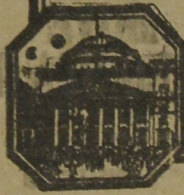

HANDSOME NEW CHURCH DEDICATED AT HALIFAX

(Halifax Chronicle.)

Those who have watched with interest the erection of the Baptist Temple have noted with admiration the entirely distinctive architecture that has characterized the building in every stage and the fact that it is now the only edifice of its kind in the City is no surprise to them. To a casual observer however, visiting that district it comes as a great surprise, for though many new buildings have been erected in Halifax during the past few years none have rivalled the splendid lines and architectural distinctiveness of this Temple.

The church is built after what is called the temple style of architecture and with four sturdy corners to all winds seems to suggest the old world charm and dignity of the temples of storied fame. Occupying a fine position at the corner of Gottingen and North Streets, it at once impresses one with its classical beauty, and is indeed an ornament to the district. It does not depend upon height for its impressiveness and thus avoid the mistake of lessening its appearance by overtopping the street and losing perspective value. The entrance which is on Gottingen street is one of the most outstanding features of the exterior. It is quite unique among City church entrances, consisting of a long recess extending nearly the length of the building and summoned by five graceful arches. The whole exterior is of brick.

Entering the interior one is even more impressed the great auditorium with its windows on three sides

of the building and in the roof producing an atmosphere of light and space that is altogether splendid. This effect is carried out by the white beamed ceiling, which in the centre is beautifully domed. Auditorium and galleries form a sort of half-octagon, the seats, which are of dark rich oak to correspond with the rest of the wood-work, being arranged in semi-circular formation. The seating capacity of the church is eight hundred and the seats are most comfortable, being curved to suit the natural posture of the body.

The pulpit, choir seats and alcove for the pipe organ which will be installed in the Fall, are cleverly planned with an eye to both beauty and convenience and a feature is the row of twenty-two lights which the view of the congregation. This while shedding ample light upon choir and pulpit are concealed from in itself is worth mention since many people suffer from the glare of lights near pulpit and choir, in other churches. The lighting throughout the entire church is the indirect type, a soft clear glow being diffused through handsome white shades. Some of these are solitary lights, while others are in a cluster of three on very effective chandeliers. The church is very bright by day but without any glare, the windows, which are very attractive in design, being glazed with cathedral glass of a pale amber hue.

The heating is by low-pressure steam automatically controlled and the radiators are conveniently placed and attractive. The ventilating system is arranged so as to keep a uniform atmosphere of warm fresh air without any draughts.

Praise For the Pastor.

This new edifice is the reward of enthusiasm and co-operative effort on the part of the congregation who since the Explosion have worked untiringly for that objective. The pastor, Rev. Henry R. Boyer has been a zealous leader who has inspired this congregation wonderfully and strengthened the bond that has held them together in friendship and unity. Tomorrow's dedication will be a bright milestone in the history of the church and both congregation and pastor are looking forward to a bright future for the church and a widening of their influence for good in the community. Every organization in church and Sunday School is in a flourishing condition, with enrollments that are gratifyingly large and splendid averages of attendance. There seems to be no obstacle in the way of Baptist Temple congregation for a bright and useful career.
