IRISH GIRLS WILL MAKE A DAINY OUTFIT OF BRIDAL LACE FOR THE PRINCESS MARY

SHAMROCK AS AN ORNAMENT

Lingerie for Trousseau to Be
of the Finest Weaves—Royal
Wedding Gown to be Cre-
ation of a Man Dressmaker
of London, Who Has Had
Much Experience.

London, Dec. 14—Lining up with the
spirit of the hour Princess Mary has
accepted an offer of bridal lingerie to
be fashioned by a score of Irish peas-
ant girls, picked needle workers, who
will design the regal dainties with the
shamrock interwoven. The material
will be the finest Irish linen and will
be delivered by the Royal Irish Indus-
tries Association. There will be six
pieces of each article in the set of
lingerie which will be produced under
the finest possible workmanship with
real lace placed around the necks and
sleeves of the garments.

The extensive plans for the bridal
trousseau have brought out many in-
timate details. Her nightdresses will
have short sleeves and satin ribbon
about an inch wide, in the favorite
color of the Princess, pale blue, will
be threaded around the waist through
lace encrusted loops. Beauty and sim-
plicity will be the keynote of all her
garments, but each set will differ in
certain finer points. It is even an-
nounced that shamrocks will be used
in the lace on some of her gowns, with
shoulder straps of white ribbon. In
fact all the garments will be white,
with pale blue trimmings.

Princess Mary will also have white
knitted frocks, made by the girls of
Donegal, which is the home of hand
knitting. These girl workers' cure fish
in the fishing season and knit at other
times. The Princess plans to wear
knitted frocks on her honeymoon
abroad. These will be made of the
finest wool in white, with a plain bod-
ice and short sleeves, and a deep
flounce for the skirt. For travelling
she plans to wear Irish tweed suits.

The wedding gown itself will be
made by a London man dressmaker,
who has made royal bridal gowns be-
fore. The designs for the gown have
not yet been decided upon but prob-
ably will follow the precedent set by
many other royal brides and will be
of hand woven brocade, with a design
symbolizing the British Isles. It is
estimated that ten weeks will be ne-
cessary for the designing and weaving
of the fabric and the preparation of
looms for the special design. Former
soldiers now working at the looms will
be entrusted with part of the work.

Contributions for wedding gifts al-
ready have been started and promise
to reveal the rare place which Prin-
cess Mary has won in the hearts of
the people. There will be a gift from
"all the Marys," and the Girl Guides
numbering over 200,000, are campaign-
ing for a contribution from each girl
which is certain to be successful, be-
cause the Princess was one of the first
guides and is still the president of
the organization.

Reports indicate that the Dominions
are taking an equal interest in raising
funds of distinctive and varied char-
acter. It is probable that many of the
gifts will be devoted to charity by
Princess Mary's wish, but they will
only be more highly prized for that.
Many of the funds will be delayed un-
til after Christmas.

POWER SURVEY TO BE FINISHED IN SHORT TIME

Moncton City Council Then
Will Be Asked to Furnish
Statement of Current Re-
quirements.

C. O. Foss, Chief Engineer of the
New Brunswick Power Commission
who is here today, states that the
survey for the transmission line from
St. John to Moncton by which cur-
rent from the Musquash develop-
ment would be delivered at Moncton,
is proceeding satisfactorily and will
be completed according to present ex-
pectation, within twenty days.

The line followed by the survey is
shorter than either the railway or the
highroad between the two cities. It
was impossible to survey a line
along either of those because the
high tension wires of the Power Com-
mission would interfere with the tele-
phone and telegraph wires through
induction.

On the completion of the survey
the Moncton City Council will be asked
to furnish a statement of the cur-
rent requirements of the city. After
that the Commission will proceed
with estimates.

NOTABLES AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, Dec. 13—The name of Sir
Lomer Gouin former premier of Que-
bec and member elect for the constitu-
ency of Laurier-Outremont, was added
to the list of those of the new mem-
bers of parliament having consulta-
tions with Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King
premier elect this evening.

