ADMIRAL SIMS WAS GIVEN A ROUSING SEND OFF WHEN HE SAID FAREWELL TO LONDON

HAS BEEN RECALLED TO WASHINGTON

In a reply to Reporters he Declared that he Had Nothing to Retract—Has Many Letters Approving of His Attitude towards American Hypenates—Is not Worrying.

London, June 15.—Rear Admiral William S. Sims left Waterloo Station this morning for Southampton, where he boarded the steamer Olympic this afternoon and sailed for New York. He rode in a special car that was burdened with folral testimonials that there was scarcely room for members of his party to move about. Leaning out of a window of the car, the Admiral waved his cap to a large group who, despite the earliness of his departure, had gathered to give him a rousing send-off. Admiral Sims spent half an hour before his train left in hand-shaking and exchanging greetings with friends on the station platform. As the train slowly moved out, men raised their hats and women waved their handkerchiefs, and all joined in three cheers.

Answering reporters' requests for a farewell message Admiral Sims called attention to despatches in this morning's newspapers, telling of a reaction in the United States against his critics. He declared he had nothing to retract. "He said he had received hundreds of letters approving of his attitude regarding 'American hypenates.' Asked whether he had received any threatening missives the Admiral smiled and said:

"I had one signed 'Erin-Go-Bragh,' making a play on reference to zebras in my address last week and telling me I would meet the asses on the other side, but I have paid no attention to it—it doesn't worry me."

He added that he though the handwriting was that of a boy, and declared the letter bore a London postmark. He did not turn it over to Scotland Yard for an investigation.

CHIEF INSPEC. AT ST. STEPHEN

Rumor of Cars Engaged in Rum-Running—Local Rumors Not Credited.

Chief Inspector J. B. Hawthorne has returned from an official visit to St. Stephen where he spent Wednesday. The information given him there by the Town Marshal was that conditions were good. The same stories of liquor-running from St. John to points in the State of Maine which are current here, are in circulation about St. Stephen. One rumor was that a car loaded with liquor came from the direction of St. George Tuesday.

The reports that rum-running cars had been passing through Fredericton frequently, which have been given some publicity lately, are not credited by the chief inspector.

THE B. C. GOVERNMENT IN BOOZE BUSINESS

Vancouver, B. C., June 15.—The sale of liquor in British Columbia under government control commenced today at the stores located in the cities and towns of the province opened for business.

Dragoons' Advance Party to Arrive Here Saturday—Col. McLean Senior Officer of Camps.

Lieut-Colonel C.H. McLean, D.S.O., of St. John arrived here last night to oversee arrangements for camp for the New Brunswick Dragoons, of which he is commanding officer. The N.B. Dragoons will go to camp at Fredericton June 20th, to June 28th, inclusive. Their strength is 169 all ranks, 135 horses.

Newcastle, June 15.—Richard Hutchison died at the Miramichi hospital this morning, aged forty-nine years. Mr. Hutchison came from Boston last week by motor for a few days' fishing on the Miramichi. Becoming ill, he entered the hospital for treatment and as his condition became serious an operation was decided upon in the hope of saving his life but he died a few hours after it was performed.

The late Mr. Hutchison was born at Douglastown, the son of the late M. and Mrs. Ernest Hutchison. He leaves a wife and a son in Boston, and one sister, Mrs. Hugh Monchieff, at present in Douglastown.

A POLITICAL CRISIS OF THE FIRST MAGNITUDE MAY SOON DEVELOP IN ENGLAND

Announcement of an Election May be Made Within the Next Fortnight. Strong Opposition Against the Retention of Dr. Addison in the Cabinet—The Premier to Call for a Vote of Confidence in the House.

London, June 16.—While there are many direct predictions in the sensational Sunday press of an early election caused by the retirement of Premier Lloyd George yet these reports do not coincide with the present plans of the Premier so far as they are manifested in his actions. A general election may however be brought about by means other than the voluntary retirement of the Prime Minister and the announcement of the appeal may be quite possible during the next two weeks. Such a forecast is based on what is seemingly a relatively minor incident. Dr. Addison's retention in the Cabinet may develop a political crisis of the first magnitude.

