CANADIAN YACHT SEIZED AT CLEVELAND; HAD ON BOARD LARGE QUANTITY OF LIQUOR

U. S. DRY AGENTS ON THE ALERT

Seven Men, Four Women and 75 Cases of Whiskey and Wines Were Taken—Women Thought They Were on a Pleasure Trip—Tried to Scuttle the Craft.

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 20—Another blow was struck yesterday in the border warfare between whiskey runners and prohibition agents when dry officials seized the Canadian yacht Venice unloading liquor here.

Flying squadrons of police and prohibition agents swooped down on the yacht, capturing seven men, four women and 95 cases of the best whiskeys and rare wines.

William L. Curry, of Toronto, captain of the vessel, was among those arrested.

Captain Curry, according to Police Captain Costello admitted he had also been captain of the yacht Tranquillo seized by the police here last June, but denied owning the yacht when it was seized. Curry said the liquor seized today was valued at \$15,000 and the yacht at \$50,000. The liquor was placed on the Venice at Toronto. Curry said. The women, he said had no knowledge of the nature of the enterprise, believing they were on a pleasure trip.

All four women are from Canada, one being a Montreal stenographer. Curry remarked.

Names of Prominence

Police also found on the yacht a list of names of prominent Clevelanders, among them being that of a former federal official.

The raid was the result of special instructions from Federal Prohibition commissioner Haynes in Washington and a warning that rum-runners, balked in their attempts to rush liquor over the border at Detroit, had shifted the apex of their offensive to Cleveland.

After the prisoners and the liquor had been removed from the vessel police were notified that the sea-cocks had been opened in an effort to scuttle the yacht.

Advised that the Venice had tied up at the ore-dock here and was unloading whiskey, special details of police and enforcement agents hurried to the scene early this morning.

Hawes Cast

When they arrived hawses had been cast off and the crew was making frantic efforts to get the yacht away from the dock.

The raiders swarmed over the side and after a sharp fight with the crew captured the vessel and again tied it up at the wharf.

A truck on which liquor had been loaded was also headed off and seized as it moved away from the waterfront.

Police charge that the yacht was in the service of one of the biggest whiskey rings operating in Canada and the United States. The capture of the Venice follows closely on the heels of the whiskey-laden Tranquillo several weeks ago.

The fact that dry agents were speedily informed of the arrival of the Venice indicates that the prohibition enforcement department has a very smoothly working intelligence service.

Local enforcement officials are believed to be advised of the approach of other liquor cargoes and to be making preparations to block them.

Members of the crew, who were arrested, gave the names of: Norman Turner, Toronto; Michael Parle, Kingston, Ont.; Jay Burney, Cleveland; William Kempert, Cleveland.

BOY GOT A SUSPENDED SENTENCE

The two young lads who were arrested on Tuesday on a charge of stealing a basket of plums from a local grocer came up before Police Magistrate Limerick yesterday afternoon. One of them was remanded until Monday for sentence, and the other was given a three years' sentence in the Reformatory. This sentence was suspended and the youngster concerned is to be sent to a farm some twenty-five miles in the country. If he makes his appearance about the streets again the sentence is to be put into force.

Leo Hayes, Town Marshall of Devon, arrested a young man yesterday in Devon. The same officer arrested the same man some time ago and at that time he was sentenced to a period in the Reformatory. The sentence has not yet expired and the officials at the Reformatory are being communicated with regarding the standing of the supposedly escaped prisoner.

The two youngsters of eleven and thirteen years who were arrested Thursday charged with stealing nails, shingles, and carpenters' tools from a house in the course of construction on University Avenue appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick yesterday afternoon. After a good lecture the boys were handed over to their parents. The father of one of them asked that his boy be arrested whenever found on the streets without a guardian after dark. The materials were stolen to be used in the building of a camp on College Hill.

DECISION IN BOOZE CASE

Montreal, Aug. 20—Judge Bazin, in the special sessions court yesterday afternoon, decided in a case of alleged contravention of the liquor act, that any person has the right to buy liquor in the government store and transport it to his or her domicile, irrespective of the quantity of liquor or the distance of the domicile.

The case was brought against Ernest Mongeau, Longueuil. He purchased liquor at a Montreal store and took it to Longueuil by boat. On arrival there he was arrested by Inspector Roy on a charge of illegal transport of liquor.

FOUND A REAL ROAD HOG

(By Dominion News Service.) Paris, Aug. 20—A party of young people were motoring along the road from Grenoble to Valence at a late hour last night, when the car ran into something in the middle of the road, which caused it to overturn.

The obstacle was a large wild boar, which flung itself on one of the party with great fury. Another of the motorists drew a revolver and shot the boar, which weighed over 250 lbs.

The car was so badly damaged in the collision that the motorists were obliged to walk home.

THE CHICAGO POTICE HAVE DISCOVERED AUTOMOBILE GRAVEYARD; DRIVERS TAKEN

One Hundred Cars Thrown Into a Lake at Summit, a Suburb of the City—Most of Them Believed to Have Been Stolen—Now Being Raised and Numbers Taken by Police.