Sir Lomer arrived from Montreal at
7.30 and in company with Hon. Rodol-
ph Lemieux met Hon. Mr. King at
dinner and afterwards went to the
leaders office in the parliament build-
ings.

Several other prominent members-
elect also visited Hon. Mr. King dur-
ing the afternoon. These include: Hon.
W. S. Fielding, Hon. H. S. Beland, Hon.
Charles Marcell, T. A. Low (South
Renfrew), W. D. EEuler (North Wat-
erloo), and others.

Hon. Mr. King left tonight for To-
ronto and will spend tomorrow in the
constituency of North York returning
to Ottawa tomorrow night. Before his
departure for Toronto the premier-
elect said that he had nothing to give
out on the matter of cabinet forma-
tion.

GRIMMER HAS 133 MAJORITY

St. Andrews, Dec. 13—R. Watson
Grimmer, Conservative, was officially
declared elected today for the consti-
tuency of Charlotte with a majority of
133. The total was: Grimmer, 5,22;
Todd, 5,069. The proceedings were en-
tirely formal with a small attendance.
R. W. Grimmer the member-elect, and
W. F. Todd the Liberal candidate
were present. Following the declara-
tion Mr. Todd and Mr. Grimmer both ex-
tended a hearty vote of thanks to
Sheriff R. A. Stuart and officers for
the able and impartial manner in
which they had performed their
duties.

Assistance Needed.

Lack of employment has caused
some families in this city to feel the
pinch of want already this winter.
The case of two families in which
the husbands could get no work, was
considered recently by a fraternal
society and one of the churches also
has taken up the matter. Another
case of the wife of a returned sol-
dier who went out west during the
autumn also is receiving attention.

THE LIBERAL CHIEFTAIN TO FORM STRONG CABINET; GOOD MATERIAL AT HAND

Hon. W. S. Fielding Will Have His Old Portfolio of Finance
Minister—Sir Lomer Gouin May be Minister of Trade and
Commerce—Prominent Westerners to Have Portfolios—
Drury's Name is Mentioned.

Ottawa, Dec. 13—A strong national cabinet under Hon.
W. L. Mackenzie King for the troublous days ahead is now
an assured certainty. Hon. W. S. Fielding will be the pilot
through the storm as minister of finance, and there are few
young men with minds so able and energetic for tackling great
national problems such as are involved in the public debt, the
railway deficits and the expenses of the government. Allied
with that will go hand in hand a much needed and up-to-date
modern administration of the department of trade and com-
merce under Sir Lomer Gouin, in all probability. One interest-
ing possibility is raised in the fact that a messenger is now
proceeding west, and though everything is yet in the specula-
tive stage it would not be surprising if his object is to induce
the man who built up the great grain-growing organizations of
the west to be minister of railways, a key position.

Hon. A. B. Hudson would then be a certainty for minister
of the interior, and some other westerner as minister of immi-
gration and colonization, perhaps Hon. W. R. Motherwell or
Premier Martin. J. A. Robb, chief Liberal whip while in oppo-
sition, is expected to be Protestant representative from Quebec
and to give a much needed business administration to customs
and excise department. Ernest Lapointe now seems a surety
for minister of justice.

KING TO NORTH YORK

Hon. Mr. King left tonight for North York, ostensibly to
take part in a celebration there, but it would not be surprising
if when there he discussed the Ontario situation with Premier
Drury, who was a Liberal before being a Progressive. W. C.
Kennedy will in all likelihood be the Irish Catholic representa-
tive in the cabinet.

Until Hon. A. K. MacLean gets here, no final arrangements
will be made with regard to maritime representation. There is
every evidence, however, that Hon. Mr. King will do all that is
possible in the formation of the cabinet to heal the wounds in
the Liberal party caused by the split over conscription. Every
section of the population will be represented both in territory
and industry. Some new names now mentioned for the cabinet
are F. F. Pardee and T. A. Low. James Murdoch will be asked
to come in as minister of labor. There is a possibility that Hon.
R. Lemieux may go to the senate to be Liberal leader there, and
Hon. Hewitt Bostock become speaker. It is the intention of
getting all the big Liberals of the country into working harness
in responsible positions, if not in the cabinet elsewhere.

