DEAD IN MONTREAL

William Miller Doull died yesterday afternoon at his home, "Glenbrook" Georgeville, after a few hours' illness. There was no inkling that he was in failing health. On the contrary, he had impressed his visiting cousin, Rev. Dean Doull, of Columbia, with his healthy appearance and spirits.

Mr. Doull was born in Halifax, son of the late John Doull, a prominent figure in the life of that city. He became a member of the clothing firm of Doull and Gibson, of this city and further showed his ability in his successful ventures in development propositions and financial companies.

He is survived by a family of three Mrs. G. F. Greenwood, Major John D. Doull of Quebec, and W. M. Doull Jr., of New Zealand. Rev. Dean Doull, of Columbia will postpone his return to the West to attend the funeral tomorrow afternoon.—Montreal Star.

"VERY DRY TOWN"
SAYS MAYOR HOOPER
TO ALDERMAN

Also Tells Ald. Clark That City Council
Has no Right to Praise or Criticize
Action of Police Commission

Fredericton, according to the statement of His Worship Mayor Hooper, chairman of the Police Commission, made last night to the City Council, is a very "dry" town, in fact, if a man wants liquor he has to bring it in with him. His Worship said it had been told on good authority that such was the case. He stated further that during the last two months, with the police under the control of the Police Commission, more liquor had been seized and destroyed than had been in the previous history of the city. Police records spoke well for the manner in which the Canada Temperance Act was enforced. In September 1912 arrests for drunkenness had numbered 60 and for September 1913 27, a considerable reduction.

The reference of His Worship to the Scott Act was brought about by the introduction in the Council by Ald. Clark of a resolution to the effect that the Council urge upon the Police Commission the advisability of further enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act and the employment of additional or other police officers to accomplish that result.

On Ald. Clark requesting that his resolution be put to the Council, His Worship said:

"The resolution is out of order. I consider it outside the province of this Council to praise or find fault with the Police Commission or to

CATTLE-SHEDS
AT FAIR GROUNDS
DAMAGED BY FIRE

Children Playing With Matches Caused
What Might Have Been Serious
Blaze---Damage is Slight and
Covered by Insurance

Children playing with matches caused a serious blaze at the Exhibition Grounds yesterday afternoon at about 4.30 o'clock. Part of the cattle-sheds were destroyed and others damaged but the blaze was checked before it spread far. The loss is not great and it is well covered by insurance.

It is supposed that children playing on Smythe street thrust burning matches through the cracks of the cattle-sheds and so set fire to their interior. The blaze broke out and spread with startling suddenness and only the prompt arrival of the fire men prevented a serious blaze.

The fire broke out near the entrance to the grounds, which faces Aberdeen street. The gateway was partly burned and the sheds on its north-eastern side destroyed for a distance of about thirty yards. For some distance farther the sheds are damaged.

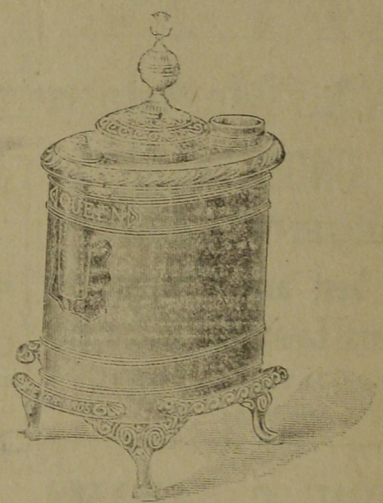
