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PROGRESSIVE LEADER OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN IN NOVA SCOTIA: HELD MEETING AT ANTIGONISH

ECONOMIC ISSUE IS DEALT WITH

Says Nova Scotia Has Suffered From the Application of Protection—Trade With the New England States Should Have Been Developed—Government Boodle Fund.

Antigonish, N. S., Oct. 28.—The entry of Hon. T. A. Crerar into the Nova Scotia political field took place today at Antigonish in the constituency of Antigonish-Guysboro. Formerly represented in the house by J. H. Sinclair who has retired from the whirl of politics, Antigonish-Guysboro will have a three-cornered fight. Walter Macneill is Conservative candidate. C. F. McIsaac is running as a Liberal and D. A. McIsaac, a nephew of the Liberal candidate, is out as Progressive. Antigonish is represented in the Nova Scotia Legislative Assembly by a Liberal and a farmer, and Guysboro by two Liberals.

Mr. Crerar dealt more particularly today with some aspects of the economic issue as touching on Nova Scotia. Had protection made Canada prosperous? he asked. "Your young men and young women in Nova Scotia," he said, "have gone to the United States because they did not have the opportunities here they should have had. Fifty years ago this was a prosperous country. If there is any part of this Dominion which has suffered from the application of protection, it is the province of Nova Scotia. Your geographical position is such that you should prosper from the development of maritime trade as Great Britain has prospered.

Should Develop Trade.

You have the conditions to enable you to produce foodstuffs. The population of New England States is growing and your trade with them should have been developed. They need foodstuffs and who is better able to supply them than the maritime provinces? But our policy has been directed in another direction, with the result that you have a population which is growing very slowly indeed."

Touching on the formation of mergers in Canada, Mr. Crerar declared that the entire people of Canada had to pay more for cotton goods in order that a few people might make big profits and a few thousand people be employed some times at starvation wages.

Mr. Crerar said that the government was spending huge sums in propaganda and asked where the money was coming from. Cabinet ministers in their desire for propaganda, he said, had even gone into the movies along with Charlie Chaplin and Mary Pickford. He denied that in co-operating, Western farmers had any desire to increase prices to the users of their grain. All that they were doing was to cut out the profits of the middle man and lessen the cost of marketing. The price of wheat was asked not by Western farmers but by world conditions. D. A. McIsaac, the Progressive candidate made a plea for representation of the "common people" in parliament.

A POINTER FOR CO-EDS

MAY BE THREE CANDIDATES IN THE FIELD

Mr. E. W. Stairs Said to Have Consented to Carry the Progressive Standard in York-Sunbury.

It was stated today by members of the executive of the People's Progressive party, that Mr. E. W. Stairs, who was tendered the nomination by a convention here a fortnight ago, had been prevailed upon to remain in the field. A protracted meeting of the executive was held here yesterday afternoon when matters relating to the campaign were discussed and at the close Mr. Stairs was communicated with by telephone and it is said consented to run. During his visit to the city last week Mr. Stairs told a number of his friends that it would be impossible for him to accept a nomination. At the party convention a fortnight ago after a unanimous nomination had been tendered him, Mr. Stairs asked for and was granted a week or ten days to think the matter over, and promised to make his decision known through the press. So far as known he has not done this, so it would seem that he has not yet definitely made up his mind just what course to pursue. Should he remain in the field it will mean a three cornered fight in York-Sunbury.

THE PREMIER IN TORONTO

Toronto, Oct. 28.—"I am not here begging on my own behalf or on behalf of any member of my government. I am here to lay before you the great issue at stake, which you must decide." With these words, Premier Meighen prefaced a speech delivered to nearly five thousand people gathered in Massey Hall this evening—a speech in which he defined the lines of policy which had actuated the government in the past, reaffirmed his belief in a fiscal programme of moderate protection in Canada, and declared his intention of following the course which the government had pursued in tariff matters if returned to power.

The premier did not mean to say that the government had come through the years of war and the period of reconstruction following it without some mistakes, but he insisted that the mistakes had been small.

CAN RECOVER BETS BY CHECK

London, Oct. 28.—A far reaching and for England, sensational decision has been rendered by the House of Lords in a ruling that money paid by check in settlement of a gambling debt is recoverable by the loser.

The decision opens an avenue for possible litigation involving hundreds of thousands of pounds sterling and if all losers insisted upon their rights under the law it would mean to ruin of scores of the bookmakers who do a big business at all the race meetings. The ruling has caused a furore in sporting circles, and the bookmakers have called a special meeting to consider the situation.