THIS STORK DELIVERED THE GOODS

New York, Dec. 12—The story of
the stork herefore has been a legend.
But this is a true story and you
may draw your own conclusions. Capt
Jonas Pendlebury of the steamship
Centennial State of the United States
Lines, which arrived at Hoboken to-
day from London attests its veracity.
Outward bound from London, Nov.
30, the Centennial State anchored in
a fog off the Downs. A stork migrat-
ing south from Holland and evidently
lost in the mist alighted forward and
flew into the forecastle. The ship's car-
penter tried to capture the bird and it
flew out of an open port. Now!

The stork was still in sight circling
about the ship when there came a hur-
ry call from the first cabin for the
ship's doctor and soon he announced
the arrival on board of a baby girl,
born to Mrs. James Rasely, wife of an
English actor coming to play with
Nora Bayes. He was leading man in
"A League of Nations" in London.
Mother and baby are well and the of-
ficers and crew of the Centennial
State are wondering whether the leg-
end of the stork is really a legend.

JAPAN HAS ACCEPTED THE U.S. PROPOSAL FOR A 5-5-3 NAVAL LIMITATION; TO RETAIN MUTSU

AN AGREEMENT TO BE DRAWN UP

Great Britain Wants the Sub-
marine Abolished as an Im-
plement of War—New Ma-
chinery to Expedite Final
Action on Naval Limitation
Agreements is Set Up Today.

Washington, Dec. 13—Japan's ac-
ceptance of the United States pro-
posal for a five-five-three naval limi-
tation has been communicated to the
United States and British delegates
and it was said that an agreement
might be expected late this week.

In agreeing to accept the proposed
naval ratio, it was said in United
States quarters, Japan coupled with
it a renewed request that she be al-
lowed to retain the new battleship
Mutsu in place of one of her old line
ships, which would have been retain-
ed.

The Japanese requests were con-
sidered at a meeting this afternoon
of the United States delegates with
assistant secretary Roosevelt of the
navy department and Admiral Coontz,
chief of naval operations. It was said
that they are not prepared at this
time to accept Japan's request for re-
taining the Mutsu.

New Machinery.

New machinery to expedite final
action on naval limitation agreements
was set up today by the arms con-
ference. The former committee of ex-
perts was "scrapped" in favor of a
"committee of fifteen" including both
plenary delegates and civil and naval
experts of the five powers. The whole
subject of naval limitations including
the cornerstone "5-5-3" ratio was
turned over to the new committee to
be put in final shape for the confer-
ence.

Meanwhile, it became known that
the Japanese delegation had received
instructions from Tokio regarding
the "5-5-3" ratio. The nature of this
communication was not disclosed.
There were many indications, how-
ever, that it marked a long stride to-
ward final acceptance of this vital
point in the naval limitation project.
"The committee of fifteen" was de-
scribed by a British spokesman as a
means to "short-circuit" delays un-
avoidable in the previous division of
labor between committees of dele-
gates and separate committees of na-
val experts. The new committee will
be able to reach decisions as to direct
recommendations to the conference.
Several intermediate steps will be
eliminated to save some time. No
other official or semi-official explana-
tion of its creation was given.

WHICH ARM TO BE USED

Paris, Dec. 14—Whether a man
should offer his right or left arm to a
woman is agitating Parisians. A de-
cision by Andre de Fouquieres, the ac-
cused arbiter of social customs, has
not settled this question.

He said, "Always the right arm in-
doors," a custom surviving from the
days when all gentlemen carried
swords and wanted to be quick on the
draw. Outdoors, he said, no man ever
offers his arm to a woman "except in
cases of danger," which the newspa-
pers hold is the normal condition in
Paris streets.

Therefore, regardless of good form,
those debating the matter generally
agree that a man should take hold of a
woman's right arm with his left hand
instead of offering his right arm, be-
cause the women consulted said they
intended continuing to carry their
purse, parasol, package, etc, in their
left hand. And the men insisted a cane
belonged in the right hand.
