

NEW PLAY APPARATUS

Wheeled Platform Propelled by Pushing One Foot

After watching small boys coasting about on home-made vehicles propelled by one foot, a man with youngsters of his own designed a more elaborate affair on the same principle. A low platform is mounted on four wheels, the two axes of the device being connected by a strong steel band, on which the footboard rests. The construction is such that by tilting the footboard to right or left of the wheels will turn in the same direction but the boy will not upset. The long handle is adjustable to any height and is used more for support than for guidance. To operate the vehicle a boy stands with one foot on the platform and with the other foot pushes it ahead until sufficient momentum is attained to carry it on. He then gets aboard with both feet and guides it by throwing the weight of his body on one side or the other.

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TIRED METALS

Metals get tired with over-working just as much as human beings do. And, like human beings, they need a holiday and complete rest in order to recover from the strain and rush of modern life!

It was Lord Kelvin who showed that metals suffer from fatigue. He kept iron wires in constant motion during a week, and watched the way they acted. At the end of the week they had lost a considerable amount of their original elasticity. He gave them a day's rest and they completely recovered. He further experimented and discovered that an iron bar, after a three weeks' rest, gained ten per cent. in elasticity. In repeated experiments he found that steel and wrought iron deteriorated very rapidly if they were worked continuously, and, in the long run, break up completely, just as the human being does. Knocking them off work at regular intervals adds years to their powers of resistance.

A good instance of this was shown by Lord Kelvin. A steel rail, which had done service for over twenty years, suddenly broke into half-a-dozen pieces under the weight of a passing train. For the whole of that twenty years it had not had a day's holiday. Lord Kelvin pointed out that if that rail had had proper rests it would have done duty for another twenty years. As it was the strain was too great for it.

CANADA'S MINES

Coal Our Most Important Product With Silver Next

Particularly fortunate in its great store of mineral wealth is Canada. From this storehouse is being drawn an increasing and seemingly unending output of minerals. Before the year 1890 mineral production in Canada was comparatively small. In 1890 however, the production of all minerals exceeded 15 million dollars or a production of \$3.50 per capita. The mineral output from that time showed a phenomenal development, increasing by 1900 more than three and a half times to a total exceeding 64 millions. Now, however, this figure has been more than doubled, the present total production being more than 133 million dollars, or \$18 for every man, woman and child in the Dominion. Of the metals, silver is the most important in value, followed by pig iron, nickel, copper and gold, but the non-metal mineral product, coal, exceeds in value any of the metals, the yearly output of coal amounting to about \$36,000,000.

Mats of Ivory

There are but three mats of ivory in existence. The largest one measures 8 feet by 4 feet, and, although made in the north of India, has a Greek design for a border. It is used only on State occasions, like the signing of important State documents. The cost of this precious mat was almost incalculable, for more than 6,400 pounds of pure ivory was used in its construction. Only the finest and most flexible strips of material could be used, and the mat is like the finest woven fabric.

SMOKERS IN FACTORIES

Their Carelessness Causes Many Needless Fires

It is an open question whether the careless fool or the deliberate criminal does more damage by fire. Advantage seems to lie with the fool, because he is everywhere gladly bringing down destruction, while the fire bug must go about his deadly work stealthily, at weird hours and in awkward places.

Chief among the fools who carelessly cause fires is the smoker. His blazing match is cast down still alight. His cigarette end falls into piles of paper or shavings. The burning ashes of his trusty pipe descend gently into oil vats and barrels of gunpowder. If the fool destroyed only himself, the world could bear his actions philosophically, but he usually escapes while better men perish.

In England great wealth was accumulated by a man who was shrewd enough to locate small tobacco stores opposite factory entrances, but his fortune represented the loss of many fortunes by his brother manufacturers.

Smoking should be absolutely prohibited in or about every Canadian factory, and employees breaking this rule should be dismissed. If the rule became national, manufacturers could inform each other of these dismissals and could refuse employment to persistent offenders. If it were enforced there would be fewer fires, better work would be done, and the smoker would enjoy his weed more keenly in the evening, after a day's self-denial.—Industrial Canada.

NO SALT HORSE

It Costs Huge Sum Nowadays to Provision Ocean Liners

In these days, when the high cost of living is so much in the public mind, it is interesting to know what it costs a steamship to provide the necessities of life to the hordes of passengers who cross and recross the Atlantic. The annual statement of the North German Lloyd Company throws some interesting light on the subject.

For one year the company's bill for provisions alone was \$4,920,000, while during the same period the coal man was paid \$7,376,735 for 1,758,740 tons of coal which were shoveled into the ships' furnaces during the twelve-month. For these two items alone—provisions and coal—the company paid the enormous sum of \$12,296,735.

The itemized provision bill showed that the butcher got \$1,685,000 for meats. This does not include fish and game; for the former the company paid an additional \$239,660, while the bill for the game amounted to \$412,360, a total of \$652,020.

Preserves cost \$255,760 for the twelve months and fresh vegetables ran into the respectable figure of \$123,110, while for "sundries," including bread, flour, spices, fruits and the thousand and one articles that are used in the kitchen, the company paid \$1,688,890.

More potatoes were consumed during the year than any other single article, the total amount having been 17,875,873 pounds. Flour ranked next with 6,313,152 pounds, fresh beef third with 5,769,134 pounds, while the bread was fourth with 2,553,083 pounds. The passengers consumed 7,098,560 eggs, 4,271,000 oranges and lemons, 707,625 pounds of onions and 983,802 pounds of salt.
