**APPEAL DISMISSED
BY SUPREME COURT
IN HARDING CASE**

Fredericton & Grand Lake Ry. Co.
Won Case Re Station Site---
Other Judgements Given
Yesterday

The Supreme Court yesterday delivered judgment in a number of cases. That of the Fredericton & Grand Lake Coal & Railway Company vs. J. S. Harding was of interest in this section, concerning as it did, the land acquired by the railway for a station site in Upper Marysville. Chief Justice Sir Frederick Barker and Judge Barry read judgments, dismissing the appeal of the defendant with costs. The decision of His Honor Judge McLeod went against the defendant and has been sustained.

In Brown vs. Garson, a St. John case, Chief Justice Barker read the judgment of court, dismissing defendant's appeal, with costs.

In Groundwater vs. Waterman, Judge McLeod read the judgment of court, rule refused with costs.

Chief Justice Barker read judgment of court in Sweeney vs. DeGrace, allowing appeal with costs.

Conviction in ex parte Miranda, a liquor case from Kent county, conviction, Chief Justice Barker reading judgment of court discharging rule.

Plaintiff's appeal in Pacific Coast Fire Insurance Company vs. John L. Hicks, was dismissed with costs.

Chief Justice Barker reading judgment of court sustaining Judge Wilson's decision in this case. The point involved was that of an unlicensed insurance company doing business in Canada.

**SIXTY THOUSAND
BARRELS OF POTATOES
SHIPPED SO FAR**

Duty Now Amounts to Fifteen Cents
Per Barrel---Drop in Price Expected
As Result of European
Imports

To date exports of potatoes through Fredericton to the United States have totalled about 60,000 barrels. This is equivalent to three hundred carloads, which would make a considerable number of good-sized freight-trains. Of that amount two hundred carloads have been shipped by Ald. W. W. Boyce and the balance by other shippers. The value of the potatoes would be upwards of \$75,000. At the present time the retail price of potatoes is \$1.40 to \$1.50 per barrel. Shippers are paying \$1.15 to \$1.25. With the present duty of ten per cent. ad valorem fifteen cents per barrel has to be paid on all potatoes shipped to the United States.

Heavy importations of European potatoes are being made by United States importers. Arrivals next week are expected to total 100,000 barrels, chiefly from Belgium. As these potatoes are duty free an effect will be felt by the Canadian market and prices are expected to drop. Recovery probably will occur later.

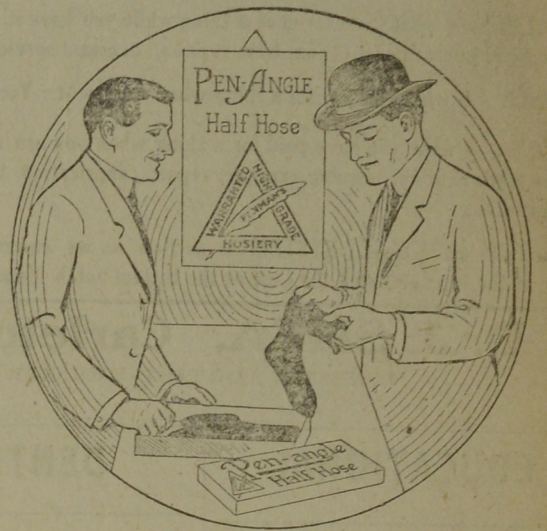

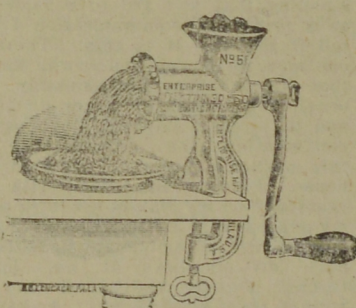