WILL CHALLENGE A VOTE

The opposition against Dr. Addison has been growing during the last few weeks his retention as Minister without portfolio after making what is generally regarded as his failure as Minister of Health is the subject of some bitter comment among Lloyd George's supporters. These attacks have incensed the premier who is determined to call for a vote of confidence when the subject comes up for discussion in a few days. The Prime Minister is willing that the Coalition shall stand or fall by this vote. It is generally known that Dr. Addison is willing to hand in his resignation but the Premier insists on his right to choose his own ministers and is anxious to make a test case of the issue. Dr. Addison is a Liberal and is unpopular with the bulk of Conservatives who form the majority in the Coalition Government. Many of the Conservatives have recently given pledges to their constituents that a more stringent economy will be made in public expenditure and they maintain that Addison having proved himself a failure is not worth the salary of five thousand pounds a year which he will receive. These men declare that they must under these circumstances oppose the retention of Dr. Addison in the Cabinet especially as the demand for further measures of economy is growing increasingly ominous.

The only possible basis of a compromise is found in the assembly of the Dominion Premiers for the conference and despite the present uncompromising attitude of Lloyd George on the question of Dr. Addison's retention the difficulties may be patched up. If not the Addison question may become the political Sarajevo of the coalition.

WENT OUT BY GAS ROUTE

New York, June 16.—For almost three days Charles Johnson, 35 years old, lay dead in a gas filled room at 407 West 205th street, while neighbors vainly tried to find the leak. His body was discovered yesterday when Patrolman Corbely of the West 177th street station entered the room by way of the fire escape.

Two letters were found in the room, one, open, saying that the writer was sorry to cause trouble, but was ill and desperate. The other letter was to his wife, Ruth, who has been in St. Luke's Hospital for three weeks recovering from an operation for mastoiditis. She will not be notified of his death until after her recovery. Two children, a boy of 3 and a girl of 6, are left.

Tenants first noticed the odor of gas late Friday night. The gas company was notified, but did not respond.

SUGAR CROP IS HEAVY

New York June 16.—Further extreme weakness in the sugar market is caused by reports from a large number of Cuban mills showing an output running well above the market's previous estimate, according to the current review of Facts About Sugar.

A cable report to the review giving final figures for 147 of the 198 centrals operating in Cuba last season, which have now ceased operations, shows a total production of 19,805,800 bags, compared with 18,608,900 last year. If this ratio is maintained by the mills which have not yet reported, the review goes on, it will mean a final crop showing of over 3,800,000 long tons, the largest in the history of the island, with the single exception of the season of 1918-1919.

HOME BREWERS VERY BUSY

Boston, June 16.—The extent to which the public has taken up home brewing and moonshining since the activities of prohibition enforcement agents shut off many sources of liquor supply was shown today in a statement by Herman C. Lythgoe, director of the food and drugs division of the State Department of health.

Since January 1, he said, police officials have submitted to him 1,270 samples of distilled spirits, beer, wines, cider and other beverages for analysis. The average alcoholic content of the lot was slightly under 40 per cent.

More figures of home production came to him last month than in any previous period. Mr. Lythgoe said. He examined 331 samples, but the average kick appears to be getting weaker, as the average of alcohol was found to be only 22.44 per cent., the lowest of any month this year. Of these samples seventy were found to have less than 2.75 per cent of alcohol, he said. One lot included a boiled inner into which whiskey had been poured when the police arrived on a raid.

WILL VISIT CANADA

London, June 16.—Leonid Krassine, Soviet Minister of Trade and Commerce is planning a visit to Canada and the United States in the near future, his headquarters here today definitely informed the Associated Press.

Krassine's trip will relate strictly to trade and will have no political significance. He will go first to Canada and then to the United States if possible. It was said at his office he does not anticipate that any obstacles will be placed in his way.

THE PREMIER OF AUSTRALIA IS CONFIDENT THAT GOOD WILL COME FROM THE CONFERENCE

WEEKLY SCRIBES HAVING GOOD TIME IN WEST

Saw the Wonders of Banff Yesterday—Being Royally Entertained by the C. P. R.

Banff Alta., June 15.—After leaving the glories of the lakes in the clouds, and Lake Louise the C.P.R. Special carrying Canadian weekly editors soon reached the wonder of Banff yesterday and remained until today leaving for Calgary at 5 p.m. After enjoying dinner in the train, they wended their way through Banff Village to the delightful Banff springs hotel where the general manager placed everything at their disposal. Many immediately enjoyed the swimming pool, others lolled around and at nine o'clock dancing was provided in the ball room and thoroughly enjoyed. Some of the editors opined Lake Louise was glorious but Banff magnificent. Today a special drive was provided by the C.P.R. to Lake Minnewanka, thence to the Caves and the golf links and luncheon at the Hotel. In the afternoon pony riding was indulged in and the swimming pool proved one of the greatest attractions. Mr. A.R. Brennan, proprietor and Editor of the Journal, Summerside, and the newly elected vice-president in an interview said:

