ON, MR. CRERAR CONCLUDES HIS MARITIME TOUR; FARMER LEADER WILL NOT SPEAK HERE

HELD A LARGE MEETING AT AMHERST

Will Spend the Next Two Weeks Campaigning in Ontario—No Questions Asked at the Amherst Meeting—His Remarks Elicited Hearty Applause.

Amherst, N. S., Nov. 3.—Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the National Progressives, concluded his maritime provinces campaign with a large meeting at Amherst today. Later in the evening he left for Montreal, on his way to Ottawa, where he speaks on Saturday afternoon in the interests of the Progressive candidate. The whole of next week and the early part of the succeeding week will be devoted to a renewal of his campaign in the crucial battlefields of Ontario for organizers of the three parties agree that it is mainly in the constituencies of Ontario that the election will be lost or won.

The backing which marked Mr. Crerar's closing meeting in Prince Edward Island was not repeated at Amherst. There was but one questioner. "How will you raise the \$500,000,000 required for revenue?" the questioner asked.

"We raised \$482,000,000 last year," Mr. Crerar replied, "and of that only \$160,000,000 was raised by customs duties. This year if you examine the customs statements you will find that the revenue is not likely to be much more than one-half of what it was last year. That is the result of protectionist features in the last budget. You cannot have a tariff for protection that will produce revenue. If you keep goods out of the country you can't get revenue from the goods that don't come into the country." On this there was much applause.

Mr. Crerar argued that the crying need of the hour was economy.

Had Long Walk

To make a long story short the boys after walking some twenty-five miles reached Marysville in safety, the fact sore and weary. "Lennie" followed some hours later.

ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY, ST. JOHN SCHOLARSHIP

To Be Given at U. N. B.—A Strong Committee Appointed to Deal With the Matter.

St. John, Nov. 4.—The establishment of a bursary for an annual scholarship in the University of New Brunswick for boys of Scottish descent was decided on at the annual meeting of St. Andrew's Society last evening in the Orange hall, Germain street, Lieut. Colonel Alexander McMillan presiding. A special committee consisting of Rev. J. A. MacKeigan, Hon. J. G. Forbes, John White, Adam P. MacIntyre and A. Gordon Leavitt, was appointed to arrange details of this scholarship and an official announcement will be made later.

(Fredericton Society of St. Andrews established such a scholarship at U. N. B. many years ago. The Miramichi Highland Society did the same later.)

THE LIBERAL CHIEFTAIN SAYS FORCES OF FREEDOM SHOULD NOT BE SPLIT UP

Hon. Mr. King Spoke to a Capacity Audience at St. Thomas, Ont.—Had to Leave Early to Attend the Funeral of Lady Laurier—Will the People Demand the Right of Self Government.

St. Thomas, Ont., Nov. 3.—The Liberal rally here tonight at the Star Theatre was the occasion of another capacity audience. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King having to leave early in the evening for Ottawa in order to attend the funeral of Lady Laurier, was one of the first speakers and Hon. Charles Murphy, in one of his typically fighting speeches brought the meeting to a close.

Mr. Murphy charged the government with "extravagant waste and indefensible looting of the treasury." Citing the construction of the new parliament buildings at Ottawa as a case in point.

TRIBUTE TO LADY LAURIER

Hon. Mr. King was introduced to the audience by the chairman, ex-Mayor E. A. Horton, as the next prime minister of Canada after Dec. 6. Alluding to his return to Ottawa in order to attend the funeral of Lady Laurier, Mr. King said he regarded as a tribute to her memory the attendance of the audience at such an early hour.

The real issue today, said the leader of the opposition despite the assertions of Mr. Meighen, was whether the people of Canada were going to endorse autocracy or whether they would demand the right of self-government.

Mr. King warned his audience against the danger of splitting into different parties, the forces of freedom once united could defeat the common enemy. There was more than a political conflict in progress, he asserted. "We are seeking the dawn of a new and better day for our country."

LLOYD GEORGE HAS AUDIENCE WITH THE KING

London, Nov. 3.—The prime minister had an audience with the King at Buckingham Palace this evening. This was not due to developments in the Irish negotiations but followed the customary practice that the prime minister see the King on his return to London from Sandringham. It is believed, however that Mr. Lloyd George reported to the King on the progress of the negotiations.