Chicago, Aug. 20—The police of Summit, a suburb of Chicago have discovered an automobile graveyard in an abandoned quarry near there. It is believed at least 100 automobiles are lying at the bottom of eighty feet of water. Divers have begun to raise the machines. They reported today that in some of the deeper portions of the quarry the motor cars appear to rest one on the other in layers six and eight machines deep.

The "grave yard" was discovered when a policeman noticed the top of an automobile projecting above water, which he knew was so deep that the car, if thrown into the place, should have been entirely covered.

An investigation showed that the machine was resting on top of another car. This led to the belief that others might have been thrown into the water. Chief R. D. Allison of Summit engaged John J. Blair, a diver, to descend into the quarry, and Blair reported that the place was literally filled with machines.

DIVERS RAISING MACHINES

Under the direction of Blair and Chief Allison divers were obtained from Chicago and the work of raising the machines was begun. Thirty have been brought to the surface already. The divers are sure there are at least twice that many in the water. With the present facilities about five or six cars a day can be lifted.

One of the first machines recovered was the property of T. J. Sullivan of 5356 South Halstead street, which the police say was reported stolen on December, 21, 1930. Another was a small car which bore a 1919 license plate.

The police are taking the numbers of the machines as fast as they are brought out, and an investigation will be made of each case. The insurance companies also will inquire into the affair. The quarry which has not been worked for several years is a block wide and a block and a half long. The water at the edges is about thirty feet deep, but slopes down to about eighty feet in the centre.

FREDERICTON IS NOW ENJOYING QUITE A BUILDING BOOM

Some forty residences are at present in various stages of completion in different parts of the city. As evidence that the city of Fredericton is expanding many of these new houses are on comparatively new streets, and several of them are on lots in the heart of the city where no houses stood before.

On Westmorland Street extension near Argyle and Aberdeen Streets a group of buildings are going up, and it is understood that several others are contemplated. W. B. Hay is erecting a house on the corner of Smythe and Saunders Street.

On Gray Street, a new street, William Wishart, of North Devon is putting up a one and a half storey dwelling and he hopes to have it completed within the next two months. A. F. Belyea, of the Provincial Secretary Treasurer's office has the lumber on the ground for a bungalow which it is said he will occupy this winter. At the corner of Gray Street and University Avenue C. J. B. Simmons has started a two storey concrete building and on the opposite corner to Mr. Simmons, Peter Hughes, Deputy Minister of Public Works is to erect a two storey house.

G. W. Foster, of Upper Maugerville has the contracts for these two last mentioned houses and also for that of J. L. Neville, which is also of concrete and is being erected at the corner of Landsdowne and Winslow Streets. On the opposite corner to Mr. Neville's house, J. C. Kirkpatrick Auditor of the United Farmers' Association is erecting a dwelling which he will move into very shortly.

On Union Avenue Fred P. Colter of the Customs Department has started the erection of a cottage into which he intends to move sometime this coming spring. Almost directly opposite Ernest Logan has about completed a two storey house which he intends to occupy this fall.

On Charlotte Street, a short distance below York Street, R. B. MacFarlane has just moved into an Aladdin cottage, the first of its kind to be seen in this city, and directly opposite from Mr. MacFarlane's home

J. D. Black has a concrete house under construction. Mr. Black expects to move into his new home in the near future. On Scully Street Harvey Jones has a house well under way, and there is another just opposite it the property of Mr. Guy Tufts.

Bruce Simmons is erecting a large house on Union Street, and directly below him John Simms has completed a house. Across the street from Mr. Simmons' house, J. Preston Duncan a trainman on the C. N. R. has a new residence in the course of construction.

It is understood that if the City will put in water and sewerage connection on Gray Street between University Avenue and Waterloo Row there is a possibility that there will not be a vacant lot on that street.

Frederick Jeffrey is renovating the Dougherty house on University Avenue which was partially destroyed by fire two years ago, and in the course of his work has diverted the flow of the brook which runs across University Avenue on the river side of the railway track. In what was before the bed of the brook Mr. Jeffrey is building a concrete cellar, and the old Dougherty house is to be moved onto that cellar.

A number of dwelling houses are also being erected in Devon, including two wooden structures on the Maugerville Road on the upper side of the Nashwaak River. One of these is being built by James Kelly and the other by Gordon Hazlett, to replace a house belonging to him which was destroyed by fire some time ago. William Holland has just about completed a concrete house on the Marysville Road, and Cecil Bailey is also building in that locality. These buildings are only a short way from the C. P. R. track. Herbert Logan has completed another concrete house in North Devon.

Besides those mentioned there are many others under way, and still many other contemplating buildings. On the whole it may be said that building is going ahead with greater vigor than at any other time for many years.

