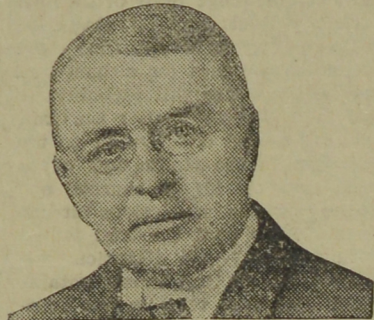

AT WORK—Dr. Phillip Cox has so far recovered that he will be able to resume his grammar school duties at St. John on Monday.

RETURNED—Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Thompson have returned from their tour of the Pacific Coast. They heartily enjoyed the trip.

SHOT A DEER—Frank H. Risteben, one of the best rifle-shots in York county, had the pleasure of shooting a fine deer in the Maryland woods on Tuesday last. It weighed 129 pounds.

TAKING STOCK—General Manager Snowball, with several of the officials are taking stock of the Canada Eastern Railway and its effects. This road has during the year just closed, done a largely increased freight traffic and the tourist traffic has shown remarkable growth.

ENTHRONEMENT—The enthronement of the Bishop of Fredericton takes place on Wednesday next at eleven o'clock. The Bishop of Maine will be present. After the ceremony Bishop and Mrs. Kingdon will hold an "at home" from four to six p.m. at their residence.
