As regards clean breaks, Langford says that it does not make a great deal of difference to him and that as to Flynn knowing what he is really capable of doing with the gloves, Langford is out to show Flynn up, if he can and he believes that he will.

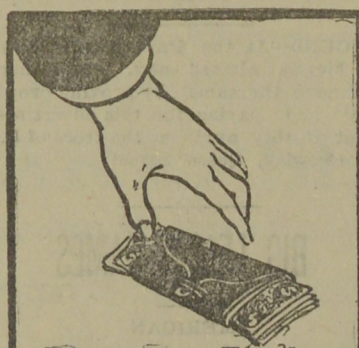

Some of the sports also have that same opinion, but the majority expect to see Langford finish best.

Boston, Aug. 25--Sam Langford, speaking about the white boxers yesterday, said that if Stanley Ketchel were alive he could defeat all the existing white hopes. Langford figures that he can do the same if given the chance. Porky Flynn, who meets Langford at the Atlas A. A. next Tuesday night, has the same opinion of himself, and if a winner over Langford is going after a match with Gunboat Smith.

The statement of Flynn made Langford laugh and he was not a bit backward in saying that after Tuesday night Flynn will be looking for a job outside the boxing game. Flynn's friends do not agree with Langford and they feel confident that he will give Langford a surprise.

The bout is causing unexpected interest as the fans feel satisfied that the boxers are friends no longer and that their bout is on the level. The three preliminaries will add interest to the meeting for the boxers will display a lot of action.

The series between St. John and Fredericton has been arranged so as to permit of the Fredericton team disbanding here on Monday evening next. The schedule is as follows:

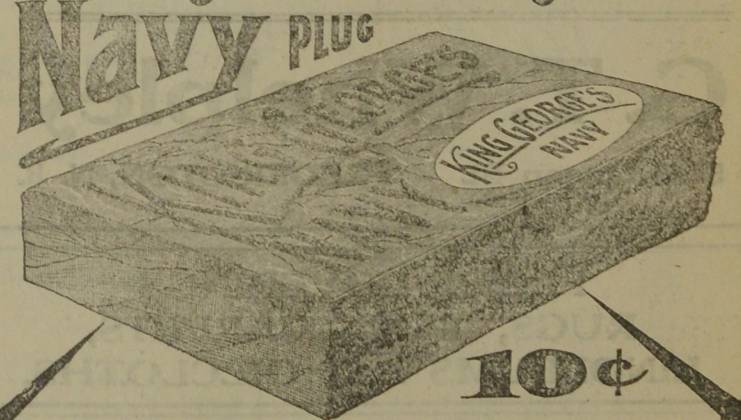