CHILD KILLED BY AUTOMOBILE THIS MORNING

A fatal automobile accident occurred here this morning, when Miss Beatrice Bull, the nine year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. LeBaron Bull was run over and killed by a Ford car. The accident occurred on University Avenue about twenty five yards from the little girl's home. She was struck on the head by one of the lamps and knocked down. She managed to regain her feet but on reaching the sidewalk, just in front of her home fell down and expired within a few minutes.

The car which is a Ford, No. 13544 and is said to belong to Estey Curtis, was stopped and the driver went to the girl's assistance.

Since the above was written it has been learned that the car was driven by G. H. Rogers, an employee of Estey & Curtis. The girl it seems was riding a bicycle and was knocked down and dragged thirty feet before the car was stopped. She started to walk to her home but collapsed on the sidewalk.

The victim of the accident had lately been presented with a wheel and was just learning to ride it.

The accident has cast a gloom over the community and the greatest sympathy will be felt for the grief stricken parents. The victim of the accident was a lovable child and a favorite with all who knew her. She is survived by her parents and one brother.

MILLIONAIRE BURGLAR WAS CAUGHT

Paris, Aug. 20—A bona-fide French millionaire has been arrested in the act of pilfering a grocer's shop. He had his pockets filled with tins of sardines, cayenne pepper, and a bottle of liqueur.

A police inspector was busy working on a robbery case at Orleans. As the weather was very warm, he sat down outside a grocer's shop. He saw a man stealthily emerge from the roof and slide down a waterpipe. He met the nimble stranger as he reached the pavement, and, to his astonishment, recognized a local wealthy man named Ernest Doitier, owner of one of the finest residences at Orleans, and occupying a high position in Orleans society and commerce.

Asked to explain his conduct, Doitier told the inspector he was seeking excitement and had taken to burglary just for the fun of the thing. Doitier has been committed for trial on a charge of burglary.

The Fredericton Exhibition Races.

The Fredericton Park Association directors at a meeting last night completed plans for the racing programme during the Fredericton Exhibition and there will be four days harness racing on September 20, 21, 22 and 23. There are eight Early Closing Events in which horses are to be named on August 30th and a \$1,000 free for all and four class races for \$400 purses have been added as follows: 2.14 trot and pace, 2.20 pace, 2.24 trot and 2.24 pace. The class races will also close on August 30th and additional classes will be added to the programme to replace all early closers in which four horses are not named and which would thus be automatically cancelled under the special conditions.

Duck Season Later.

FINAL DECISION EXPECTED TUESDAY

Premier Meighen Dodges the Issue When Questioned by a Correspondent — A Quebec Paper Hears That an Election Will Take Place on November 18th.

Ottawa, Aug. 19—The ship of state still "hangs in the stays," the crew awaiting between tacks the word of command from the skipper whether "to fill away" again in the "long leg" for another session, or venture the "short hitch" of fall elections. The old hulk is somewhat unmanageable and some say that both skipper and crew are waiting to see what the ship will do of itself.

"Will there be an election?" your correspondent asked a prominent Conservative.

"Wait till you see the rats leaving the ship," he responded enigmatically. The best information still is that the final decision not to have an election will not be before Tuesday.

Not Mentioned.

"The matter was not even mentioned," said Premier Meighen, when asked regarding the possibility of an immediate election at the close of the cabinet council today.

"Will there be an election?" asked the Canadian Press representative.

"Of course there will be an election," replied Mr. Meighen. "The constitution requires it," he added, but he did not say when the election would take place, and remarked that "it had not even been mentioned" at the meeting.

Quebec Hears News.

Quebec, Aug. 19—The Quebec Telegaph today published the following:

"A report received from a well informed source in Ottawa by the Telegaph, this morning, announces that the dissolution of the House of Commons will be announced in a few days and that the general elections will be held on Friday, the 18 of November, the nomination taking place on the 4 of the same month. No official confirmation on this report could be obtained, but instructions given to local Conservative organizers and recent activity of the leaders here tend to strengthen the rumor.

BIG HARVEST OF HOPE IN THE U. STATES

Washington, Aug. 19—Nearly 32,000,000 pounds of hops, enough to produce 1,500,000,000 bottles of beer, will be harvested in the United States this year, according to forecasts by the Department of Agriculture today.

Home brewing is on the increase in many sections of the United States. It was indicated today as the conferees of the House and Senate worked over an amendment to the anti-beer bill which is believed to legalize the manufacture of the anti-Volstead mixture.

Hopeful of a sudden jump in the price of hops, farmers are spending time and labor to increase the harvest in New York, California, Washington and Oregon. Hops may sell for nearly \$1 a pound, it is forecast, if the amendment to the anti-beer bill goes to President Harding for signature.

But Federal Prohibition Commissioner Haynes isn't anxious over the outcome.

"It's a fad that will wear off," he said. "Home brewing is too much trouble for the average family. I am aware that it is being very generally practised in some communities. But not so much as when prohibition first became effective. The United States is going dryer all the time."