DR. M. CLARK WILL RUN

Calgary, Oct. 28.—Dr. Michael Clark will accept the nomination tendered him by the Liberals of MacKenzie constituency in Saskatchewan.

In answer to a question telegraphed to him at Olds today, he wired:—"Will accept nomination of Liberals at MacKenzie constituency."

SAYS FRIENDS OF PROGRESSIVE SHOULD UNITE AGAINST THE MEIGHEN GOVERNMENT

The Liberal Chieftain Conducting a Vigorous Campaign in Ontario—The Liberal Platform Takes Full Account of the Needs of the Farmers—Quotes Letter From Dr. Michael Clark, M. P.

Stouffville, Ont., Oct. 28.—It had been found, said Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King in addressing a meeting here this afternoon, that parties were only a means to an end. He believed that all friends of real progress should unite and present one undivided front to the enemy of progress.

Women were today a new political force in Canada, Mr. King said; that far from having a right to plume themselves upon giving the women the vote, the present government had deliberately taken away their vote by the war time election act.

THE FARMERS' NEEDS

The Liberal platform of 1919, said Mr. King, took full account of the needs of the farmers. Practically since 1917 he had been a candidate for North York. He was not in the riding opposing farmers as farmers, but he was opposing any class standing for the rights of a class whether they were exploiting the people in the way. Mr. King quoted from a letter written him by Dr. Michael Clark, who had just accepted Liberal nomination in Mackenzie.

"I have now come to see that a well-balanced Liberalism is the only hope for the country between the new Toryism and the old for what is Toryism and what has it always been? Simple class rule with a view to securing special privileges."

Only united forces, said Mr. King, could meet and conquer the industrial plutocrats behind the political powers of the day.

Speaking of the national railways, the Liberal leader said that it had been found that there was an interlocking of directorates which would wreck any concern. Vast contracts for insurance and equipment had been given to companies, directors of which were also directors of the Canadian National Railways.

CAMPAIGN FUNDS

Mr. Crerar said the Liberal leader desired publicity for campaign funds. The Liberal party had shown itself solidly for this reform when the matter came up in the house. The progressives had no monopoly in this respect.

Comparing the platform of the Progressives, the National council of women the labor platform and the legislative requirements, of the G. W. V. A., Mr. King said that where their aims for improvements seemed to outdistance those of the Liberals it was only in matters which were quite behind practical success. There were two houses of parliament, and Mr. King believed that in future it would be a real impossibility to get anything through the senate, filled as it was, with appointees of Mr. Meighen.

MORRISSY NAMED IN NORTH- UMBERLAND

Newcastle, Oct. 28.—Hon. John Morrissey, former minister of public works in the Clark government, was chosen as the Liberal candidate in the coming federal election in Northumberland, at the Liberal convention held here today. Hon. Mr. Morrissey's name was placed in nomination by James Robinson, of Middleton, and Daniel Cripps, W. B. Snowball was nominated by A. G. Dickison, of Napun and Charles Williston, of Bay Du Vin. On the ballot Hon. Mr. Morrissey received 119 votes and Mr. Snowball 57. On motion the nomination of Hon. Mr. Morrissey was made unanimous.

About 400 were present at the convention including 176 delegates. Every parish in the constituency was represented. Dr. McGrath, who was chairman of the convention, was made permanent president of the Liberal Association of Northumberland county.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey in addressing the meeting expressed his thanks for the honor conferred upon him and said that if elected, he would faithfully serve the interests of the people. Mr. Snowball also delivered a timely address.

Divorce Court.

The New Brunswick Court of Divorce and matrimonial Causes will begin its November term on Tuesday next. The docket is expected to be short not many cases being ready for trial at this term. The following term probably will have a docket as large as the averages.

MRS. NESBIT ATTEMPTS TO END HER LIFE

New York, Oct. 28.—Evelyn Nesbit one time wife of Harry K. Thaw, took an overdose of morphine today and screamed to a marshal, posted outside her apartment to evict her that she had swallowed enough poison to kill twenty persons. She will recover, however, a physician said after making a hurry call and using the stomach pump. Recently, her theatre district tea room was closed, and she has been facing eviction proceedings.

Interfered With Train.

