at the corner of Westmorland and George streets. He suffered most intense agony as a result of the injury.

## THE CIRCUMSTANCES.

The large derrick on the upper side of the bridge was being used to swing a small pile driver into position underneath the temporary span. The derrick-boom was not properly gauged, according to the statement of eye-witnesses and the weight of the pile-driver swung it around. The pile-driver crashed against the hard-pine sheathing which stood upon end ready for driving to form the coffer-

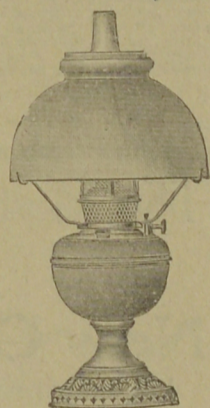

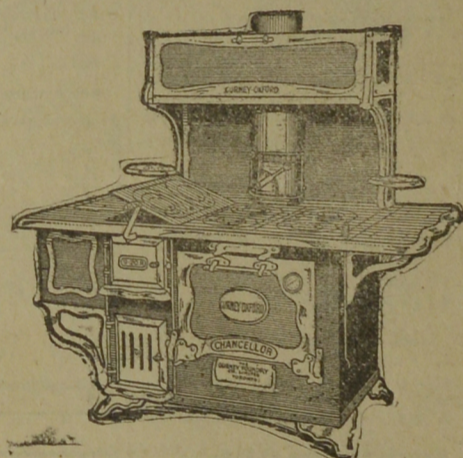