There was no meeting of either the full conference or the committee today and no definite arrangements for the next meeting have been made. Members of the Sinn Fein confirm the announcement that Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier is coming to London on the government's invitation.

It was said at Sinn Fein headquarters that there could be no important developments in the situation before Monday.

ACADIA AND KING'S AGAIN PLAY TO TIE

Each Scored One Try at Wolfville Thursday — Clark Scored For Acadia—No Converts.

Wolfville, N.S., Nov. 3.—Acadia University and King's College, Windsor Rugby teams played a 3-3 tie in an exhibition game here today as in their previous game at Windsor. Acadia's superiority in the forward line and Kings advantage in a speedy and smooth working half line featured the game.

Kings kicked off and forced play to the Acadia 25 yard line from where after a series of scrimmages and loose passing by the Acadia half line, McCoy touched down for Kings. Acadia rallied on the replay and kept the ball in the Windsor collegian's territory for most of the hemming part of the period.

In the opening of the second half the visitors used their speed in an attempt to repeat their score but were gradually forced back over centre line. With Acadia forwards feeding the ball to their backfield regularly following some passing, Clark put the ball over the King's line for the home team. Walsh in attempting to bring Clark down was injured and had to retire. The game finished without further score.

JOSEPHINE'S GEMS SOLD

New York, Nov. 4.—The diamond and emerald earrings given by Napoleon to Empress Josephine were displayed for sale by a 5th-ave. jeweler. Valued at more than \$100,000, the gems are the only pieces of the Empress' rich collection that remain intact.

Josephine's jewels came into possession of the Beauharnais family and were handed down to a Beauharnais, now a Russian grand duke. In financial stress, he sold them to a Paris branch of the New York jewel house.

YOUTH ROBBED OF HIS SAVINGS

His Wedding Plans Badly Upset and He Had to Seek Help From the Police—Prospective Bride of Fourteen Was Found Asleep on a Potato Bag.

New York, Nov. 4.—Carl T. Carter of Hallowell, Me., who is six feet and three inches in height but only nineteen years in age, wandered into the Mercer street police station about daybreak yesterday morning, and announced that he would like to speak to the constable. The desk lieutenant indicated that he was indeed that person.

"Mister" said young Carter. "I'm up against it. I've got my future wife with me and her cousin, and we come from Maine, but somebody stole our money."

Detectives Trabucca and Gilkinson went with the boy to 53 Washington Square South and on the pavement asleep on a potato bag which contained her hope chest and her intended husband's other handkerchief, they found Carter's sweetheart, Freda L. Boudway, who is only 14. With the girl was her cousin, Louis Delaware who is only seven and who was very much disgusted with life in the great city.

The detectives took Carter and Freda and Louis back to the police station fed them coffee and sandwiches, and then invited Carl to talk. "We left Hallowell on Friday," the boy said. "I had \$60, all saved to get married on and come to New York and see Broadway. We got to Portland by motorcycle and taxicab, and then we took a swell train to Boston. Boston is all right, but Freda wanted New York. We had heard so much about the Little Church Around the Corner, and we wanted to get married there and then see Broadway. I notice you say we were found in Greenwich Village. I didn't see any village but it doesn't look like I thought New York would look. I want to say that we came to New York from Boston on a Long Island South boat. While I was asleep somebody stole the rest of my money. When we got here we were broke."

The detectives charged Carter with abduction and took the three to Essex Market Court, where Carter told Magistrate Nolan that he and Freda wanted to get married and live happily on an orange farm in Florida. Freda said that was right and that all of her sisters were married before they were as old as she is. The Magistrate changed the charge to violation of the Mann white slave act. Then he sent Carter to jail and Freda and Louis to the Children's Society where they will be held until the police hear from their parents.

PROPOSAL RE THANKSGIVING

Washington, Nov. 4.—A movement to have the entire English-speaking world participate in a special celebration of Thanksgiving Day this year, the 300th anniversary of the first Thanksgiving day, was begun here today by Paul S. Reinsch former Minister to China.

Letters were sent to the Daughters of the American Revolution, Federal Council of Churches, the Sulgrave Institute, the World Sunday School Association, the Y. M. C. A. and other organizations by Mr. Reinsch, proposing that they call on all Commonwealths and communities of the United States to prepare for the celebration, and that an effort be made to have English speaking people throughout the world participate.
