STORM INTERFERED WITH TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE

The rain which set in early Sunday morning still continues. The total rainfall since that time has been two and a half inches, a remarkably heavy fall. Today the rain has been lighter and the wind, which was blowing a gale, has subsided.

Road Commissioner H. C. Jewett reports that the surface sewers have done all that was required of them in carrying off the rain-water with the exception of a catch-basin on Carleton street near the bridge, which, owing to faulty construction, always plugs after a heavy rain.

Yesterday's gale did considerable damage to both telegraph and telephone services. Telegraph wires are down today and yesterday the telephone service about the city was interfered with on account of trees falling across the wires. At the Dominion Experimental Farm two trees fell on the highway, breaking the telephone wires. On Brunswick street, near St. John street, a branch was broken from a tree and interrupted the telephone service for some time. A large willow just below the A. and B. Club House, was blown down and fell almost on the bandstand, which fortunately escaped damage.

The river here has risen several inches and as there has been rain up river a further rise is expected.

UNION OF MUNICIPALITIES

very fact of the known existence of this union and that its officers are active and diligent in the work of fostering and promoting every measure for the betterment of civic life in this province and of persistently opposing and criticizing any and every proposed trespass to the rights, privileges and franchises is the largest element in the promotion of good measures and the greatest deterrent upon municipal and civic encroachments by outsiders.

Since our last convention the New Brunswick Telephone Company petitioned the Utilities Commission for authority to change their system of service exchanges throughout the province in certain ways. It was decided that this move on the part of this company called for some attention. The secretary and myself attended the hearings before the commission at St. John and resulted in the withdrawal of the petition by the company.

MUNICIPAL SECURITIES.

The guarantee of municipal securities by their respective provinces is being freely and for the most part favorably discussed by financial and economic writers and journals in Canada, brought about chiefly by many large issues of bonds by many western localities, some of them said to be speculative of future growth and now emphasized by the "tight money" cry so generally prevailing during the last months. The criticism and discussion of this subject, both at home and abroad, has materially effected the price of municipal securities all over Canada. The strong suffer with the weak and no part of the country has so unjustly suffered as the staid and solid municipal corporations of Eastern Canada. How may our municipalities be protected against this contingency? Shall we ask the province to supervise and guarantee our bond issues? That appears to be the leading thought of writers on this subject. One authority argues that "The municipalities could get such an arrangement if they combined to demand it." They constitute the province. They would thereby establish a sort of check on each other and prevent the well intentioned municipality—which must be in a large majority—from having the price of its securities sent up by the gambling spirit of a very few. Moreover, it would constitute a great safeguard for the investor, Canadian as well as British. The investor would have the endorsement of the province upon his bond. That would be final and absolute. No buyer of municipalities would ever have to stop and ask himself whether or not he might wake up in his old age to find his bonds repudiated. He would not even have to inquire very closely into the circumstances of the municipality in question—something he must now do with a very considerable chance of being misled. The provincial guarantee would obviate all that."

I think this question demands consideration and I know of no more competent body to consider it than the present assembly.

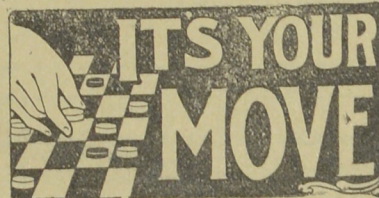