"The Canadian Weekly Press Association convention trip through Western Canada should prove of inestimable value to the dominion as a whole while the vastness of the prairies the grandeur of the mountains the powerful rivers and boundless forests impress themselves into one mighty whole for Canadians to mould into the greatest nation that yet has been. It also compels us to take a tighter grip on ourselves to develop a good national spirit that will do this on a firm foundation for the future. The prairie provinces, yet hardly touched in their agricultural possibilities, are a revelation to those seeing them for the first time and the fine towns and cities that have sprung up as by magic out of those vast stretches planned for the future and built in most modern style are so striking a symbol of the Canadian spirit of doing things. For mighty grandeur, however, nature must win. The sight of the tremendous mountain ranges of British Columbia and Alberta fill one with awe at the titanic power there displayed and unfold themselves in an ever varying panorama to the beholder. The railroads traversing this country have chosen some of nature's most wonderful beauty spots and have established their luxurious accommodation for those who desire either beauty of scenery, or health resorts. Banff, where we are today staying, seems impossible to improve upon from either of these viewpoints. Nature has been most lavish in its magnificent scenery and healing properties of its sulphur springs and health restoring atmosphere which through the efforts of the C.P.R. these have been made available to those who would obtain health with their pleasure. This magnificent place could be made 'The Riviera' in summer and 'St Moritz' in winter of this continent.

Sydney, N.S., June 16.—Speculation is rife as to whether the Rideout appointment will come up at the meeting of the city council which will be held this evening.

Mayor Fitzgerald said this morning that the appointment will not come up unless the aldermen move to have the matter discussed. There has been some talk that the aldermen will move to have the matter left over for discussion at a special meeting to be held next week. But just what action will be taken will not be known until after tonight. Rideout's appointment as N. S.T. A. Inspector for the city expires on his last day of the month.

There are rumors afloat that two of the city aldermen will make a bid for the appointment. It is expected that another battle royal will take place in the council chamber when the matter is brought up before the city aldermen.

LOW PRICE OF SUGAR

New York, June 16.—The break in refine sugar prices yesterday to 6c., less 2 per cent. for cash, established the lowest price touched within the last four or five years and at the close of the day the demand continued to be light. Raw sugar was weak, with Porto Ricos on offer at 4.15c., c.i.f., and indications that business might be put through at 4c., c.i.f., but with very moderate demand at that price.

FIVE BURNED TO DEATH IN ALBERTA FIRE

Calgary, June 15.—Mrs. J. J. Rutledge and her four children were burned to death Tuesday night in a fire which destroyed their home eight miles northeast at Innisfail. J. J. Rutledge, Mrs. Rutledge's sister and another child escaped. The origin of the fire is unknown. The provincial police are investigating.

In Abbreviated Form.

Tuesday's Boston morning papers which reached Fredericton Wednesday afternoon, were of eight pages instead of the usual size which sometimes is twenty pages. The composers' strike was the cause of the curtailment.

NOT CONCERNED ABOUT A NAME

Thinks that Should be left to the Hosts—Refused to make a statement in Regard to the Stand Australia will take on Matters on the Agenda Paper.

London, June 16.—"I do not regard the forthcoming meeting of the premiers as a conference," said Premier Hughes of Australia in an interview with a representative of the Dominion News Service a few hours after he had landed in this country from his homeland.

In reply to the suggestion that the term Cabinet did not meet with approval in certain quarters overseas, Premier Hughes asked sharply: "Then what is it?"

In discussing the matter Mr. Hughes said that the question of a name for the meeting did not concern the visitors.

"We have been invited to the function and the guests should leave the name of the gathering to their hosts."

Questioned as to the stand that Australia would take on matters that are down on the agenda paper for discussion Premier Hughes refused to make any statement. With regard to Japan he declared that the attitude of his country was clearly laid down in the speech he made last in April on the question when he was supported and his policy endorsed by an overwhelming majority. He declared, however, that he was confident that lasting solid results would eventuate from the meeting.

RIDEOUT'S TERM SOON EXPIRES

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HALIFAX WAS HIT BY A SEVERE STORM

Halifax, June 15.—A severe thunder and lightning storm accompanied by hail and rain visited Halifax this afternoon. Considerable damage was done to crops in the environs of the city by the hail stones, some of which were as large as marbles. The water mains in the house of William Chesney in Tower road were broken when the place was struck by lightning. No one was injured.
