McGraw Sets About Rebuilding Giants' Team

ATHLETICS AND
GIANTS GOT THEIR
MONEY FROM GAMES

New York Received \$2,160 Each---
Connie Mack's Men Were Given---
\$3,244 Apiece

New York, Oct. 13.—The members of the New York National League Club received their share of the world's series receipts today, amounting to \$54,065.67. Divided among the twenty-five players who were eligible to take part in the series, each man received a little more than \$2,400, with the exception of Arthur Fletcher, who was handed \$100 less, the amount he was fined for arguing with Umpire Connolly during one of the games.

Mathewson and Merkle, the committee who applied for the players' money, presented a statement satisfactory to the National Commission regarding the literary efforts of some of the men.

They reported that each player-author who wrote of the series signed his newspaper contract before the National Commission's edict on September 27, placing the ban on writing. The commission had threatened to fine any player who made a contract after that date and had been withholding the money until proof was furnished that their edict had not been disobeyed.

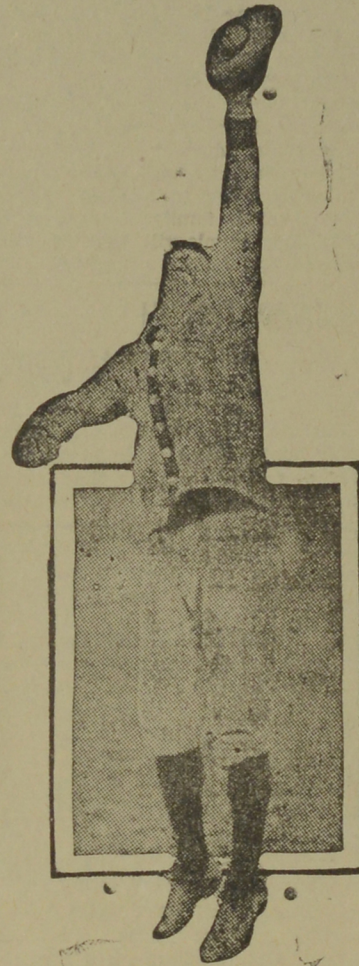
Tomorrow the National Commission will hand the world's champions their share of receipts in Philadelphia. Twenty-five Athletics will receive each about \$3,222, totalling nearly \$81,100.

Philadelphia, Oct. 11.—"Mathewson in the Ninth Inning" was the subject of a sermon by Rev. Augustus Barnett from the pulpit of the Church of Our Redeemer. He saw the Eddie and Matty duel on Wednesday.

"In that last inning," said the minister, "I saw the finest display of the result of clean living I ever expect to witness. Two gladiators, each at the zenith of his career, pitched superbly, as only men could who had conserved their strength by clean and wholesome life.

"With two men on bases and one out, Mathewson's eye was as steady as his brain was clear. He won for his team-mates because he had all of that energy saved for the vital moment when he really needed it. 'Matty' couldn't have delivered at that crucial time if his nerves had been tense, his brain befuddled as his eyes befogged by any of the indiscretions so common to the men of today."

BRITISH LADY GOLFERS
DEFEAT AMERICAN LADIES

Wilmington, Del., Oct. 14.—The surprise of the day in the first match play for the Women's National Golf championship on the course of the Wilmington club was the defeat of Miss Margaret Curtis, of Boston, the present American champion. She was defeated by Miss Caroline Painter, of the Midlothian club, Chicago, by one up. Miss Painter has twice held the western golf championship. A large gallery followed the pair. The wind bothered both players, and each took a total of one hundred strokes for the eighteen holes.

In the opening round yesterday Miss Curtis made the eighteen holes in 91 and Miss Painter in 105.

Miss Muriel Dodd, the British and Canadian champion, easily won her match from Miss Noblit, of Wilmington. Miss Florence L. Harvey, of Hamilton, Ont., beat Miss Frances E. Scott, Hamilton five up and three to no. All the other British and Canadian players matched against Americans won their games.

AMATEUR HOCKEY
SAID TO BE GETTING
HOLD IN MICHIGAN

Professional Game Dropped in That Country and Strict Residence Rule Has Been Adopted

Toronto, Oct. 13.—Mr. Charles E. Webb of Houghton, Michigan, president of the American Amateur Hockey Association, was in Toronto on Saturday and took advantage of the occasion for a conference with several officials of the game here. Mr. Webb stated that the A.H.A. has become affiliated with the Amateur Athletic Union and the game throughout the States will soon be organized on a stable and responsible basis.

"In time," Mr. Webb continued, "there may come a playing series with Canadian clubs, but at present all we look to is occasional visits from your teams.