A man arrested Thursday near McAdam by C. P. R. police and brought to this city, was fined fifty dollars and costs in the police court this morning. The man stated that he had been drinking but no charge of drunkenness was preferred against him the accused attempted to take charge of a train running from Montreal to St. John. He drove several men out of the car which he was in, and three times put out all the lights. He also stopped the train by pulling the signalling cord and the cord had to be disconnected. He paid his fine.

Game Violations.

Chief Game Warden G. F. Warden has received a report of the killing of a cow moose in Albert County. The man who did the killing has acknowledged but his trial has not yet taken place. Two game cases are to be tried in the Fredericton police court on Monday. Five convictions with fines recently were recorded at St. Martin's.

KING'S COLLEGE BEATEN 8 TO 3 BY U.N.B. TEAM

Chip Seely and Lounsbury Each Scored a Try—King's Scored on Penalty.

Windsor, N. S., Oct. 28.—In what was a close and exciting game, U. N. B. arrived from Wolfville this morning and the game commenced at 2.30. On the line up it was soon seen that the U. N. B. team had the advantage in weight, but at the time King's rushed them hard and in a few minutes McCoy made an attempt at a field goal but was unsuccessful. U. N. B. returned strong and Lounsbury scored from a mix-up and this try was successfully converted. The period ended in midfield with the score 5-0 in favor of U. N. B.

The second period found U. N. B. going hard, but they were soon forced back. C. Seely managed to break away and made a fine run from mid-field and scored. This was not converted King's now seemed to buck up and a King's quarter made a long run up the field but the try was not allowed by the referee. The play continued on the U. N. Seely starred for U. N. B. while McCoy was easily the star man on the King's team. Ross, in the Kings forward line, made some pretty gains.

Mr. Judd refereed. There were many penalty kicks given on both sides. The King's athletic club entertained the U. N. B. team and rooters to a dance tonight. U. N. B. leaves by way of Digby tomorrow.

CENSUS RETURNS DISAPPOINTING

Quebec Not Likely to Show the Expected Increase of Population—The West Expected to be Between 35,000 and 36,000—Nova Scotia Will Lose One Member.

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 28.—Quebec's immoderate hopes as to total population are doomed to disappointment. In stead of the two and a half millions confidently anticipated by Quebecers it appears almost certain now that the results of the census will show that province to have somewhat between 2,300,000 and 2,350,000 people. This is of tremendous electoral significance to the rest of Canada as it means that the unit of representation in the house of commons will be between 35,000 and 36,000 instead of the 38,461 which has been accepted hitherto on the basis of Quebec's expectations it had 2,032,000 in 1911 and the unit of representation was about 30,000 which gave Ontario eighty-two seats; Nova Scotia, sixteen; Prince Edward Island, four; New Brunswick eleven; Manitoba, sixteen; British Columbia, thirteen; Yukon, eleven, and Quebec as always sixty five.

Politicians believed that 38,461 would lose eight seats. Now late, though partial and unofficial information makes it apparent that Ontario will probably not lose more than four seats. On the new basis, Nova Scotia will have fifteen seats instead of sixteen, New Brunswick will probably retain the eleven seats she now has and Prince Edward Island have three instead of four seats. That will mean a total of 172 seats for the provinces east of Manitoba, a loss of six seats.

West Will Gain.

The west will gain proportionately but not nearly to the extent expected by westerners. British Columbia especially, which expects the census will show a population of 600,000 is doomed to disappointment. The population so far as known is as follows:

Nova Scotia 525,579 announced, New Brunswick, 388,092 announced; Prince Edward Island, 88,536, announced; a total of 1,001,207 for the Maritime provinces. The census bureau will not even give an estimate or any indication of the population of the other provinces, but a rough and ready estimate may be made up from various announcements already made of urban population and unofficial advices received from various parts of Canada of what has leaked out here and there of the local results attained. One might make a guess for Ontario and Quebec as follows: Quebec about 2,350,000; Ontario about 2,709,000 or in all 6,060,207 for eastern Canada leaving considerably less than two and a half millions for the three prairie provinces, British Columbia and the Yukon, at the most there could be an increase of only thirteen seats for Canada west of Ontario, which would give a house of commons of 242 members and it will probably be three or four less.

LIBERALS ON THE ALERT

Woodstock, Oct. 28.—A well attended meeting of the Liberal executive of Carleton-Victoria was held in Andover last night when the question of putting a candidate in the field for this constituency was discussed. No action was taken. A committee was appointed for organization of the Liberal forces who will begin work at once to keep votes from B. Frank Smith.
